The Medical Roundup

Cancer Control Month

April is Cancer Control Month when the American Cancer Society is going to ask the country for \$30,000,000 to support their nationwide programs of research, education and service. The society is made up of some 2,000,000 Americans.

The idea is to fight cancer each year with a check-up for one's self and a check-up for others who are in great need.

The size of the problem can be seen from the fact that last year some 250,000 Americans died of cancer. This year 700,000 of us will have to be treated for cancer. Today, one in every three with the disease can be saved. Twice as many could and would be saved if people would only go for a check-up each year, and if more would go to a physician the minute a lump or other possible sign of cancer appears.

Let us all remember that the danger signals are (1) unusual bleeding or discharge; (2) a lump somewhere; (3) a sore that does not heal; (4) a sudden change in bowel or bladder habits; (5) hoarseness or a chronic cough; (6) indigestion or abdominal pain, such as one never had before; (7) difficulty in swallowing; and (8) sudden inflammation in an old wart or mole. Don't wait to see if the trouble will clear up; go see a doctor. If he does not examine you, go to another doctor who will check you over carefully.

Hemorrhoids or Piles

One of the common curses of mankind is the hemorrhoid, or dilated vein (or veins) at the lower end of the bowel. We do not know exactly why these things pick on certain people more than on others, but we do know that women often develop large hemorrhoids during pregnancy. In most cases hemorrhoids do not distress the patient, or they distress him only occasionally, as when an effort is made to move the bowels after a couple of days of constipation. Then, a pile is likely to be so bruised that the blood clots in it, and this causes much pain for a week or 10 days. In some cases, piles will bleed so often and so severely that the person will have to be operated on in order to avoid the production of a severe anemia.

What most persons with piles need to do is to keep their bowel movement soft, perhaps by taking a different cooked fruit each day. If they keep using the same fruit every day it will soon have no effect on the bowel. At times the person can take every other day a dose of compound licorice powder. A hard mass of feces should never be forced out without the help of an enema either of oil or water.

If the situation becomes unbearable, the person must have the hemorrhoids removed surgically. Some physicians inject hemorrhoids while others never dare use this method because of occasional sloughing of tissues.
