Folley Appears Ticketed For Pete Rademacher Tiff

Eddie Machen's boxing future was as cloudy as the muddled heavyweight picture today while Zora Folley, who fought an unpopular draw Wednesday with the undefeated California heavyweight, appeared ticketed for a bout against Pete Rademacher.

The Folley-Machen fight, a dreary 12-rounder at San Francisco's Cow Palace, ended with Machen suffering more injured muscles in his sensitive left shoulder. Dr. Sam Sherman told him Thursday to forego boxing for at least several weeks.

Bill Swift, Folley's manager, said he was going to protest the alleged "robbery" through his lawyer. But in the meantime, he was feeling more pain as far as his stoic Arizona charge was concerned.

Three Sites Mentioned

Three promoters were in line to get a Folley-Rademacher match for either the Pacific Northwest, Louisville or Los Angeles. The winner presumably will get a shot at Floyd Patterson's title.

Rademacher is the Olympic Games hero who turned pro last year and had Floyd Patterson down before the heavyweight king took him out in the sixth round.

While Machen appeared to be slipping from his spot as the number one contender, second-ranked Folley had Seattle promoter Ignio Lucchesi trying to line him up for a bout with Rademacher.

Lucchesi said on Thursday that he had offered Rademacher \$20,000 or 30 per cent of the gate to meet the silent man from Chandler, Ariz.

The pair have met as amateurs. Folley defeated the balding Olympian eight years ago in Seattle and Rademacher reversed the decision at Boston in 1953.

Seattle Bout Sought

George Chermes, Rademacher's trainer for the Patterson fight said in Seattle that George Parnassus wanted to make the match for his Olympic Auditorium.

Chermes also identified Bill King, a Louisville promoter, as offering \$15,000 or 25 per cent of the gate to Rademacher if he would meet Folley there.

Swift, hot under the collar over the draw decision, also had support from about 80 per cent of the newsmen covering the fight. Most of the reporters thought that Folley had won and generally agreed that the fight was terrible.

Swift hailed referee Frankie Carter, who voted for Machen, as a "fine citizen" but added "he sure blundered Wednesday night."

Phil Hitchcock Criticizes Norblad

Milwaukee, Ore. — Phil Hitchcock, who is opposing Rep. Walter Norblad for the Republican nomination for Congress from the first district, criticized his opponent Thursday for failure to vote on the federal aid highway bill shortly before the congressional Easter recess.

Hitchcock said it was "another evidence of the fact that we have a do-nothing absentee congressman in Washington."

Hitchcock also urged stronger efforts by the Oregon congressional delegation to promote forest access roads.

Cus, Eddie Encounter Proposed

San Francisco — If you ask me (nobody did) the best fight that could be lined up right now would be Eddie Machen vs. Gus D'Amato, Floyd Patterson's manager. It could be for the championship of the International Boxing club — D'Amato's pet peeve.

On the basis of what Machen displayed in his ill-fated bout with Zora Folley Wednesday night, Cus would be at least an 11-10 favorite.

True, Cus possibly is over the age limit, but if the boxing fathers would let him in the ring (they put Pete Rademacher in there with flailing Floyd, didn't they?) the chances are that D'Amato would talk unearner Eddie right out of tossing a punch.

As you television viewers may have noticed, there was more apologizing in the Folley-Machen bout by the two would-be gladiators than when the Japanese envoys visited the White House while Pearl Harbor was being bombed.

Alphonse and Gaston

Not that any bombs were being tossed in the ring. It was strictly a patty-cake party. An Alphonse and Gaston act: "If you don't hit me, I won't hurt you."

These two boys looked as though they had been taking lessons from Madam Lazonga. Except once when they got out of step and Folley fell to his knees. And when Machen tried to help him up, he accidentally socked poor Zora in the kisser.

