Salem Woman Held for Murder

Salem, Ore.—Mrs. Ruth Stacy, a woman who "can't stand cruelty to animals," was being held here today on a murder charge growing out of a dispute over a pet collie.

Mrs. Stacy, 46, told Marion County Deputy Sheriff Denver Young that her husband, Gail, was beating one of her pet dogs Tuesday night and she told him "if I had a gun I'd shoot you."

She said her husband got a .22 caliber rifle, handed it to her and said "go ahead, shoot."

One shot was fired, hitting Stacy, 52, in the stomach. He died almost instantly.

Mrs. Stacy, who owns a pet schipperke dog and a 10-year-old collie told the sheriff the collie had torn up a paper carton which enraged her husband. She said she started beating the animal with a stick.

After the shooting, she called a neighbor, Dr. Ellwood Page, who telephoned the sheriff.

In her statement to officers, Mrs. Stacy said: "One thing I can't stand is cruelty to animals."

Back Stairs: Ike Eyes Augusta Again

Washington — Back stairs at the White House:

President Eisenhower hopes to spend another week end at the Augusta, Ga., National Golf Club this spring, according to White House aides. He curtailed his usual Easter vacation of a week or 10 days there to three days last week end to return to work here on the recession and international problems.

If he succeeds in getting back to Augusta, it probably will be later this month. But it could be as late as mid-May.

There appears to be little chance that it will be any later because some of the greens on the Augusta National are "killed" then for the summer.

Only one of Eisenhower's 23 visits to Augusta has been in May. It was in 1949 and was one of the four times he was there before he was elected President. He stopped off there en route back from Key West, Fla., and completed his convalescence from a digestive ailment he suffered here while back on temporary duty at the Pentagon.

Eisenhower is by no means

the first President to visit Augusta. George Washington visited there in 1791. Others were James Monroe in 1819, William McKinley in 1898, William Howard Taft on several occasions and Warren G. Harding in 1923. Woodrow Wilson lived there as a boy and came back for a visit in 1912 before he was nominated for President.

The President—to the delight of his personal physician, Maj. Gen. Howard McC. Snyder—is walking more and using an electric cart less on the golf course. The President started using an electric cart

to go around the links after he recovered from his heart attack in 1955. But now he rides the cart only on the hilly fairways. It works out that he just about splits the walking and riding distances on the three golf courses he has played most in recent weeks—Augusta, Gettysburg, and Thomasville, Ga.

The President left one boy overjoyed at Augusta last week end. Five-year-old Bobby Cousins had been begging his Army captain father to bring him from nearby Camp Gordon so he could see the President as he got on his plane. Bobby, who was perched on his dad's shoulder alongside the steps leading

up to the plane's cabin, not only got a good look at Eisenhower. The President also gave the lad a friendly hair tousle and a smiling "How are you, son?"

