Mrs. James Lillie will be hostess for the dessert that will be held prior to the business meeting.

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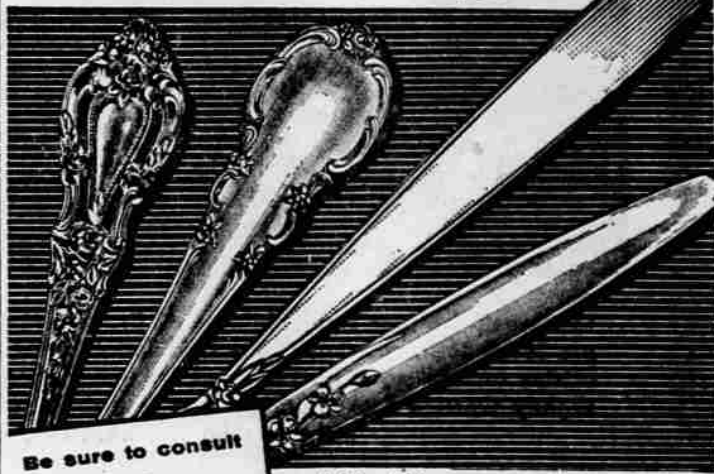
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
