Portland — The activities council of the Portland Art Museum will be hosts at an Antique Auto exposition to be held at the Museum Friday evening, February 28 from 5:00 to 10:00 p.m.

This unique and exciting exhibit is billed as "A Magnificent Assortment of Horseless Carriages," and will include 13 old cars and two belt-driven motor-cycles. Among the fine specimens that have been obtained are a 1903 Curved Dash Oldsmobile, a 1915 Detroit Electric, a 1903 Ford, a 1910 Hupmobile, a 1909 Cadillac and many other old-time motor-cars, all in perfect running condition. Keeper of the Stairs Said Safety Measure

Champaign, Ill.—If the youngsters in your house can't get over leaving the stairs cluttered, a "keeper of the stairs" may be one solution to the problem.

That's the suggestion of O. L. Hogsett, safety specialist at the University of Illinois.

Hogsett said the family should pick the worst offender—usually one of the younger members—and appoint him chief in charge of keeping the stairs clean. The "chief" can turn the job over to the first "stairway clutterer" caught.

Hogsett said while working on the stairway problem, the family should try to learn why things are left on the steps. If a handier and safer place for overcoats, brooms, mops and other items is provided, no one will be tempted to use the stairs for storage, he suggested.

Finally, Hogsett said, good lights, which can be controlled from both the top and bottom of the stairway, will make stairs safer. And a good sturdy handrail will stop many falls.

To determine the color of rubber-base paint when it dries, apply a smooth coating of paint to a clean white blotter. The blotter absorbs the liquid and leaves the dry pigment on the surface.

Freshen artificial flowers by brushing each petal with a damp sponge dipped in plastic starch. Press with warm iron and shape petals while still damp. Trim frayed edges with scissors.
