

Public Hearing Announced By Council For Annexation

The Medford city council set May 15 as a public hearing for annexation of one acre of land, took no action on another and approved two others which will be placed on the ballot on May 16.

A public hearing for Douglas addition No. 1 will be held for six lots on May 15. The developer, W. Benton Smith, has installed sewer and water mains, concrete curbs and gutters in the area which meets city requirements, according to city officials.

The council took no action on annexation of a section of land, about 45 acres in area, southeast of the intersection of Highway 99 and 62. Council members said they had established a policy to notify residents of that section if annexation is considered.

The council did vote annexation of the Phipps tract, consisting of about 150 acres in Southeast Medford, and for a section of land, about 145 acres, northeast of the Highway 99 and Stewart ave. intersection.

Under state law the latter two sections can be annexed to the city without consent of residents in the area but with the consent of a majority of voters in the present city limits.

Robert A. Duff, city manager, said the need for proper zoning, building code, guidance on subdivisions and a reasonable pattern of development prompted the action by the city on the "islands."

Plans and specifications for three paving projects in the Earhart Park subdivision and for one sanitary sewer project to serve the new Hoover school were also approved by the council last night.

Plans for paving of Kennett st., between Court st. and Riverside ave., and for paving Beatty st., between Kennett st. and McAndrews rd., were deferred by the council until a water main petition for the area could be secured.

Paving petitions from 80 per cent of the property owners in both areas had been received.

Plans and specifications for paving of Eastwood drive, Eureka circle and Fortune drive in the Earhart Park subdivision were approved. The paving will be done to city standards at the expense of the developers of the projects, city officials said.

The sanitary sewer project will serve the new Hoover elementary school now under construction and several residents in the area. The majority of property owners have signed for the project, according to city officials.

In other action the renewing of the airport restaurant lease was approved by the council for the same rate as last year. Hours of operation for the firm were set at 6:30 a.m. to 7 p.m.

A hearing on a variance of set-back line for a proposed school building on Melrose ave., between Jasper and Whitman sts., was called for the May 15 meeting. The Medford school system plans construction of an industrial arts building at the location and would need to use all available space, according to officials.

A supplement, consisting of five additional planned lights, was added to the street light schedule approved by the April 3 council meeting. The additional annual cost to the city will be \$190.08.

Approval of moving a bus loading zone from the alley on South Front st., between Main and Eighth sts., was made by the council to the last two parking spaces north of Eighth st. on Front st.

City Manager Robert A. Duff reported the installation of two parking meters on South Central ave., near 10th st. He also announced the installation of a parking meter on South Grape st., near Sixth st.

Grants Application
The council granted Otto's tavern, 39 South Front st., an application for a package, class B license. The license had been denied at the April 3 meeting. Reconsideration of the license had been requested by Charles B. and Marjorie Broomfield, who recently purchased the establishment.

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Liquor Regulations Defined For College

Ashtland—Students of Southern Oregon college cannot be prohibited from being patrons of business firms dealing in alcoholic beverages near the college nor can business men who meet requirements be denied liquor licenses though their establishments are close to the college, Hugh Simpson, public relations director of the college, said today.

The statement was made in connection with a meeting of the Ashtland city council held Tuesday night when City Attorney Harry Skerry told council members that a partial abolition of new liquor licenses in the city was not, in his view, a legal feasibility.

Results From Meeting
The meeting was the result of a request by Dr. Elmo Stevenson, SOC president, to the council asking that a previous resolution on a stand against new liquor licenses in the college area, be put into strict form and made into a resolution.

Attorney Skerry pointed out to the council two alternatives: Absolute prohibition of all licenses or allowing licenses in all sectors of the city. He cited a recent attorney general ruling that the Oregon liquor control commission could not arbitrarily refuse licensing establishments around the University of Oregon at Eugene in a similar case, and he felt implication similarly prohibited city action; and reinforced his own personal view that the law did not permit such partial prohibition.

