First Gas Station Run By C. Furnas Who Died Tuesday

Charles C. Furnas, ex-mayor of Medford who died here Tuesday, established the first automobile service station in this city in December, 1918.

The Medford Service station, as the enterprise was known, was erected by Mr. Furnas at Main st. and Riverside ave. where the then two-way Highway 99 passed through Medford. The tire sales and service part of the firm's operation was conducted in the adjoining building which now houses Wainwright's Pharmacy.

Associated with Mr. Furnas in the pioneer service station was Paul McDonald, widely known in civic and American Legion circles in Medford. Fred Purdin, who joined the Medford Service station staff in 1924, is now connected with the Medford Tire Service, the succeeding concern, at 123 South Riverside ave.

Before coming to this city 40 years ago, Charles Furnas was active in business in Klamath Falls and established the first automobile service station in that city.

Services for Mr. Furnas will be held Friday at 10:30 a.m. at the Perl Funeral home.

Josephine Levy \$235,845 For School Purposes

Grants Pass — Josephine county will levy \$235,845.40 for school purposes during the coming fiscal year, in a double-purpose move to ease school finance problems and to retain its own tax base, the county court announced this week.

In common with most counties which receive substantial sums from federal forest lands, Josephine county ordinarily has sufficient income to operate without levying a tax. But to retain its tax base, each third year it must levy a tax equivalent to the base.

This year, the levy will be made, the funds turned over to the Grants Pass and county unit school districts, and their own taxes will be reduced by a like amount.

The plan will neither raise the general level of taxation, nor will it reduce it. The amounts to the school districts was determined by increasing the usual county payment to the districts of \$10 per census child to \$25.90.

A similar plan has been under consideration in Jackson county, according to sources close to the county administration. No announcement of such a plan has been made, pending the outcome of the election May 16 on approval of a new tax base for Jackson county.

Treatment Given; Poisoning Likely

Ashland — Debra Rhoads, 3 1/2, and her brother, Michael, 2 1/2, children of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Rhoads, Green Springs summit, Ashland, were discharged from Ashland General hospital this morning after treatment for probable poisoning.

Sheriff's deputies reported today that they were called by the Ashland hospital Wednesday afternoon to report "at the youngsters had become ill while playing at their home."

Deputies, who made an investigation at the residence, said they found "several possibilities" as to what the two might have swallowed. Reports from the physician and laboratory technician indicated they probably drank some bleach, detergent or borax, officers said.
