Upper Applegate Grange

An open meeting to consider water resources is to be sponsored by Upper Applegate Grange in the Grange hall Friday, Feb. 28, from 8 until 9 p.m., according to Worthy Master Menno Bachmann.

Guest speakers will present various aspects of the subject, to be followed by an open forum discussion. Sister Anna Scott, lecturer, is in charge of completing arrangements for the event.

Since one of the dams contemplated in the survey report now being completed by Army Engineers is to be situated somewhere in the Upper Applegate area, the subject is a pertinent one, and it is hoped all residents of the area plan to be present to state their views and wishes.

After favorable discussion of the proposal, the 35 Grange members attending the last meeting voted unanimously to enter the 1958 National Community Service contest. Several possible projects were outlined for further consideration, and a request was made for more to be submitted to the Worthy Master as promptly as possible. The contest, sponsored jointly by the National Grange and the Sears Roebuck Foundation, offers a first cash award of \$10,000. Upper Applegate's entry in 1957 placed eighth in the state among the 70 Oregon Granges participating.

It was also decided to combine a drive for new members with a contest for presentation of the best program. For this purpose, the membership is being divided into four groups by the lecturer. Judges will be named and points awarded for the best balanced program presented and for members secured. Losers will entertain the winners at a dinner.

Grange Insurance Agent Finley stated rising car insurance rates are due to the mounting total of deaths and injuries sustained in traffic accidents. Traffic deaths now greatly exceed all American deaths suffered in all wars in which the U.S. has participated from the Revolution to the present time, he stated, and urged his hearers to drive carefully and safely.

Secretary Irene Culy reminded everyone that all dues must be paid before mid-March in order to qualify for a 100 per cent paid up membership pennant.

A special offering for the March of Dimes was received in conjunction with the customary penny drill, following which the Lecturer's program was presented consisting of community singing led by Sister Nell Ramsey.

The Worthy Master complimented and thanked the members for their loyal and untiring efforts for the good of the order, which enabled Upper Applegate Grange to win first place in the 1957 Jackson County Pomona contest, calling attention to the prize consisting of an altar cloth of royal blue velvet embroidered in gold, with matching scarves for the stations of Master, Overseer, Chaplain, and Lecturer, which were in use for the first time.

Sister Pearl Byrne won the attendance award, and the name of Sister Flossie Garner was called for the membership prize, but since she was absent, a new drawing will be made Feb. 28.

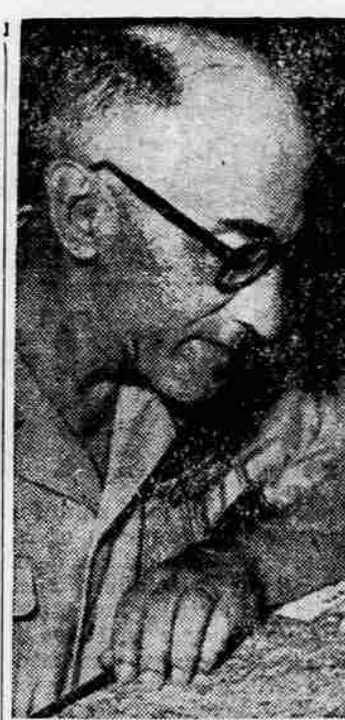

Frequent Winter Car Washing Urged

Boston — Cars should be greased and washed oftener to counteract the ravages of winter driving, the Automobile Legal Association warns.

Studies show that snow is more destructive to cars than rain, the ALA added, because snow will splatter and tend to rust parts rain cannot reach. Snow also is more detrimental to chrome trim and body paint.

Frequent rinsing of the car's body with water is recommended to remove salt which many highway departments use to melt ice.

More frequent oil changes are needed because cold starting forces unlubricated parts to rub together until the oil begins to flow again. Tiny particles of metal rub off and act as abrasives.

Winter is particularly injurious to cars left outside all the time, the ALA concluded.

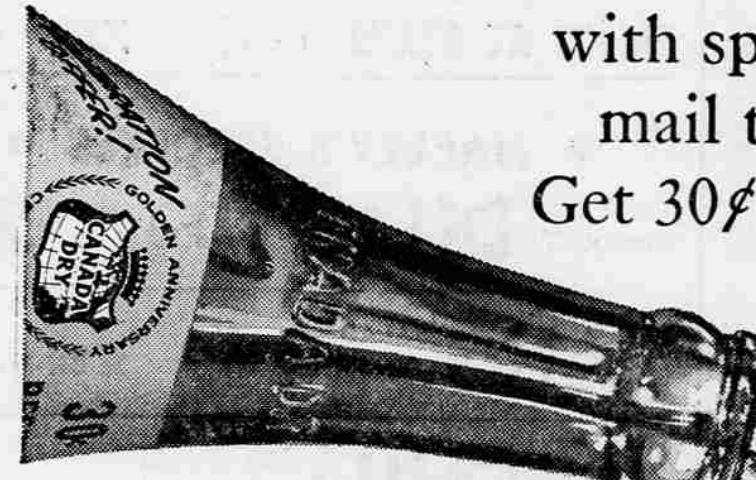
