



FHA Chapters To Participate In Convention

Corvallis — Future Homemakers of America chapters at Medford senior, McLoughlin junior, Hedrick junior, Crater and Phoenix high schools will be among the 109 Oregon chapters participating in the annual state meeting March 7 and 8 at Oregon State college.

FHA is composed of high school girls taking home economics classes. The state membership now totals 4,294 girls.

The senior high chapter has 55 girls enrolled. Miss Sylvia Morris is chapter president and Mrs. Jean James is adviser. Thirty girls are enrolled in the McLoughlin chapter. President of the group is Miss Julie Fought and Mrs. Joanne Weatherford is adviser. Miss Carolyn Finch is president of Hedrick chapter which has 40 girls enrolled. Mrs. Dorothy Sneed is adviser to the group.

Crater chapter has 113 girls enrolled and is the fourth largest chapter in the state. Miss Vernola Hutchison is chapter president and Mrs. Frances Willett is adviser. Nineteen girls are enrolled in the Phoenix chapter. President of the chapter is Miss Janice Groves and adviser is Mrs. Evelyn Polas.

These for this year's thirteenth annual meeting will be "Now Is the Time to Learn." One of the highlights of the sessions will be awarding of state homemaker degrees, the state's top award for high school home economists. To qualify, girls must complete special work in school, home, and community programs.

Miss Joanne Kemble of Ontario high school is state president this year.

Researchers Produce Chemical Skin Oils

Madison, Wis.—Three University of Wisconsin researchers have been able to reproduce chemically natural skin oils that may be used to improve women's cosmetics.

Professor Dale Wurster said that his group has been able to duplicate the natural oil by making infrared studies of concentrated oil. He said it will be able to be used in lotions to re-form the natural skin barrier for women who have dried and chapped skin.

Natural oils from a thin protective covering over the skin and are related to skin conditions of drying, chapping and possibly wrinkling, he said.
