**Mothers Invited To Join Chorus**

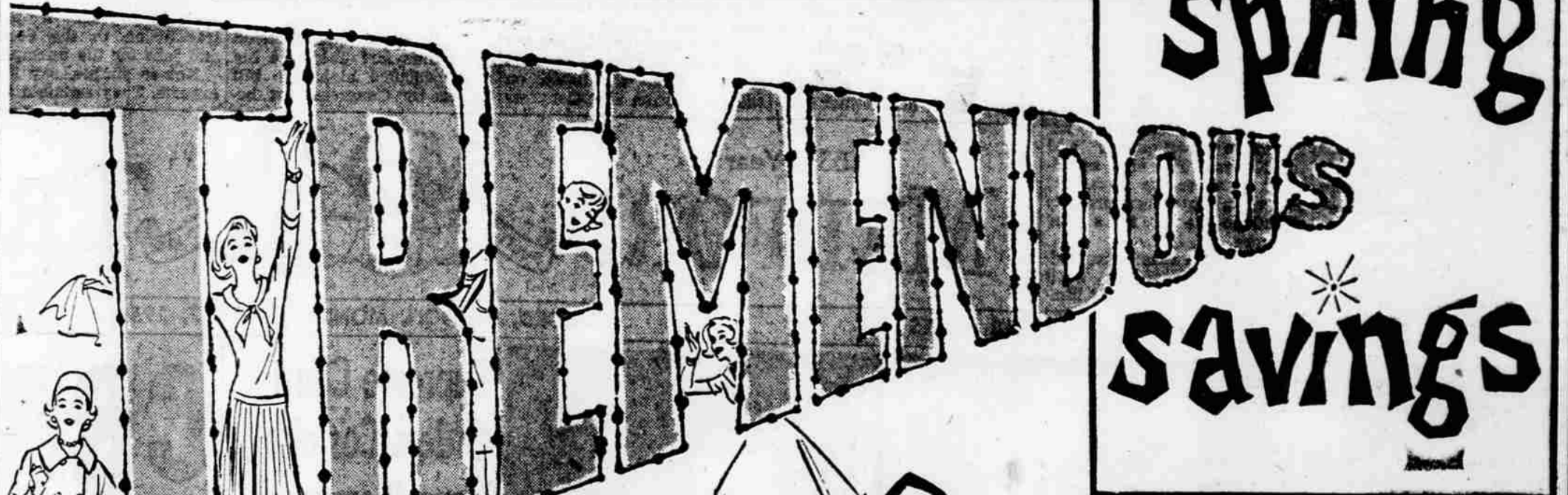
It isn't too late to join the Mothersingers, is the word sent out by that group. New music was recently selected by the chorus and practice will begin this week on the new selections.
