Hollywood - Sol M. Wurtzel, the producer of more than 700 motion pictures and the first to cast such stars as Tom Mix, Will Rogers and Shirley Temple, died Wednesday at his home.

The 65-year-old producer, a native of New York, was executive producer for 20th Century Fox from 1937 to 1944, when he left to produce pictures independently. He suffered a stroke in 1952.
