How To Ruin a Child

Many and many a mother I have watched a mother treating a child in ways that I thought were foolish. I have often wondered if she could have done any better if she were some big Foundation had offered her \$20,000 for a project to see if she could ruin the child, and bring him up as either a hypochondriac or a spoiled brat. So far as I could see she couldn't be going at the job with any more determination and skill if she were being paid for it.

I find this idea in a book by Dr. George M. Lott, a psychiatrist. It is "The Story of Human Emotions" (Philosophical Library). On page 148, he says, "It might be valuable to list directions for making a child grow up with the maximum of handicaps and undesirable character traits."

I remember a physician friend of mine who had a pretty and cute, but badly spoiled daughter. As the mother said to me, "The child must often be puzzled because sometimes when she is a little devil her father laughs and thinks she is wonderfully cute. The next time she tries the same thing, he loses his temper and gives her a good spanking. Sometimes when he tells her to do something and she looks at him contemptuously and walks off, he doesn't do anything; and another time, when he is in another mood, he grabs her and punishes her severely."

The child who is likely to grow up well-controlled is the one who, early in life discovers that when a parent gives an order or says "No," it is meant, and disobedience will always bring immediate punishment.

But, as Dr. Lott goes on to say, it is very bad, also, for a child when the parents show little but harshness and exasperated annoyance. It is bad to bring up a child always starved for affection. I feel sorry for the mother who says, "Doctor, you must do something for me; I'm worried; I'm getting so nervous and irritable I'm screaming at my children and spanking them before I know what I am doing."

Child Would Eat

Dr. Lott goes on to say how wrong it is to be constantly urging a child to eat, especially when the mother shows that she is much distressed over the failure of the child to down all of his food. This sort of thing makes each meal a battle. So often a child would eat if only the mother would leave him alone and pay no attention. Let him go without food for a day or two, and he'll get hungry and will start eating. Hundreds of thousands of children have an appetite which varies greatly from day to day. A mother ought to know this, and accept it; she shouldn't worry about it.

A mother should permit her child to put on his clothes when he says he wants to do it by himself. It is best to show confidence in his ability to do things, and to show pride in what he does. One of the worst things a mother can do is to talk critically about her youngster's failings in front of other people. Another bad thing for a child

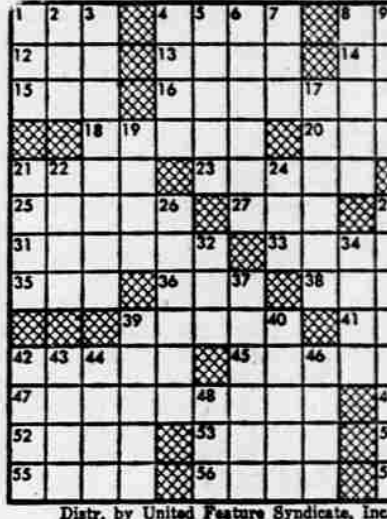
