Sucker Creek Discussed

Cave Junction — An open meeting called Tuesday night to answer questions on the proposed Sucker Creek Irrigation district failed to clear the air between "pros" and "cons," but did clear up several points that had become clouded with conjecture.

Lee McAllister, area engineer for the U.S. bureau of reclamation, gave facts on irrigation district operation and management, stressing especially that a district is never charged more than its ability to pay, and that land which is not feasible for agriculture is not to be included, nor is land which already has proved adequate adjudicated water rights. He emphasized that all property owned by residents within the district will not be charged for water, but only those acres which are irrigable.

Don Lane, secretary of the State Water Resources board, discussed problems of static water supply under increasing demand at an Illinois Valley Grange meeting Thursday.

Giving the expected increase in population, Lane pointed out the ever-growing need for irrigation systems and conservation of water in Oregon and the rest of the United States.

Hanford Blames Chemical Reaction

Richland, Wash. — The Atomic Energy Commission said today a fast chemical reaction in a processing cell at the Hanford Atomic Works here Feb. 13 caused between \$75,000 and \$100,000 damage.

The AEC said the damage appeared to be minor and at first was thought to have been caused by a broken steam line. There were no workers injured, the AEC said, nor was there any radioactive contamination.

The building, seldom entered by human beings, is a concrete windowless structure the size of a football field. It houses a cell where radioactive iodine is removed from mgasses produced when fuel elements are dissolved.
