Home of Future May Have Atmosphere Dial To Provide Proper Attitude

New York — Will the home of the future be underground? Will you be able to sit in your living room and dial the kind of home atmosphere that will keep mama and papa from quarreling? Will we have furniture that is charged to repel dust?

These are not idle speculations. They are solid thoughts from a man whose job is to try to peer into the scientific future. He's Dr. Finn Larsen, research director for Minneapolis-Honeywell, who has 140 scientists and engineers on his staff.

Use of Sun's Energy

In his long-range projections, he underlines the assertion that the sun's energy must come into usage.

"The entire U.S. supply of gas and oil will be exhausted in 25 to 30 years if the use keeps increasing at the present rate," he said. The world supply probably will last 10 years longer than that. With oil and gas out of the picture, solar energy must become important at an increasing rate—and we do know how to apply it."

About one-third of the total energy used in the United States is for heating, Larsen said. He believes the sun's energy will be most broadly used for home heating. The U.S. coal supply, incidentally, is expected to last for another 100 years.

As for home atmosphere: "The time ought to come when you can control the moods and attitudes of a family—dial the kind of atmosphere that makes people feel well

enough so that they don't quarrel. We want to control completely the indoor climate. Get-Up-And-Go Climate

"If a housewife wanted to whiz through a morning's work, she could get the proper cool mountain air with pine scent. For a drowsy afternoon, she could have warm and salty seashore breezes, with ultra-violet rays for a suntan," he said.

As for dustless furniture, he feels the dust in the air and the coating of furniture

both could be negatively charged. The furniture would repel the dust, which would be disposed of in an electronic air cleanser.

New Office Set By Coast Guard

Reynolds Starts Power Reduction

Troutdale, Ore. — The Reynolds Metals company said Wednesday that its plants at Troutdale and Longview, Wash., had started gradual reduction of power input to aluminum reduction cells.

Reynolds said that by agreement with the Bonneville Power Administration, its interruptible power load would be decreased slightly each day until about May 1.

The company said that employee vacations would be rescheduled to balance manpower requirements and jobs. The company said that without this plan, a number of jobs would be immediately affected by the power reduction. Several men will start their vacations next Monday.

Motive Sought for Slaying of Man

Portland — The state seeks to prove that Lee Parker, 31, had motives for the slaying of Robert Elmus Holloway, 40, whose body was found in a well near Veronia last December.

Parker is on trial here for first degree murder in connection with Holloway's death. A jury was selected after two days.

Prosecutor Oscar Howlett said he would prove Parker had multiple motives for the slaying. The defense said in its opening arguments that the state does not know how Holloway met his death.

Also charged in connection with the death is Harold Keith, Veronia, who will be tried separately.

Top Exhibits Set For Science Fairs

Corvallis — Nearly 1,000 top exhibits from 27 regional science fairs in Oregon this year will be entered for state judging and exhibit April 20 to 26 at the Oregon State college coliseum. This is the annual Northwest Science Exposition.

Some 42,000 elementary and junior and senior high school students prepared exhibits this year for school science fairs across the state. Winners in school fairs qualified for regional shows, and regional winners for the exposition.

Judging will take place Sunday night, April 20, and first place winners in the four grade divisions—elementary, intermediate, junior high, and senior high—will be announced Monday. Exhibits will be open to the public Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.

The awards dinner at which sweepstakes winners will be honored is scheduled Friday night. College scholarships, scientific books, and other prizes await the top winners.

The science fairs are sponsored by the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry. Douglas Huegli is museum director and E. Michael O'Callahan is in charge of the science fair program, which has won national recognition for numbers participating and quality of exhibits.

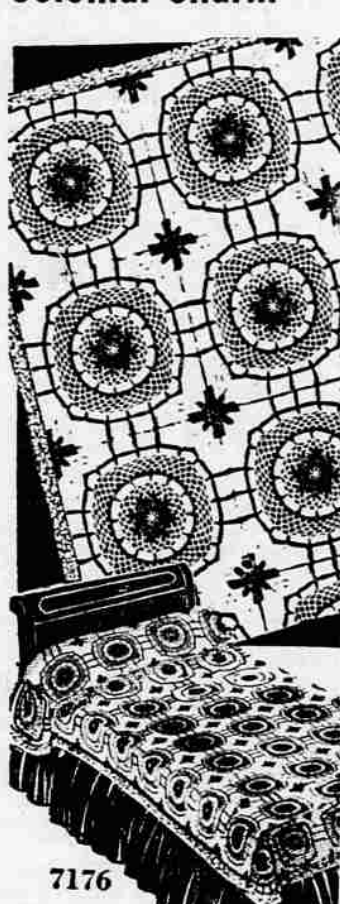
GE Stitches

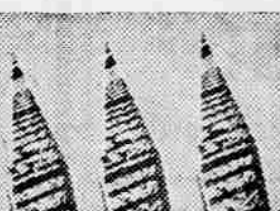
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
