Portland—An acceptance of a Seattle firm's bid to build a new dam for the city of Portland faced a delay at city hall here as a result of a Portland firm's request for preference even though its bid was higher.

Green Construction company of Seattle submitted the low bid on first phase construction of the new Bull Run dam of the Portland water system. The bid of Lord Brothers Contractors, was \$92,000 higher than the Seattle bid but the Portland company said that "city should make every effort to stimulate local business."

City Commissioner William Bowes said such discrimination against an out-of-city firm would invite retaliation and he pointed out that Lord Brothers do considerable work outside Portland and Oregon.

Mock Courtroom
Their presentation to the audience was done in mock courtroom fashion with Manville Heisel, master of ceremonies, charging them with the crime of pulchritude and charm and asking the audience to vote on which "is the most guilty." John Cheney "appeared for the defendants."

During the evening, Dr. Lee Mellish, member of Medford Lions club and state chairman of all Oregon clubs, spoke on Lionism and the club's extensive service projects with the blind and other handicapped. He said there are 14,000 Lions clubs in 85 countries of the world, making it the largest of all service clubs. Dr. Mellish spoke of the breakdown of moral standards in America and urged a moral revival and a return to the Christian principles.

Reports on Projects
Dr. Harvard Breesee reported on recent service projects being carried on in Jackson county by Crater Lions. This included repair of an iron lung, purchase of eyeglasses for children and aid to a student at Southern Oregon college with failing eyesight by purchasing a tape recorder to be used in his studies.

The program closed with material on the proposed Rogue Valley Manor presented by M. N. Hogan and Jennings Pierce. David Irving, president of Crater Lions, opened the program and greeted guests.

AMA Claims Drug Use Not Alarming
Chicago—The notion that drug addiction is an "alarming" problem in the nation has been criticized by the American Medical Association.

The AMA also contended that "active proselytizing" by drug peddlers plays a small part in spreading addiction.

A report in the Journal of the AMA said addiction apparently spreads from person to person, with addicts giving drugs to the beginner as a friendly gesture.

The report said there are probably not more than 60,000 addicts in the United States. While addiction in persons under 21 has increased since World War II, the AMA said, the problem is not as great as many people think.

Nor is it a new one, the AMA said. A similar reported increase in drug addiction among young people followed World War I.

Lawyers Discuss Atomic Challenge
Chicago—The University of Chicago Downtown Center has set up a new course to show how claims and defense attorneys will meet courtroom challenges in the Atomic Age.

The new course, "Atomic Energy and the Law: Six Lecture-Discussions for Lawyers," is the first of its type to be offered in this area.

Particular emphasis is placed on professional opportunities for the lawyer, as interest in atomic energy grows. The course is designed for both private practitioners and corporate lawyers. It explores legal ground rules and procedures applicable to atomic energy activities in business at home and abroad. Consideration is given to effects on labor law and international law and to jurisprudence as a whole.

The lectures will analyze the legal problems incident to Atomic Energy Commission licensing and regulatory requirements in contracting, patents, security, radiation hazards, public liability, foreign trade and administration generally.

\$19 Average for Watches, Jewelry
Washington—The average family spent \$19 on watches and jewelry last year, according to the Clock and Watch Manufacturers Association.

This compares with \$120 spent for women's clothing and \$123 for men's and boy's apparel.

More than half of all the jewelry and watches were bought by families with incomes of \$5,000 or more. This income bracket constitutes a third of all U. S. households.

Families with incomes of \$4,000 or more—about half of the nation's households—purchased almost three-fourths of the jewelry and watches sold in 1956.

The 1956 expenditures ranged from \$8 per household in the lowest income group to \$22 in families with incomes of at least \$10,000 a year.

More than 14 million checks are cashed daily in the U. S., covering about 90 per cent of all the money exchange.

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Eisenhower Asks \$1,455,747,000 For Defense Use
Washington—President Eisenhower asked Congress today for an extra \$1,455,747,000 for missiles, planes and Polaris-firing submarines.

The requested funds for the new fiscal year starting July 1 also would be used to speed up and expand research and development programs and "modifications of other high priority defense programs."

The request for extra money would push defense spending for fiscal 1959 beyond the \$41 billion mark. In his budget message to Congress in January the President had estimated defense spending for the next fiscal year at \$39,800,000,000.

Air Force Funds
Biggest single increase in additional funds requested by the President was \$518,400,000 for planes and missiles for the Air Force. This would boost the total estimate in that category to \$6,407,200,000.

The President also asked a \$218,100,000 increase, to \$1,623,100,000 for missiles and equipment for the Army; a \$206,800,000 increase to \$1,587,800,000 for ship building and conversion by the Navy.

He also asked for an extra \$180 million for the office of defense secretary for advanced research projects. This would bring estimated spending for that category to \$520 millions.

Tacoma Closure May Benefit Astoria
Washington—Rep. Walter Norblad (R-Ore.) said here today that Astoria may benefit from the scheduled closure June 1 of the Tacoma reserve fleet operations and the closure in October of the Tacoma Naval base.

Norblad said the closures would mean more ships and work for the reserve fleet at Tongue Point Naval base at Astoria.

The main benefit, he said, would come from the added future ship work and probable addition of naval personnel.

Norblad added, "It is very probable that certain officers and their families will be transferred from Tacoma to Astoria."

Teachers To Attend Research Center
Chicago—One of the nation's nuclear research centers will throw open its doors to high school teachers next summer.

Argonne National Laboratory at Lemont, Ill., will run summer sessions to narrow the gap between the training of many high school teachers and the current state of scientific development.

The teachers will review fundamentals of nuclear energy, hear lectures by Argonne scientists and perform experiments related to atomic energy.

This is the second year Argonne, 25 miles southwest of Chicago, has offered the "summer school." A \$10 registration fee is required.

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Stock List Scramble Of Gains and Losses

New York—The stock market couldn't make up its mind again today.

The main list was a scramble of gains and losses, which has been the pattern of recent sessions. Market analysts attributed the backing and filling to uncertainty over government anti-recession moves, such as tax cuts, and contract negotiations in the auto industry.

Individual corporate developments played a key role in the trading of certain issues. S.S. White Dental Manufacturing jumped more than five at its high on news the firm had experienced a very good first quarter.

Metals favored the downside again, with price cuts, reduced output and high inventories again shaping trader sentiment. Alcoa lost more than two at its low and Kennecott was off around a point.
