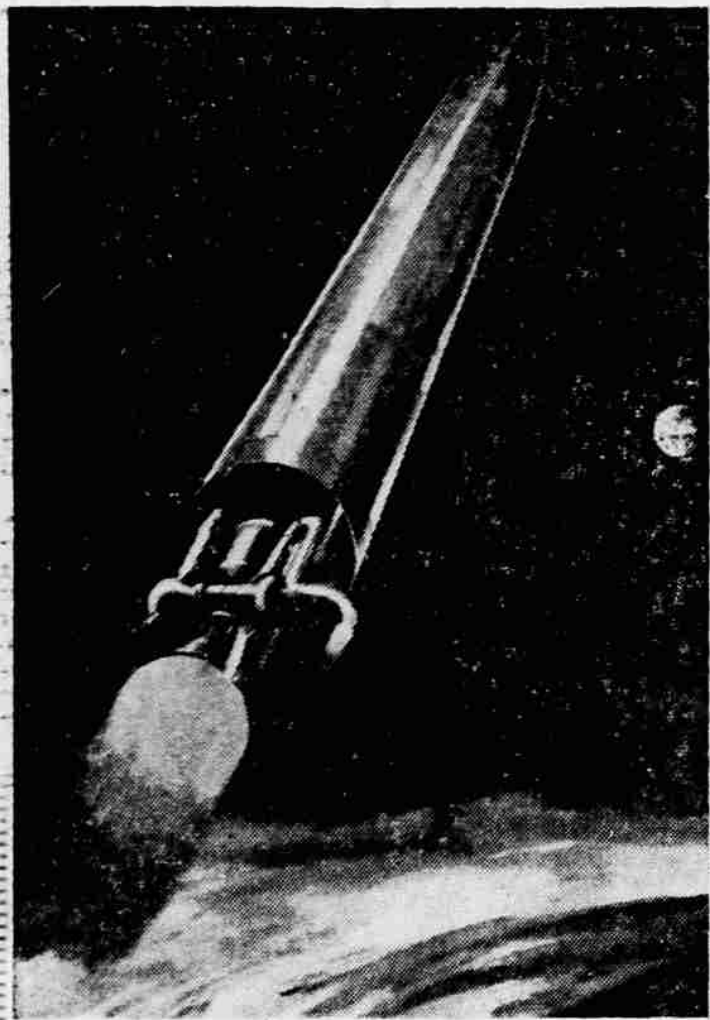

'Flash Advisory' Aids Air Pilots Already Aloft

Salt Lake City — The U. S. Weather Bureau has come up with a new service to help warn pilots of changes in weather conditions that might imperil their planes.

It's called a "flash advisory" and is particularly designed to aid airmen who are already aloft.

The first special advisories were issued at aviation forecast centers throughout the nation on March 15 and were explained to United Press during an interview with John C. Eberhardt, meteorologist in charge of the Salt Lake City airport weather station.

The flashes will be issued only when forecasters determine hazardous conditions have come up that pilots should know about. In effect, they supplement the regular forecasts, good for the next 24 hours, that are made by the weather centers every six hours.

But in addition to being transmitted on the high-speed teletype lines that connect scores of Weather Bureau and Civil Aeronautics Administration airports, communications centers, they are also radioed on an emergency basis to aircraft flying in the affected areas.

The radio facility used by the ground-to-air controllers, said Mel Harritt of the CAA.

Trout Eggs Held In Hatcheries

Portland—More than 9,235,000 eggs taken from fall spawning brood trout are now in the hatching troughs at game commission hatcheries throughout the state. Another million and a half kokanee eggs were shipped to the stations from out of state and the silver salmon egg production completed for the year.

The fall rainbow trout egg take at Leaburg, Oak Springs, and Roaring River hatcheries closed at mid-January with a record take of more than 7,497,000 eggs, most of which were transferred to other stations for hatching and rearing. Another 725,000 fall rainbow eggs were produced at the McKenzie and Willamette plants.

Totals 1,013,000
Cutthroat trout egg production at the Bandon and Alsea hatcheries totalled 1,013,000, with probably another 300,000 yet to go. The Alsea station also completed its silver salmon egg take with a total production of 52,300.

More than 1,500,000 kokanee were shipped into the state from Montana and were dispersed to the Fall River, Wallawa, and Wizard Falls hatcheries for incubation.

All hatcheries are now in the process of preparing for the production of eggs from spring spawning stocks which should get under way by mid-March.

White Sox Ink Donovan, Round Out Big Four

The Chicago White Sox today completed the signing of the \$125,000 "big four" pitching staff they hope can win the American League pennant in '58.

Manager Al Lopez's front-line pitching was rounded out when Dick Donovan, 6-foot, 3-inch, 205 pound right-hander, agreed to terms for an estimated \$28,000. A White Sox spokesman said Donovan received a 70 per cent raise—largest in the history of the club.

Donovan, who is scheduled to leave his Quincy, Mass., home today, is expected to join with Billy Pierce, Early Wynn and Bob Keegan to give the White Sox four starting pitchers the equal of any rival quartet in the league. Pierce, Wynn and Keegan signed previously for a total of about \$97,000.

Muscle Study May Broaden Heart Data

Los Angeles—A better understanding of the intricate mechanism of the heartbeat may result from a new technique of studying heart muscle in action designed by Dr. William J. Whalen of the UCLA medical school.

The journal, Circulation Research, said Dr. Whalen's method makes possible simultaneous physical and biochemical measurements of the heart muscle action.

Tiny strips of human and animal heart muscle are suspended in a small chamber in which is circulated a physiological solution. Highly sensitive strain gauges measure changes in the muscle strip's length, tension and rate of contraction.

At the same time, chemical changes in the solution reflect oxygen consumption of the tissue, thus giving an indication of biochemical activity associated with the muscle action.

Various types of drugs can be put into the chamber to test their effects on heart