One of the council directed a question as to whether the city could institute partial prohibition by a city-wide ballot. The attorney stated he did not believe this is possible but would check into the matter and report at the next meeting.

Only Lots Sold In Subdivision
Lots in the newly opened Earhart Park subdivision in south Medford near Sacred Heart hospital are for purchase to individuals or contractors who want to build homes, it was pointed out today by officers of the Earhart Park company.

The company members do not build and sell homes, and only deal in the sale of lots for those who want to build homes, according to an announcement made today.

Boundaries of the subdivision include both city and county property. Earhart Park, a recreational area, is included in the subdivision. The land is located south of Sacred Heart hospital and extends to Bear creek, and is west of the IOOF cemetery. Chester Hubbard and Bruce Bauer, Medford, are developers of the new subdivision comprising nearly 100 lots.

All three women suffered lacerations and possible chest and internal injuries. The crash occurred when a southbound car driven by Mrs. Aldrich skidded on rain slick pavement and spun around and into the northbound lane of traffic where it collided with the Naylor car.

Portland — A man who leaped to his death from the St. Johns bridge here Thursday was identified as Fred J. Drucker, about 82, the coroner's office reported.

Cholera Epidemic Spreading in India
Calcutta, India — The Indian Medical Association said today it will raise a volunteer corps to help fight spreading cholera epidemic which killed at least 124 persons in 24 hours.

Three-hundred new cases of the disease were reported in Calcutta Thursday and municipal ambulances could not keep up with the calls for service.

Russia Believed Planning for Moon
Washington — Some U. S. officials are betting Moscow is winding up preparations for a spectacular new scientific experiment in outer space, possibly a rocket shot at the moon.

These officials believe the Soviets will launch their next outer space test before May 1, the traditional international workers day.

There are some indications the Soviets have run into trouble with the outer space program after getting off to a flying start. Best evidence all is not well was seen in a Soviet newspaper a few days ago. An article on earth satellites referred to "difficulties" but gave no details.

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Steelhead Proposal Opposed

Portland — The Oregon fish commission said in a statement today it failed to detect "any semblance of conservation involved in making steelhead a game fish in Oregon."

The Commission, in announcing its official opposition to proposals to make steelhead a game fish, said it viewed "with particular disfavor and alarm a movement currently under way to place the steelhead issue on the November ballot."

The statement said that enactment of the proposal would result in either a "tremendous waste of money" or complete abolition of commercial fishing in the Columbia river.

Court Ruling on TV Case Commended
Washington — House investigators today commended a court ruling which returned a controversial Miami television case to the Federal Communications Commission for a full-dress review of charges "influence" swayed the FCC's original award.

Rep. Orin Harris (D-Ark.), chairman of a House commerce subcommittee that investigated the award of TV Channel 10, and Rep. John B. Bennett (R-Mich.), a subcommittee member, agreed the Court of Appeals here acted properly.

The court Thursday granted the FCC's March 13 request to reconsider the case in light of "significant new information" turned up by the subcommittee.

In urging the court action, the FCC noted charges that former Commissioner Richard A. Mack, who quit under fire, let money and friends sway his vote. It said there was reason to believe Mack should have disqualified himself.

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Jeff Cops Track Tiff

Jefferson "outscored" Lincoln 106 1/3 to 87 2/3 yesterday in a city grade school track meet at the high school stadium.

Jeff took only one division, Class B, but piled up a 50 to 16 margin in that competition and claimed also the medley relay. Lincoln won Class A 36 2/3 to 33 1/3 and Class C 35 to 23.

Kimball of Lincoln smashed the only record with 38 feet 9 1/2 inches in the Class A shot put.

Barnes of Jefferson was an A triple winner with triumphs in the 16 and 150-yard dashes and the broad jump. Towns won the high jump and pole vault for Jeff.

Hinman took the 60, 150, baseball throw and shot put and Wood the broad and high jumps and pole vault as Jefferson gained first in all Class B events except the relay. Hermant of Lincoln took both dashes in Class C.
