

# Beavers Down UCLA Saturday To Move Up in PCC Standings

Long Beach, Calif. — Forward Dave Gambee broke the all-time Pacific Coast conference career scoring mark Saturday in leading Oregon State to a 77 to 61 victory over UCLA that moved the Beavers into second place in the standings.

Stanford earlier scored a mild upset victory, 69 to 61, over USC in the first game of a PCC basketball doubleheader held here.

Gambee, the Beaver's All-Conference forward, scored 30 points, his best effort of the year in a conference game, to push his mark to 858 points in three years of playing. He is a senior and has about four games to play this season. His effort broke the record of 855 points set by Bob Houbrges, of the University of Washington, in the period 1951-53. Gambee scored 15 points in each half.

The Beavers outplayed the Bruins in the first half for a 39-30 halftime lead. In the second, the Bruins twice closed the gap to within one or two points, but never caught the fast-moving Beavers who finally ran up 10 consecutive points to ice it.

Guard Lee Harmon returned to action today and scored 13 points for Oregon State.

High scorers for UCLA were Walt Torrence and Ben Rogers, each with 14.

The win gave the Beavers a 9-3 conference record behind California's 9-2 going into today's contests. UCLA was dropped to third place with 9-4.

In the first game, Stanford Captain Paul Neumann staged a one-man rally in the final seven minutes to overcome the Trojans.

### Frosh Keeping Pace With High Pointmen

New York — Mark down Kelly Coleman, a freshman at Kentucky Wesleyan, as a basketball star of the future.

Matter of fact, the weekly major college statistics issued Saturday by the NCAA service bureau indicate that Coleman can claim top billing right now.

Although his college of 500 students plays teams with much greater manpower Coleman has become the highest scoring freshman in major college history. He also has jumped from 13th place last week to fifth this week in the current individual scoring standings for all players.

Coleman scored 113 points in three games last week to give him an even 600 points for the season. That broke the record of 555 set by Cleo Littleton of Wichita in 1951-52.

Coleman's average of 26.1 points a game is bettered only by those of Elgin Baylor of Seattle (33.9), Oscar Robert-

son of Cincinnati (33.6), Will Chamberlain of Kansas (31.4) and Bailey Howell of Mississippi State (26.8). The figures include games through Thursday night.

In team offense, Marshall (89.4 points per game), Cincinnati (87.2), West Virginia (86.0) and Seattle (83.7) stood 1-2-3-4 for the fourth straight week. On defense, San Francisco (49.4 points allowed per game), Oklahoma State (51.0) and Dayton (53.5) headed the list for the fifth week in a row.

Seattle leaped from sixth to first place in rebounds with a .593 average. Holdover in field goal accuracy (48.8 per cent) and Marshall in free throw accuracy (79.0 per cent).

Among the individual leaders are Ralph Crosswhite of Western Kentucky in field goal accuracy (87.4 per cent), Gerald Clark of Texas Tech in free throw accuracy (87.4 per cent) and Alex Ellis of Niagara in rebounding (25.7 per cent).

# Records Fall in Finals Of Australia Swim Meet

Melbourne, Australia — Jon Konrads, 15, bettered world records for four distances Saturday night at the Australian swimming championships and established himself as the sport's outstanding freestyle performer.

Cheered by a capacity crowd of 5,500, the barrel-chested youngster turned the gruelling men's 1,650-yard freestyle final into a one-boy show while winning in 17 minutes, 28.7 seconds.

Jon knocked a fantastic total of 30.5 seconds off the 17:59.2 time which the International Swimming federation

established as the clocking required for a world record in the event in a 55-yard or 50-meter pool. En route he clipped 31.2 seconds off the world 1,500-meter mark of 17:52.9 set by George Breen of Buffalo, N.Y. This distance is about 10 yards shorter than 1,650 yards.

Konrads also was clocked at the 880-yard mark and was timed there in nine minutes, 14.5 seconds. This was 3.2 seconds better than his world mark of 9:17.7 for 800 meters and 880 yards.

