

Tornado Defends in Hayward Meet; Crater Eyes 'A' Mantle

Medford high's Black Tornado will seek to uphold its sparkling tradition of victory and Crater and Ashland will attempt to move a notch higher than their 1957 finishes Saturday when they contend in the big school division of the 21st annual Hayward relay track and field meet at University of Oregon in Eugene.

Medford, contending in the Metropolitan division, and Crater, vying in Class A, each will have some 30 thinclads in the Eugene cinder classic. Ashland, also in Class A will have a lesser number.

The Tornado has been champion of its class in every Hayward event it has entered since 1951 and will go for its seventh straight diadem. It has won 15 of the 18 Haywards in which it has competed and was second on the three other occasions. Medford's last second place was in 1951 when it was only one-third point behind winning Klamath Falls.

Crater was second in Class A last year, 20 points back of Cottage Grove, and 27 in front of Ashland which was third.

Eight-four high schools in all from Oregon and Southwest Washington are contending in four classes this week end. More than 1,000 athletes are entrants Fifth-two Class B and C schools were on the Hayward track and field today. A and Metro classes appear Saturday.

Medford and Cottage Grove, Metro and A champs of 1957, have been established as favorites by Eugene sources. The Tornado experts to make a strong bid in its defense but will have stiff challenge from Jefferson of Portland and Grants Pass winners, respectively, of last week ends Portland and Rogue relay meets. And, there are others, from whom little has been heard, who could rise up and give all three trouble.

Comets Strengthen
The two Salem high schools and South Eugene figure to cause stir in the event, with

the division of points from a sizable number of entries, several other Portland schools could be threats as could entrants from Vancouver, Wash.

Medford, however, is expected to be strengthened in some events for its Eugene jaunt. The Tornado may not take firsts in many events but, if it performs up to standard, can record enough other markers to protect its prestige.

Cottage Grove is the choice in Class A to a considerable extent because it has Oregon's fastest miler. Burleson is expected to be in three running events for the Lions. With this in mind, Coach Ed Knapp has fortified his Crater crew by having Kerman Bennett and Jerry Kime run legs in the 440-yard relay as well as the 880-yard and mile relays. They ran the latter two events at the Rogues, winning the mile. Knapp has done some other bolstering.

Jeff Picked In Three

Performances of last week end place Jeff in the favored role in the 440, shuttle hurdles and broad jump of the Metro group. Roosevelt of Portland looms quartet to beat in the mile relay and Grants in the two-mile which Medford is not entering. Wilson appears best bet in the distance medley. Medford had the best marks last Saturday in the shot put and high jump.

Mike Sparlin, Grants Pass, and John Harvey, Medford, look tops in the pole vault and Grants Pass, Roosevelt and North Salem appear top contenders in the half-mile relay.

Winter Olympic Contest Could Cease After 1960

Lusanne, Switzerland—The 1960 games at Squaw Valley, Calif. Otto Mayer of Switzerland, chancellor of the IOC, made that disclosure Thursday in discussing the case of Austrian Olympic ski champion Toni Sailer who faces an amateurism investigation.

"We are heading towards the end of the winter Olympics," said Mayer. "If the structure of skiing is not profoundly modified, the 1960 winter games in Squaw Valley may well be the last in the history of modern Olympics."

Washington Nabs Grade Track Title
Washington compiled sufficient margin in the only class it won yesterday to nip Roosevelt by half a point in a city grade school track meet at the senior high stadium.

Roosevelt won Class A 38 to 32, Class B 44½ to 25½, and claimed the medley relay. Washington was victor 43 to 18 in Class C. Overall score was Washington 100½ and Roosevelt 100¼.

Three city records tumbled. In Class B Bob Harrison, Washington vaulted 6 feet 10 inches and Roosevelt 220-yard relay team of Knight, Vowell, Collins and Root toured the distance in 28.6. In Class C Bobby Stearns, Washington ran the 150-yard dash in 19.6.
