Hubbard Stores Mark 74th Year Serving Valley

Hubbard Brothers hardware store and Hubbard Wray company, farm implement dealer, are celebrating their 74th anniversary here as two of the oldest businesses in Medford.

The first were started 3 1/2 decades ago by Fortunatus Hubbard. Since that time the firm has always been owned and operated by the Hubbards.

The stores have continued to grow with the Rogue Valley.

The founder, Fortunatus Hubbard, was a personal friend of John Deere, who established the John Deere Implement company. Both lived in Illinois then. Hubbard brothers store is the oldest continuous John Deere dealer west of the Mississippi according to records of the John Deere company. It is also one of the oldest business firms in this part of the country.

Moves To Medford

Soon after establishing the implement firm, Fortunatus moved it from Jacksonville, rented a lot at Central ave. and Main sts., and set up business. In 1885 he purchased the present location on which there was a frame building housing a saloon and general store.

First load of farm machinery into the Rogue Valley arrived in early 1883, according to the Hubbards' records. The machinery was shipped for to Sacramento, Calif., by John Deere, personally, and the senior Hubbard and a crew of hired men brought it from there by wagons in three trips. The first load was taken to Jacksonville and the other two to Medford, then known as Middleford.

In 1933 the firm bought the building next to the present store. In 1934 the two buildings were joined. In 1935 Hubbard Wray company which handles farm implements, was established, located in the back part of the present store.

Public Power Men Back Up R.E.A.

Spokane — Adoption of resolutions and election of officers Friday concluded the Pacific Northwest Public Power association convention here.

Vincent M. Cleveland, Vancouver, Wash., manager of the Clark County Public Utility district, was named president. Iven Laird, director of Coos - Curry Electric Cooperative in Oregon, was elected vice president and Ed Cooney, Coville County PUD board chairman, was reelected treasurer.

The 11 resolutions adopted included one asking authorization of a two-year study of multiple purpose dam developments on the middle Snake river. Other resolutions opposed abolishing the Rural Electrification administration, opposed a Washington state initiative limiting to 25 feet the height of dams on some Columbia river tributaries, and another opposing the voluntary unionism initiative 202.

Atomic Sub Chief Says Schools Poor

New York — Rear Adm. Hyman G. Rickover, the engineer who supervised the development of the first atomic submarine, said Saturday professional education in the United States is hampered by the inefficiency of our public and secondary schools.

In a blistering attack on the doctrine of "progressive" education, Rickover said the educational theory of John Dewey must be rejected because it is a proven failure. Rickover enlarged on statements he made Friday in Washington before a house committee.

"The assertion that progressive education prepares the child for life and that it

does this better than a traditional education has simply not been borne out by experience," Rickover said in a speech prepared for delivery at the inauguration of Dr. Ernst Weber as president of the Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute.

Education Vital
He said the efficiency of a nation's educational system "has become as vital an element for national progress—perhaps even for survival—as its industrial and military strength."

"Our professional schools are not to blame for our chronic shortage of able professional people," he said. "They have a clear-cut purpose and must meet definite standards set by state licensing requirements or by professional associations. Most of them are efficient and require no more time to turn out professionals than similar schools abroad."

But public and secondary schools waste the student's time and "delay preparations of the student for entry upon professional study far beyond the time when his European contemporary is ready to begin such study," he said.

Real Study Delayed
"The time when pupils come to grips with real study has for years been progressively delayed. Each year the American child drops a bit further behind his contemporaries abroad. He still cannot spell his own language, when abroad, children of his own age are already deep in serious literature and are carrying one or more foreign languages, besides heavier schedules in mathematics, sciences, and history."

Rickover said teachers colleges are too intent on teaching "tricks of the trade that benefit no one but professors who teach education courses." What is needed, he said, is less study devoted to methods of teaching and more to the subjects to be taught.

Many Building Codes Said Out Of Date

Portland — Nels Severin, president of the National Association of Home Builders, told delegates at the annual Pacific Northwest convention of the NAHB meeting here Friday that home building codes in most American cities are out-of-date, obsolete, antiquated and have no provisions for new home designs and construction.

He said some U. S. city building codes are 30 to 40 years old. They restrict new ideas of design and construction, he said, thus handicapping the home builder because of the cost.

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Japanese Demonstrate On Nuclear Tests

Tokyo — A mass-rally of some 6,000 anti-nuclear Japanese demonstrators in Tokyo demanded Saturday that the United States and Britain suspend nuclear tests immediately.

It also demanded that the U. S. and Britain conclude an agreement with the Soviet Union banning nuclear tests explosions.