Of course, if Machen was fighting D'Amato, there would be no such problem. Cus could promise Eddie that, if he took it easy, he wouldn't have to fight Patterson at all to gain the world's championship. Floyd would retire and hand the crown to Eddie on a silver platter.

This Folley may be a knock-out artist in some quarters, but the strongest punch he threw this time was a good left jab. And that was only through the first four rounds. After that he saved it for possible use at a Dixieland jamboree, where the dancing is much more strenuous than the conga at the Cow Palace.

Promoters Optimistic

But the promoters know a good thing when they see one. These guys think that Machen and Folley were so inept in their battle for a crack at the world's championship that they would have to be better the next time out.

All they have to do now is get the fans to swallow that one.

So Patterson gets an offer of \$250,000 to defend his crown against Machen who, according to San Francisco promoters, still is the "logical contender."

And Folley tops that by being offered fights in Los Angeles, Seattle and Louisville, Ky.—all with the same guy: Pete Rademacher.

But the fight filberts must like it. They paid out nearly \$100,000 to see that waltz marathon the other night.

Roy Campanella Makes Painfully Slow Progress

Glen Cove, N.Y. — They're still keeping a good man, Roy Campanella, down in the hospital here but the painfully slow progress of his battle against paralysis has failed to dampen Campy's spirits.

"His morale remains excellent and he listens to every baseball game that is broadcast," Glen Cove Community hospital announced in its latest bulletin on the condition of the Los Angeles Dodgers' star catcher Thursday.

However, the hospital had to admit that Campy has made only a little progress in the last month—the fact that "sense of feeling" now has returned to his lower abdomen, whereas the limit a month ago was the upper abdomen.

Campanella has been paralyzed since Jan. 28 when he suffered a broken neck in an auto accident.

Inflation Becoming Problem To Common Man in Indonesia

Editor's note: The worsening economic situation of the Indonesian man-in-the-street is perhaps to President Sukarno's government harder to take than the revolt in Sumatra. The following dispatch analyzes the situation.

Jakarta — Times are tough for Mohammad, an elementary school teacher, and his family of four.

Mohammad makes 1,200 rupiahs a month which is worth \$110 on the black market. But the rate to the dollar makes little difference to Mohammad. It's what the rupiah will buy that counts and that's where things are really beginning to bind.

As with most West Javaneses, the staple of Mohammad and his family is rice. It takes about four pounds of rice to feed them each day

and the cheapest he can get that amount of rice for is 13 rupiahs, about a third of his daily earnings. Last year he could get it for half that much.

Inflation a Problem

Inflation in Mohammad's country rose at a slow rate until late last year when it spurred sharply. Then came the anti-Dutch campaign, followed by the revolt in Sumatra.

With the anti-Dutch moves came the takeover of the vast Dutch shipping company K.P.M., which virtually paralyzed all inter-island shipping.

In the vast, 3,000-mile semicircle of islands, Java acts like the nozzle of a hose with streams of supplies, shooting off to Sumatra to the northwest, Borneo to the north, the Celebes and the Halmahera "Spice Islands" to the northeast and the Moluccas to the east.

For manufactured goods and food staples, the outer islands looked to Java. Most of the importing was done there and Java, traditionally an island of traders, collected on export and import duties. Suddenly, it all came to a stop.

Barter Replaces Currency

Barter trade has been replacing currency operations and has spread so widely that of 97 ports which previously paid export and import duties to the central government, only 15 are now operating.

Buying power has all but dried up. Unemployment is at a dangerous point, but as in most Asian countries, reliable figures are hard to get. There is a good deal of hoarding, more of money than of goods. "Money is easier to run with," one economist explained.

Military expenditures are skyrocketing and to make up for rising deficits, the government has resorted to the ex-

pendent of printing more money.

It is traditional at the end of the Ramadan fasting month (April 21) for the Mohammedans to buy new clothes for their families, just as Westerners buy finery for Easter.

But this year Mohammad and his family will have to go without.
