Cave Junction — The 17-unit Caves Motel, located at the south end of Cave Junction, has been sold by owner Valeria Rauber to William J. McLean, Cave Junction real estate and insurance agent, and Laurence Cushing, local attorney.

One of the largest in the valley, the motel includes the main building, several year-round rental units, a number of tourist cabins and a swimming pool.

Mrs. Rauber, who with her late husband, managed Caves Motel for 12 years, plans to remain in the valley. She is a candidate for the office of Josephine county commissioner.

The reservoir will be about 100 acres in extent. Rivers says there are four potential sites here, one for a warm water fish lake, and three for propagation of fish. Geological survey work must be done before final approval is given by the game commission.
