Madras—The third and final generating unit has been placed in commercial operation at Portland General Electric company's Pelton hydro-electric project on the Deschutes river.

The 40,000-kilowatt unit went on the line at 7:45 p.m. Monday, two days short of two years since the construction contract was signed, according to Victor Bacon project superintendent.

Portland—The Oregon Centennial commission agreed Monday to pay \$54,682 to the architectural firm of Stewart & Richardson to design and supervise the renovation work on the Pacific International building here.

Anthony Brandenthaler, commission chairman, said the money would be saved by letting the work out on a straight fee basis rather than on a commission or percentage of the total cost of the project.

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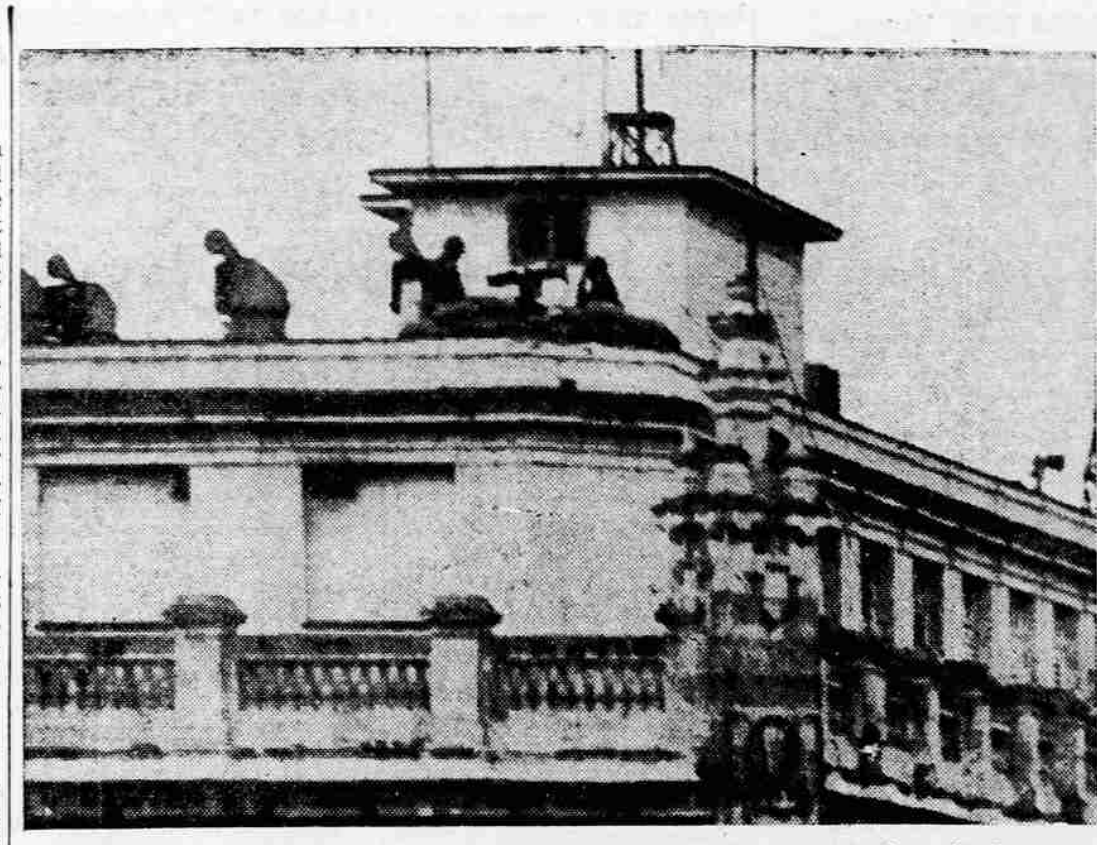

Castro Vows To 'Fight To Death'

Havana—Rebel leader Fidel Castro vowed Monday night that his followers will "fight to the death" to overthrow President Fulgencio Batista's "tyranny."

In an unprecedented broadcast over the rebel radio, Castro said the past, present and only aim of his movement is to overthrow the Batista regime.

As the rebel leader spoke, figures circulating here indicated that the 24-hour toll of Castro's six-day-old revolt would amount to about 140 dead.

More than 100 persons were reported killed in Sagua La Grande, where loyal troops battled a rebel landing force. Thirty-one persons—30 "out-
