MAY DAY PARADE OFF

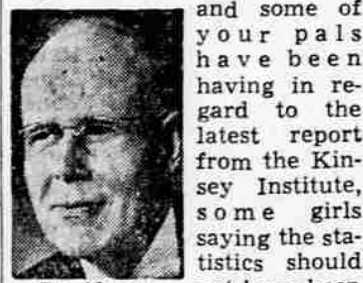

A Letter To a College Girl On the Kinsey Report

Dear Miss K: I was much interested in your letter in regard to the discussions you and some of your pals have been having in regard to the latest report from the Kinsey Institute, some girls saying the statistics should not have been published, and others wondering if the year really true and must be accepted as facts. As to Kinsey, I knew him and was devoted to him. He was a highly dedicated man, absolutely honest and truly scientific. As he lectured to students on biology, they got to asking him questions about sexual practices in men and women. He became distressed because so seldom could he give an answer based on published data. When he searched his library for information, he found that most of the writers on sex were arm-chair theorists who had no statistics. Three exceptions were the fine studies by Dr. R. L. Dickinson and Laura Beam, Katharine B. Davis, and G. V. Hamilton. These books contained much startling information, but I lay people read them and hence no big controversy was stirred up.

Kinsey looked about and found not a single university in which sex was being studied in man. Obviously, this was wrong. One of the greatest motivating forces of man cannot be ignored indefinitely. I had already protested to some scientists about this lack; I needed information with which to answer the questions asked by my patients, and I could not get it. Naturally, I was glad when Kinsey tackled the job. When he published his first statistical work, he and the publisher expected to sell perhaps a thousand copies to scientists. They were astounded when the book became a best-seller. As you know, immediately many people attacked Kinsey for writing as he did, but as he tried to show them, he hadn't intended to write a Sunday school book; all he had written was a report of what several thousand persons had said they had done. A scientist just reports what happened; he does not feel that he should apologize or be horrified or try to preach. Most laymen do not know this and hence their violent reactions. I was surprised to see how many men had had homosexual experiences, but it never occurred to me to impugn Kinsey's veracity or to attack him for what the men had done in their youth.

Samplings Said Poor

Many people then said the sampling was poor. Kinsey knew its defects and hoped, if he lived long enough, to fill in the gaps. But let us remember that these are the best data we have, and the most abundant. Let us remember, also, that in order to get fine cooperation and sensible and honest answers out of a person, he or she has to have a good intelligence and a desire to cooperate in a scientific inquiry. Millions of stupid people could hardly be used in the inquiry.

My feeling in regard to the latest report from the Kinsey laboratory as to pre-marital sexual experience and abortion is that it is the more significant because most of the women were so well-educated. If they had all been underprivileged girls from homes of poverty, people would not have needed to be so upset.

You can assure your friends that there can be no blame attached to publishing scientific data. The only sin is to refuse to publish scientific material because it is displeasing to some people. Science must continue to advance. I feel that if people cannot understand how scientists work and think, and how they report dispassionately and without emotion what they have found—then they should not be peering into scientific books.

Can Get Idea

And, still, I think your friends can get good out of this last report. They can get some idea, perhaps, of how awful it is for a single girl to find herself pregnant. In 50 years, I have talked to many such girls in the office and I know they went through hell mentally. Some seriously

considered suicide. Many tried to brazen it out and appear hard-boiled, but they were suffering, all right. With all this, let us keep in mind that Kinsey and his associates never had any idea of using their data to improve morals; they just reported what had come out when perhaps 5,000 punched cards had been run through the IBM machines.

I imagine many good people are now saying that, even if the last report of Drs. Gebhard and Pomeroy and their associates is accurate and trustworthy, it should have been suppressed because it will injure people—because it may encourage them to be "bad," and to justify their behavior by saying that since 50 per cent of men and women are sexually loose, this is normal.

My hunch is strong that human nature will continue to be the same old human nature it has always been, and not because of any encouragement from Kinsey's group. A girl who falls from grace will do so, not because of Kinsey, but because of two urgings: one from a young man, and one from her own passionate body.

Dr. Alvarez hopes his readers will understand that it would be impossible for him to answer requests for information or to attempt to diag-

nose by mail.

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Government Asserts Right To Travel

Washington—(AP)—The government asserted for the first time Thursday that Americans have a Constitutional right to travel abroad. But it argued this right may be denied in the interest of national security.

The assertion was made before the Supreme Court by U. S. Solicitor General J. Lee Rankin. The Justices heard three hours of arguments on State Department denials of passports to artist Rockwell Kent, physicist Weldon B. Dayton and psychiatrist Walter Briehl.

Rankin also argued that the State Department could deny passports solely on the basis of confidential information. In several previous passports suits the government did not concede that the Constitution guaranteed the right to travel. It argued that the Secretary of State was empowered to determine who got a passport.
