Miss Teske, a freshman majoring in elementary education, to be eligible for the society had to receive at least a three point average for two terms at the college.

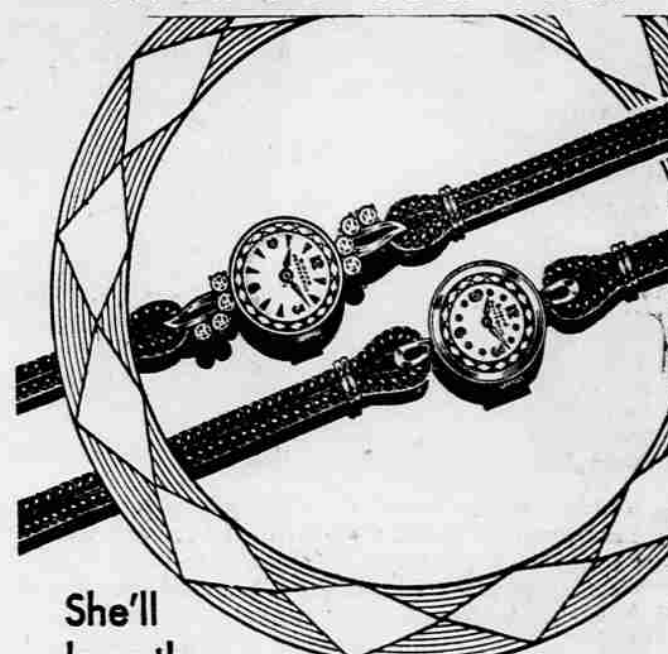

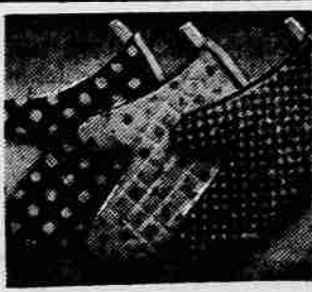
