Ashland — Sam Jordan, 81, of 143 Gresham ave., Ashland, died April 1. Mr. Jordan was born Nov. 16, 1876, in Michigan City, Ind. He moved with his parents as a child to Waynesboro, Va., where he lived as a boy, moving to Ashland in 1910. With his brother, Al Jordan, Ashland, he operated an electrical appliance and contracting business. At the time of his death he was the oldest electrical dealer in Oregon.

He married Annie Payne Oct. 10, 1920, in Ashland. Washington—FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, urging that parents be made legally and financially accountable for the crimes of their children:

Veterans Released From Liability to Government

More than 2,400 veterans have been released from liability to the government on their GI home loans under a 1956 law, S. T. Brannock, officer in charge of the Medford veterans administration office, reported today.

The law provides that veterans selling their GI homes may be released from liability to the government if the new purchaser meets proper credit requirements.

Brannock said the new purchaser, who need not be a veteran, must assume all of the veteran's obligations to the government on the GI loan under the law.

Before enactment of the law, a veteran was released from GI home loan liability to the government only by paying off the loan in full himself or by having the new purchaser do so, or when VA considered it in the government's best interests to release him.

Government guaranty of the loan is not affected by releasing the veteran from his liability. The new purchaser merely assumes the veterans liability, Brannock said.

Release of the veteran from GI loan liability to the government does not automatically restore his GI home loan entitlement.

Cyprus, Bases Issues in Greece

Athens, Greece — Cyprus and the establishment of NATO rocket bases in Greece probably will be the main issues in the general election scheduled for May 11, informed sources said today.

Parliament proclaimed the election and voted a new set of electoral laws before dissolving Wednesday. A caretaker government has been in power since March 2 when Premier Constantine Karamanlis resigned after 15 members of his National Radical Union Party defected.

Some of the international oils gave ground following reports that Jordan had nationalized the oil distribution business. Production cutbacks upset the steels and nonferrous metals generally reflected uncertainty over the price and inventory situation.

Aircraft showed strength during the session. Rails favored the downside. Chemicals were narrowly irregular. Autos were mixed.