Dawn Fraser, 21, joined Konrads in Saturday night's record-breaking finale. She bettered her world marks for the women's 200 meters and 220 yards freestyle. She clipped three seconds off her 2:17.7 mark for those distances

while winning the 220-yard freestyle Tuesday night in world record time, defeated Lorraine Crapp by six yards. Lorraine was timed in 2:22.0.

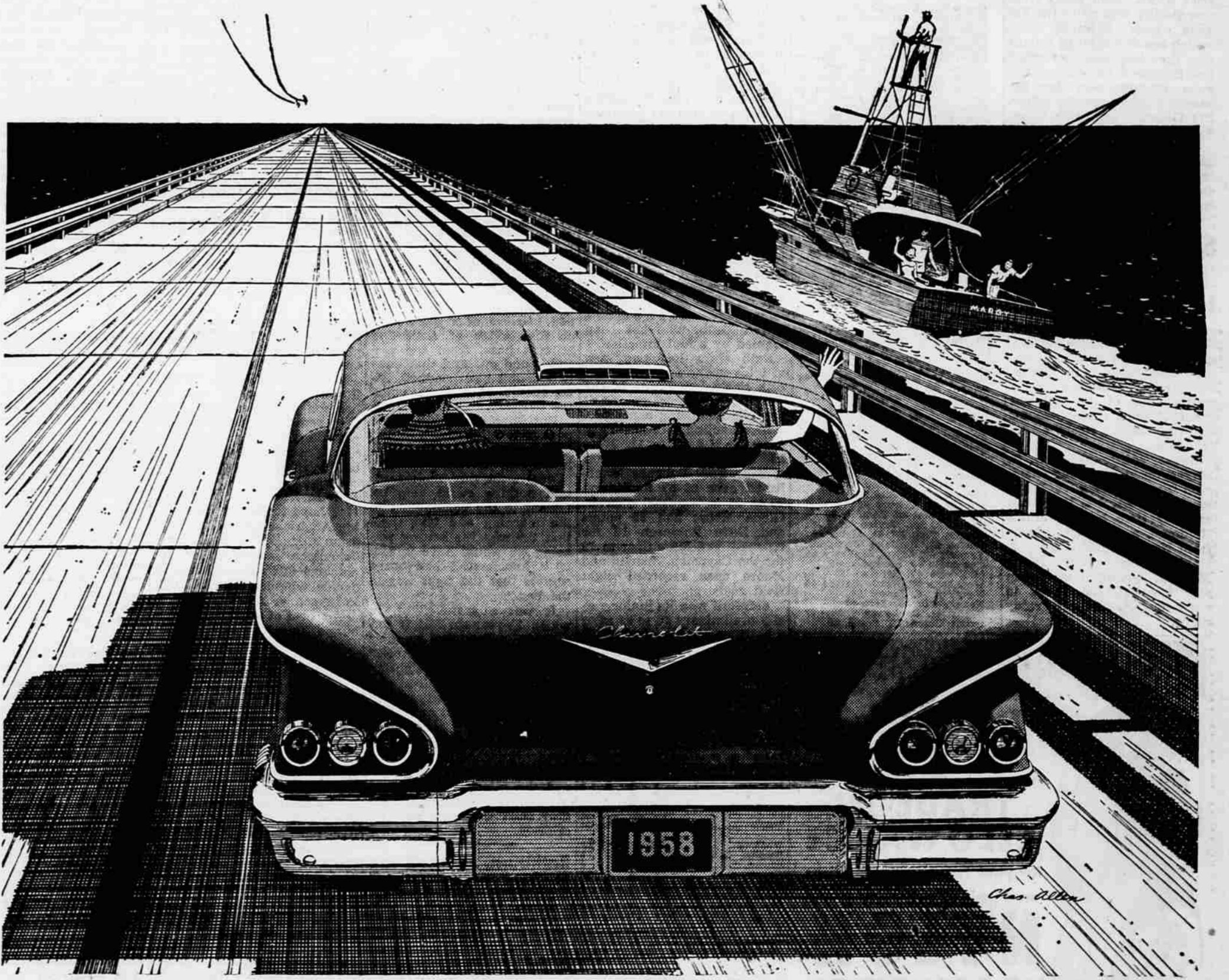
