Eugene — The University of Oregon golf team Friday defeated Oregon State, 21-6, as the Ducks reach for their 10th consecutive Northern Division golf championship.

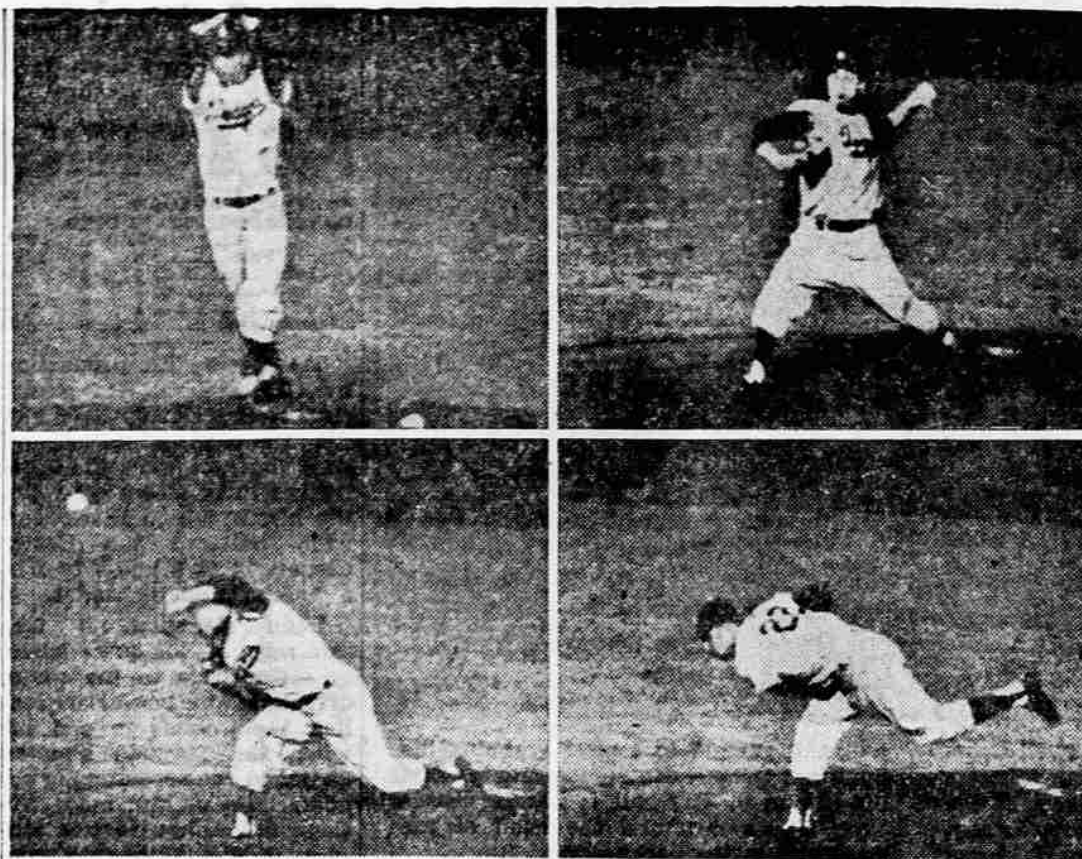

Andy Carey and Gil McDougald homered for the Yankees, who scored their decisive run in the eighth on a single by Yogi Berra and Bill Skowron's double.

The Detroit Tigers collected 19 hits in rolling to a 9-1 victory over the Cleveland Indians. Paul Foytack, also nursing a heavy cold, limited the Indians to six singles, fanned seven and issued only two walks. Frank Bolling, Billy Martin, Reno Bertoia and Harvey Kuenn paced the Detroit attack with three hits each.

A home run by Roy Sievers and a run-producing single by Ed Fitzgerald in the ninth inning carried the Washington Senators to a 4-3 victory over the Boston Red Sox. Ted Williams made his first appearance of the season for the Red Sox and went hitless in two official times at bat. Jackie Jensen homered for Boston.

Southern Calif. Posts Meet Win
Berkeley, Calif. — Little Max Truett set a new national intercollegiate record in the two-mile run Saturday with a clocking of 8:54.8 as Southern California crushed California, 91 1/2-39 1/2, in a dual track and field meet.

