Redding Parents Liable to Fine

Redding—The Redding city council recently introduced an ordinance which would make parents liable to fine and imprisonment if they allow their children to loiter about the streets after 10 p.m. Judge Richard B. Eaton of Shasta county juvenile court said the new law will take from the books an "antiquated" law.

Judge Eaton said few parents will be prosecuted, but the threat will be "an effective weapon against youngsters hanging around at late and unusual hours." The law pretains to juveniles under 18 years old.

Under present law, authorities can only talk to parents when their children are picked up. Under the new one, parents who "willfully" permit their children to wander may be found guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not more than \$300 and three months in jail.

The new law will not keep young people from attending school and church functions and other "lawful" activities. Only loitering is prohibited.

Fay Givan Dies In Idaho Hospital

Lewiston, Ida. — Fay A. Givan, 62, who was born in Eagle Point, reO, died in Tri-State Memorial hospital at Clarkston Tuesday following a short illness.

He was a soil conservationist at the North Idaho Indian agency at Lapwai since 1940, and a former county agent in Montana.

When he went to Lapwai, he incorporated into land lease contracts regulations governing land conservation which have since been used on other reservations throughout the country.

In December, 1955, he was named professional conservationist of the year by the Inland Empire chapter of the Soil Conservation Society of America.

Mr. Givan was born in Eagle Point Sept. 11, 1895, the son of George A. and Catherine Woung Givan. After serving with Navy, he received a degree from Oregon State college, and another from the University of California. He was county agent in Libby and Hamilton Mont., between 1923 and 1929.

Survivors include his widow, Dorris, whom he married at Havre, Mont., in 1932; three brothers, Tom Givan, Charlie Givan and Dewey Givan, all of Eagle Point; and a sister, Mrs. A. B. Kneass of Medford.

Leopold Gives Plans To Donate Proceeds

Chicago — Nathan Leopold has announced plans to turn over the proceeds of his autobiography to the society that awarded him the "mercy I did not show."

Through his attorney, Emmer Gertz, Leopold said the bulk of revenue earned from his book will be donated to the cause of helping disturbed children and fighting juvenile delinquency.

The book, "Life Plus 99 Years," is due for publication March 6, roughly the same time Leopold will be released from Stateville penitentiary near Joliet, Ill.

The 53-year-old convict tells how he and his adored friend, Richard Loeb, tried to demonstrate their contempt for ordinary standards of behavior by murdering a child at random.

War Planes Bomb Rebel Station

Padang, Sumatra, Sunday — Four aging warplanes of the Indonesian Government bombed radio stations here and at Bukittinggi Saturday and silenced the revolutionary movement's transmitters in both cities.

No casualties were reported in the second day of minor air attacks on rebel-held Sumatra. However, revolutionary sources in Singapore reported another raid on Medan, main port of Northern Celebes, with possible heavy casualties.

Leaders on both sides fear the raids may be a prelude to a full-scale civil war between the middle-of-the-road Sukarno Government and the anti-Communist rebels.

The three main topics scheduled for study are the process of group dynamics as it is related to curriculum development, the meaning of research in improving curriculum and the nature of children's thinking.
