More Kindly Care In Hospitals

Recently I pointed out the great need for a wiser and a more thoughtful and kindly handling of children in hospitals, and I told of efforts now being made in certain places to build on the experience of persons who have recently had a child in a hospital. Efforts are made to improve all those conditions that caused needless fright to the child, and needless worry, uncertainty, annoyance, and frustration to the parents.

Now, I get an interesting communication from Mr. Arthur H. Curtis, president-elect of the Forney W. Clement Memorial Foundation of Battle Creek, Mich. Since 1922 the Kiwanis International has had this project in the University of Michigan Hospital to furnish play equipment for hospitalized children. Their work has expanded and grown so that now it provides not only equipment, but also women to teach and to supervise recreation. It is wonderful that the children are given ample facilities for play and for the continuation of their education. There is a program for teen-agers and their hobbies.

Certainly, this is an ideal project for many an organization looking around for some good use for its energies and its funds.

Enrollment of Students In American Colleges

In view of the fact that, of late, there has been so much written about our failure to educate some of our brightest young people, it is cheering to read in Science that in the Fall of 1956, some 2,947,000 students enrolled in our 1,852 institutions of higher education. There were 10 universities reporting enrollments ranging from 40,788, in California, to 22,470 in Ohio. During 1956 there were 39.2 per cent more students enrolled in colleges than in 1951. Nearly two-thirds of these were men. I was happy to read that college students now have about twice as many scholarships to try for as they had five years ago. In the years 1955-1956 there were 237,000 scholarships available in our colleges and universities, with a value of \$55,700.

Canadians Killed Near Harrisburg

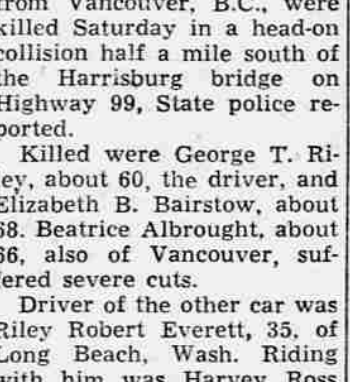
Eugene—Two persons from Vancouver, B.C., were killed Saturday in a head-on collision half a mile south of the Harrisburg bridge on Highway 99, State police reported.

Killed were George T. Riley, about 60, the driver, and Elizabeth B. Bairstow, about 68. Beatrice Albright, about 66, also of Vancouver, suffered severe cuts.
