Cuba Rebels Plan To Continue Fight Despite Losses

Havana — (U-P) — Cuba's rebels were reported collecting arms and regrouping forces today in hopes of putting new life into their fading "total war" against President Fulgencio Batista's government.

Rebel sources said they will continue the fight despite the heavy losses they suffered last week. Private reports compiled over the week end indicate that at least 350 rebels were killed in the uprising that began Wednesday while army and police losses amounted to a few dozen.

Havana was generally quiet Sunday night, and the only violence reported elsewhere in the country was the killing of one rebel who fired on a bus near Camaguey.

Rebel spokesmen said the insurgents have received "new arms shipments" from unspecified sources to beef up their attacks.

Authoritative sources said the rebels were badly organized and poorly trained, making them no match for seasoned loyal troops and police in any kind of a standup fight. Castro's forces consist largely of enthusiastic but inexperienced youths.

Torrential Rains In Parts of Texas

A collision of cold and warm air masses over the Southwest sent funnel clouds spinning over Northern Oklahoma and touched off torrential rains and hail storms in parts of Texas.

The storm area Sunday night extended over most of the Southern Plains and into the Lower Mississippi Valley. Weathermen blamed the storm on a stream of warm, moist air from the Gulf flowing into the unusually cold air in the south central section of the nation.

Several funnel clouds were sighted in a line of thunderstorms over Northern Oklahoma late Sunday, but no tornadoes touched the ground. In Texas, heavy showers and hail pounded an area ranging from Austin to San Marcos. Austin was hit by .86 inch of rain in a brief eight-minute deluge along with one-half inch hail stones. At San

New York — (U-P) — Stocks pushed ahead again today in a continuation of the advance which restored more than \$1 billion to market values last week.

The rise was attributed to technical factors following the market's recent weakness. Market men are waiting to see how stocks react to first quarter earnings reports, many of which will be on the unfavorable side. They feel this will give them a clue to the market's underlying strength or weakness.

The "best friend" was Carl Chessman, who has been conducting a 10-year-battle from death row to escape the gas chamber.

The prisoners, Eugene Burgess and James Alonzo Rogers, are scheduled to die for the murder of a guard.

A C-133 cargo plane crashed in flames in the Ellendale State Forest near Georgetown, Del. The new four-engine plane, costing an estimated \$3,400,000, plunged to earth about 10 minutes after taking off from Dover Air Force Base.

Wreckage Strown

Firemen battled the flames two hours before bringing them under control. Wreckage was strewn over a quarter of a mile.

The victims were identified as Raymond R. Bern, 37, Long Beach, Calif., the pilot; Lt. Herbert T. Paisch, 25, St. Louis, Mo., co-pilot; T-Sgt. Marvin A. Aust, 29, Hays, Kan., engineer; and T-Sgt. Edward L. McKinley Jr., 33, Meridian, Miss.

Near Tacoma, Wash., three men were killed when their C-47 Air Force plane crashed during a practice landing at McChord Air Force Base. Observers said the craft cartwheeled and crashed during a landing approach and burst into flames.

Reserve Capt. Wayne F. Reed, 38, Tacoma, pilot; Reserve Capt. Cyril E. Wulmsley, 36, Shelton, Wash., and T-Sgt. Roy E. Craft, 28, Tacoma, were killed.

Jet Pilot Killed

An F-100 jet plane crashed and exploded in an alfalfa field near Blanchard, Okla., killing the pilot, Lt. Richard L. Glassberg, 24, New Rochelle, N.Y.

An Air National Guard F-4E jet fighter plummeted into Boston Harbor Sunday, but the pilot parachuted into the water and was rescued by a pleasure boat.
