St. Sure said he was hopeful that this year's maritime contracts can be negotiated without work stoppages. He said all major contracts expire this year and must be renegotiated.

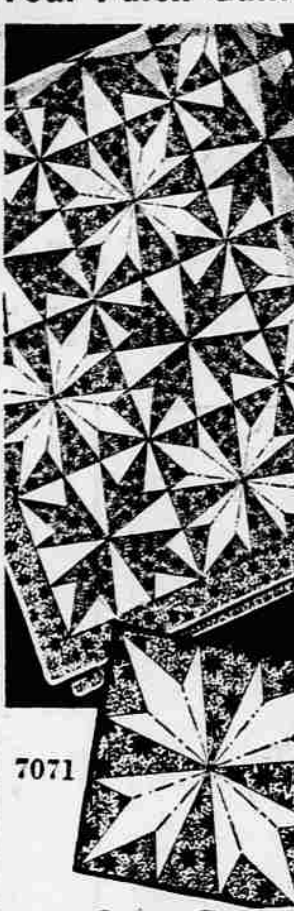
## Plans Made by Club For Annual Auction

## GEORGE EDWARD COLE

A complaint was filed before a United States Commissioner at San Francisco, Calif., on Jan. 9, 1957, charging George Edward Cole with violation of the Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution Statute in that he fled from the State of California to avoid prosecution after allegedly murdering a police officer.  
Cole is described as follows: Born March 24, 1927, Philadelphia, Pa. Height, 6 feet 1 inch. Weight, 160 to 178 pounds. Build, medium. Hair, brown, receding. Eyes, brown. Complexion, medium. Race, white. Nationality, American. Occupation: bus driver, truck driver, typist. Scars and marks: pit scar on outside corner of right eye, small cut scar on inside of left wrist, appendectomy scar; tattoo, small heart and names "Mom" and "Dad" and letters "GP" or "SP" on left forearm; tattoo, 8-point star on back of left hand. He wears full upper denture.  
Cole has previously been convicted of grand larceny and robbery. He reportedly has stated that he will shoot any police officer attempting to apprehend him. Cole is considered armed and dangerous.  
Any person having information which might assist in locating this fugitive is requested to immediately notify the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, United States Department of Justice, Washington 25, D.C.

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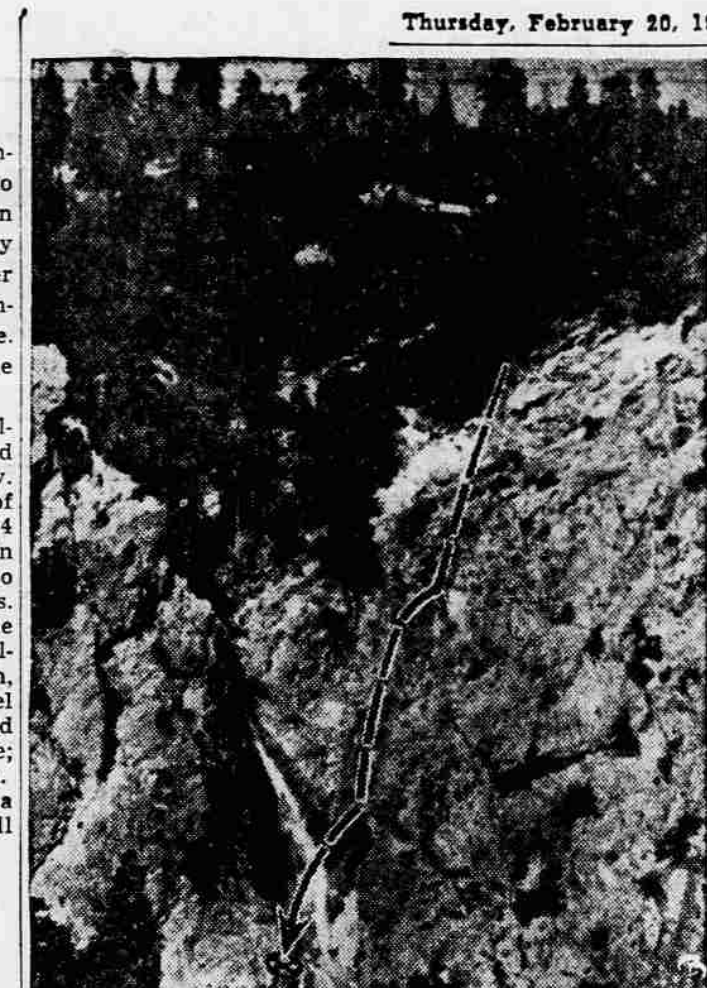

## Exchange Delegate To Visit in County

Ted Tidwell, 1957 International Farm Youth Exchange delegate to India, will be in Jackson county March 1 to 4, to speak to interested groups on his experiences, according to Glenn Klein, Jackson county 4-H agent.

Tidwell spent six months in India and recently returned to Oregon. He is scheduled to speak to the Jackson County Young Farmers March 3 and the Jackson county 4-H leaders association on March 4, Klein said. Other dates are open.

Tidwell stayed with Velur Sundaram an Indian IFYE exchange who visited Oregon in 1956 to live with the Tidwells.

Seven boys and one girl formed his host father's family. The sons in India stay in the father's house. When they marry the wife is brought to live in the same house. Sometimes there are 20 to 30 members of a family in one house, Tidwell said.

Tidwell has attended Northwest Christian college at Eugene, Oregon State college, and the Oregon Technical Institute in Klamath Falls. His major interests are technology and vocational agriculture.

The International Farm Youth Exchange (IFYE) is a project for rural young people. Object is to work to bring better understanding among people of the world and to build a lasting peace, Klein explained.

Rural young people from the United States live and work on farms in other countries for four to six months and farm youth from other countries spend about the same time on farms in the United States.

Oregon farm youth are selected each year by a committee.

## Wage Restriction Removal Sought

Buffalo, N.Y. — "Dollar Sam" Levy, who plays Santa Claus to hospitalized veterans, has embarked on a campaign to aid the nation's older citizens. He hopes to remove wage restrictions for those collecting Social Security.

The rotund Buffalo furniture salesman for seven years has visited veterans' hospitals around Christmas and distributed crisp dollar bills to patients.

Now he is pleading his case for senior citizens to every senator and representative in Washington. Each day a batch of his printed campaign cards is mailed out.

"Take a man 65 and put him in a rocking chair, and he won't go far," Levy explained. "But take a man 65 and put him to work, and he'll live to 90."

Rep. Katherine St. George (R-N.Y.) introduced a bill at the last session of Congress designed to remove limitations on earnings. Levy's campaign is directed at springing the bill from committee during the present session.
