A New York publicity firm issued pictures of a Dior-influenced tent-shaped dress, with bows on bosom and hips, barely distinguishable high waist and a 17½ inch high hemline.

The manufacturer, Susy Perette, was quoted as saying Mrs. Eisenhower had ordered a size 12, price \$39.95, after seeing the dress modeled at the Cherry Blossom fashion show here last week.
