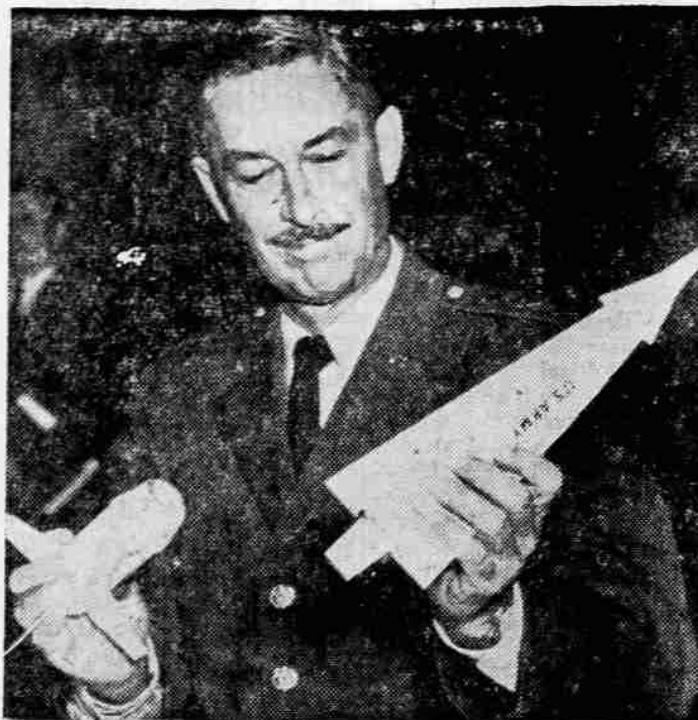

115 Diseases Listed In County Last Week

A total of 115 communicable diseases was reported to the Jackson county health department for the week ending April 18.

Forty-seven of the cases were mumps, including 17 in Medford; 15, Central Point; 12, Ashland; 2, Jacksonville; and 1 Butte Falls.

Of the 25 cases of German measles reported, 18 were in Central Point; 2, Medford, Ashland and Shady Cove; and 1, Trail.

Eleven cases of measles were reported in Medford; 3, Central Point; and 1 each in Ashland and Eagle Point.

Influenza included 6 in Medford and 2 each in Phoenix and Jacksonville; chicken pox 4 in Central Point and 2 in Medford; whooping cough, 3 in Eagle Point; scalp ringworm, 1 in Phoenix; pneumonia, 1 each in Central Point and Ashland; strep throat, 1 in Prospect; scarlet fever, 2 in Medford; and impetigo, 1 each in Central Point and Shady Cove.

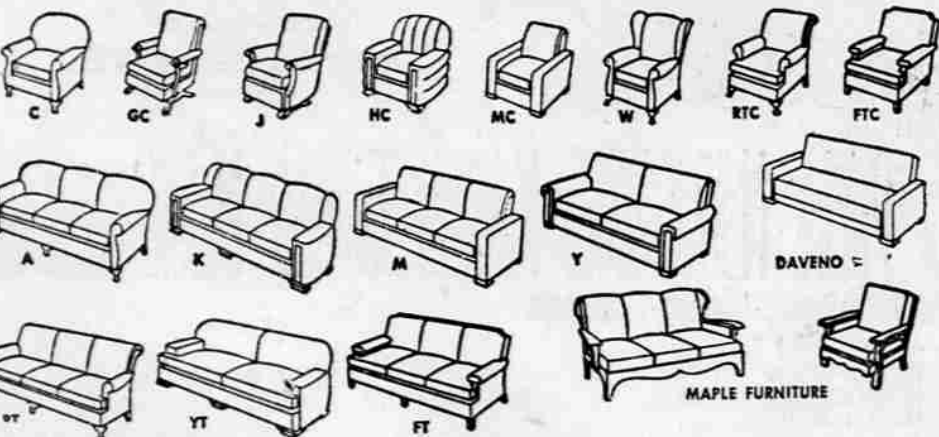