Running half a lap ahead of three competitors most of the way, Truett eclipsed his former mark of 8:55 flat set in a dual meet last year with Occidental college.

The national AAU record for this event is 8:49.6 held by Horace Ashenfelter.

Coach Jess Mortenson's Trojan athletes took 12 of 15 first places in the one-sided meet.

Furyvan Breezes Into Race Win
Albany, Calif. — Furyvan, who finished ahead of the popular Silky Sullivan in his last race, wore down the favored Prize Host in the stretch Saturday to win the \$25,000 Oakland Handicap at Golden Gate Fields today.

New Squaw Lake Agreement By Game Commission, Harrs

Squaw Lakes in the upper Applegate area will be open April 26 for the lake trout season, according to joint announcement by Mr. and Mrs. Bert Harre, property owners, and Cole Rivers, field agent for the Oregon game commission.

Negotiations have been renewed between the commission and the Harrs to solve problems regarding public access to the lakes. Until the two parties can come to a satisfactory agreement, the lakes will remain available to anglers under previous arrangements.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Mitchell will manage the camp grounds, parking facilities and boats.

Not Workable
The property around the two lakes is privately owned. Since 1950, the public's access to the waters has been possible through provisions of a legal agreement between the Harrs and the commission.

Under present conditions, the existing agreement is no longer workable, but it will remain in effect until better arrangements can be made.

Rivers warned that the original agreement provides for free parking of only 25 cars and that late arriving parties may be charged for parking in the private camp grounds.

The April 26 opening of trout season applies only to lakes in western Oregon. Streams and tributaries will not open until May 24.

Harney Leading Derby Golf Tilt
Louisville, Ky. — Calm Paul Harney weathered wind, rain and a late threat by South Africa's Gary Player Saturday to grab the lead with a 203 after the third round in the Kentucky Derby Open golf tournament.

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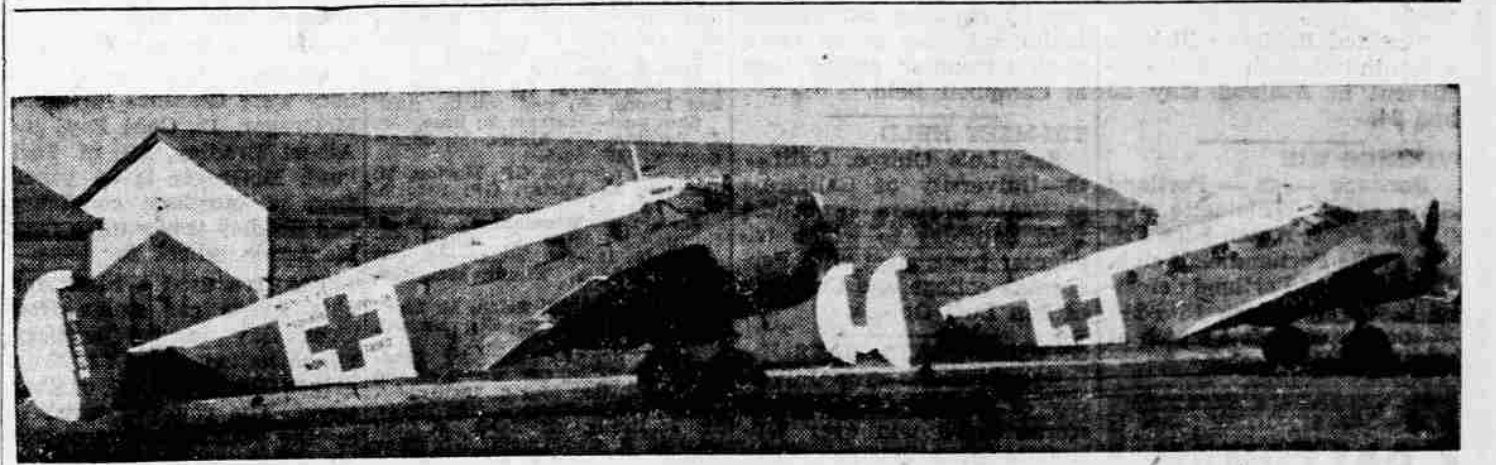
