

Domestic Pets Seen Possible Reservoirs For Polio Viruses

New York — Science's long-held suspicion that various animals which live with people can serve as "reservoirs" of polio viruses has been proved — against one species. This indicates quite strongly that what one species can do, others can do, too.

Type I polio virus was found in a budgerigar, which is the Australian parakeet or "love bird." This bird evidently infected its nine-year-old master with the virus, and the boy subsequently died of bulbar polio.

LeMay Sets Nonstop Flight To Capital

Honolulu — Gen. Curtis LeMay, Air Force vice chief of staff, prepared to fly nonstop today from Hickam Field, Hawaii, to Andrews Air Force Base near Washington, D.C.

LeMay was to leave this morning aboard a KC135 jet tanker.

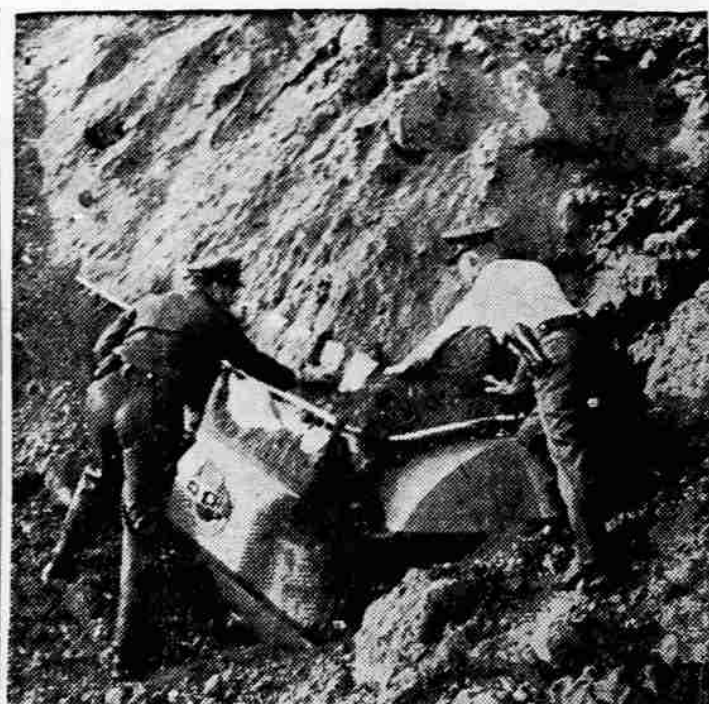
LeMay and his wife arrived in Honolulu Wednesday night after a nonstop flight from New Zealand. They had gone there to represent the United States as New Zealand celebrated the anniversary of its air force.

LeMay paused only long enough after his arrival to tell newsmen that ballistic missiles will never replace big bombers.

"Missiles never will replace the human element in warfare," he said. "Missiles have no bearing on the effectiveness of the B47."

Deepest sympathy is extended to Mrs. Howard Short upon the recent death of her husband.

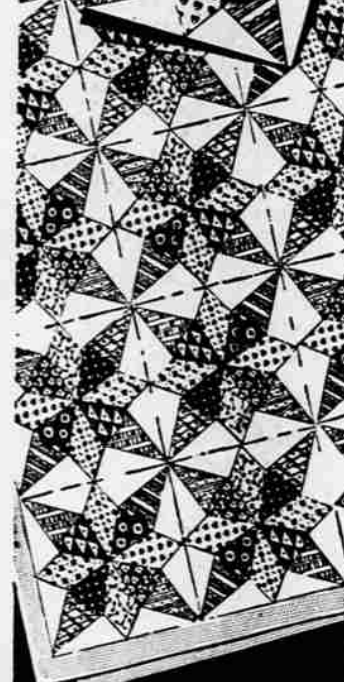
Latest Chessman Appeal Rejected

Young Alcorn's leg was crushed and broken in eight places when a cave-in of earth and timbers held him captive for nearly five hours.

Vatican City — The Eternal City draped itself in mourning today in memory of the ordeal of Jesus Christ.

The Roman Catholic ritual of Matndy Thursday ushered in Christendom's most solemn season, commemorating the suffering, death and resurrection of Christ some 1,900 years ago.

Priests prepared to strip altars of their ornaments and drape them in mourning immediately after today's commemoration of Christ's establishment of the Holy Eucharist at his last supper.

The Holy Week mourning will reach its peak Friday afternoon at the time Christ died on the cross.

It will end at midnight Saturday when the big bell of St. Peter's Basilica rings out to announce that "Christ has risen from the dead."