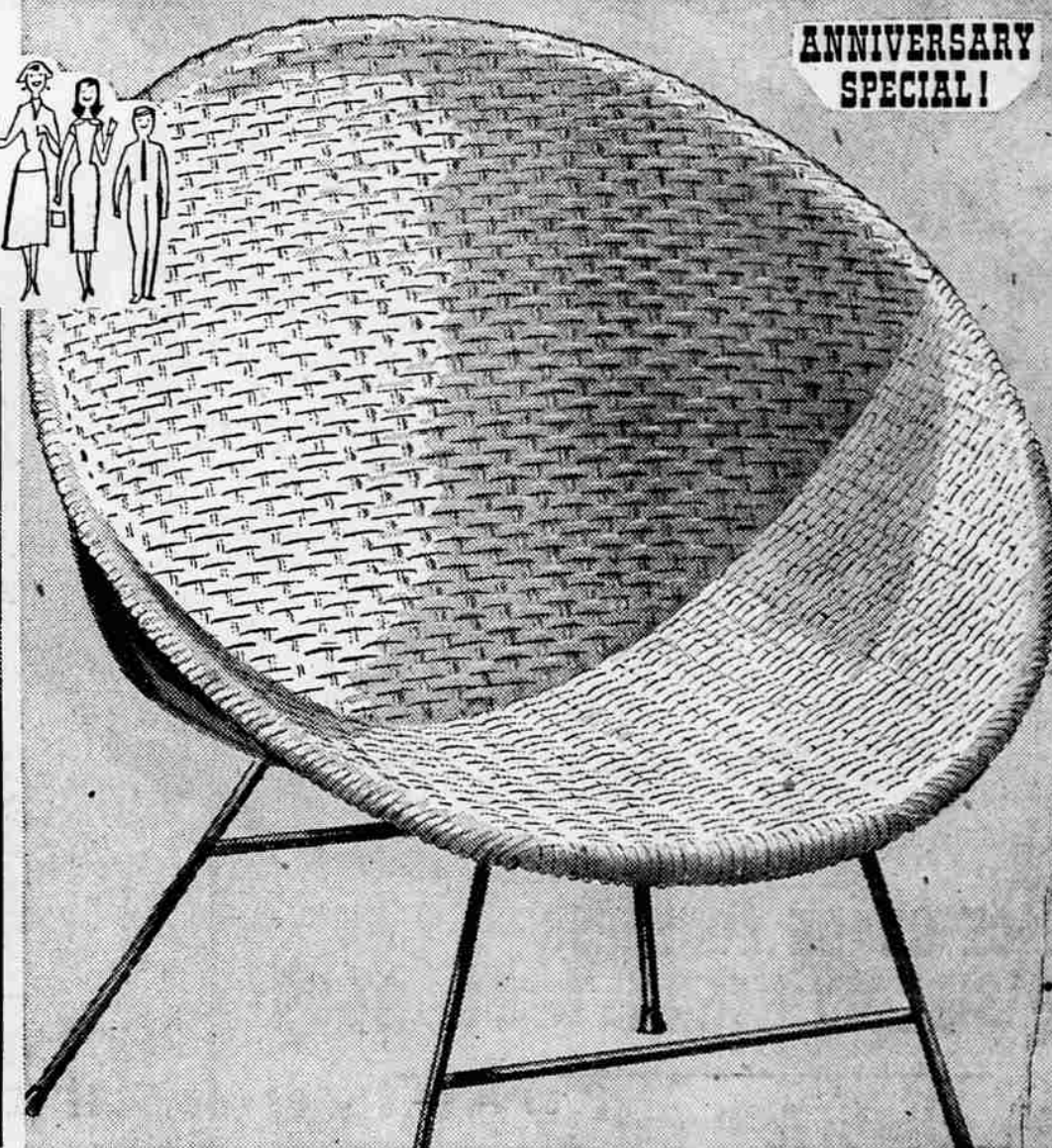

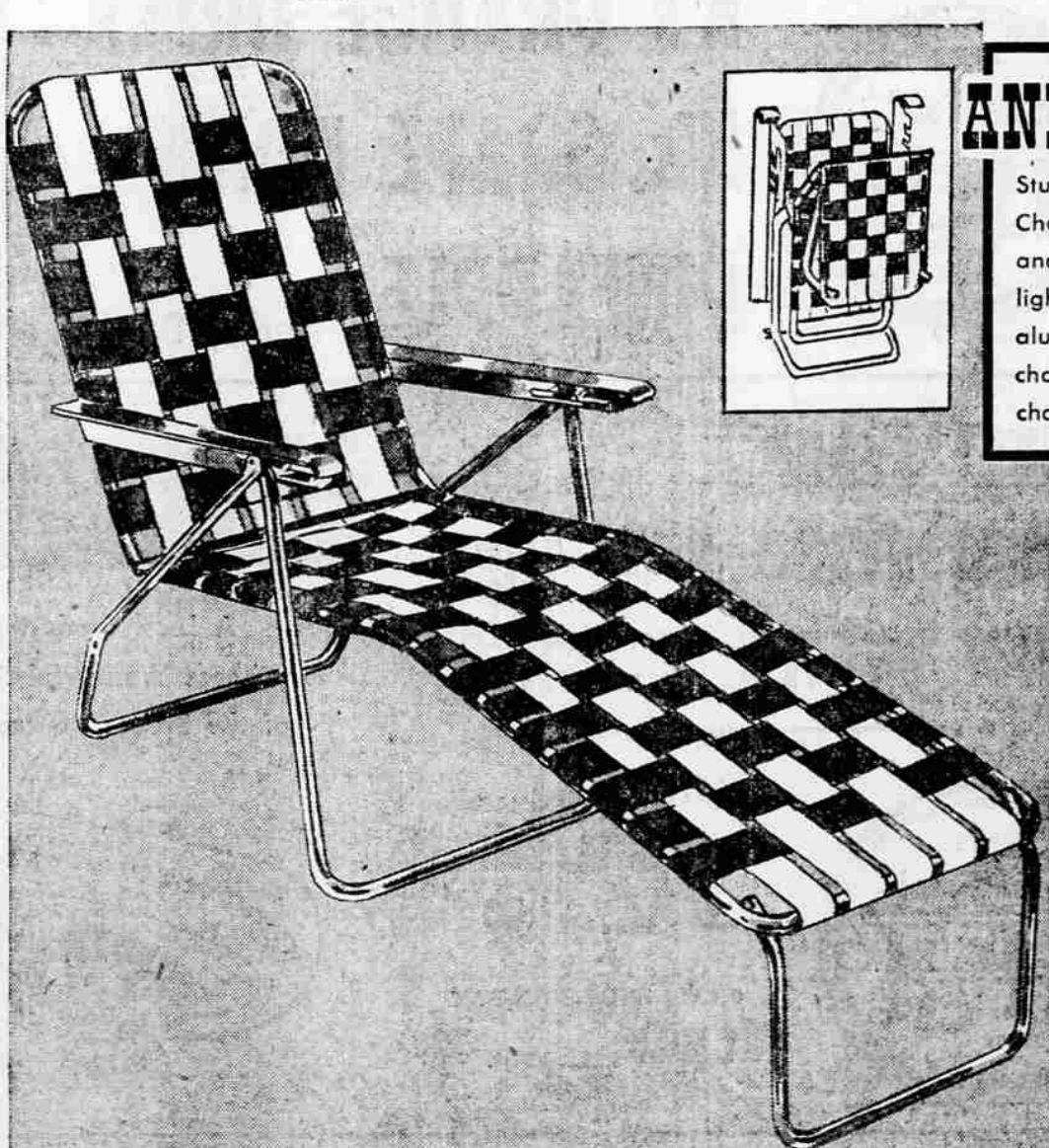
