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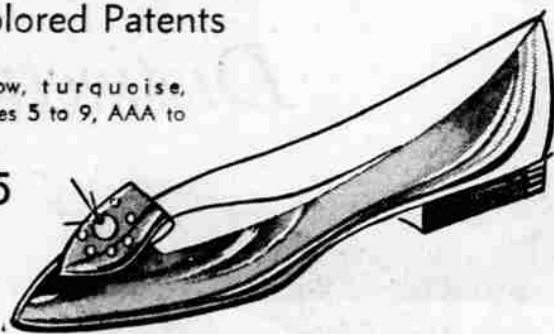
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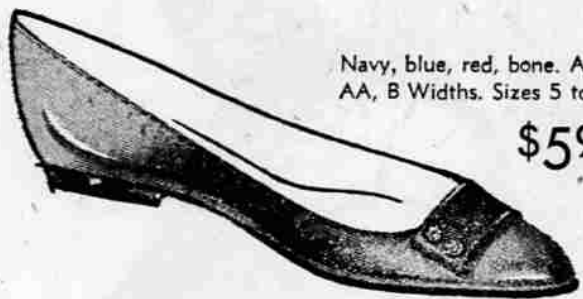
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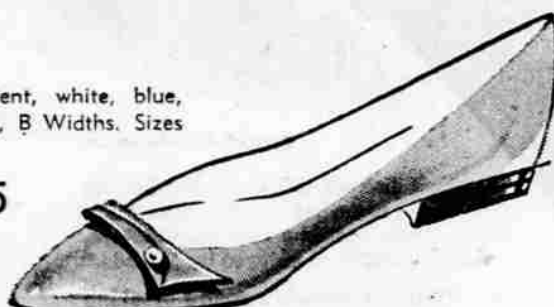
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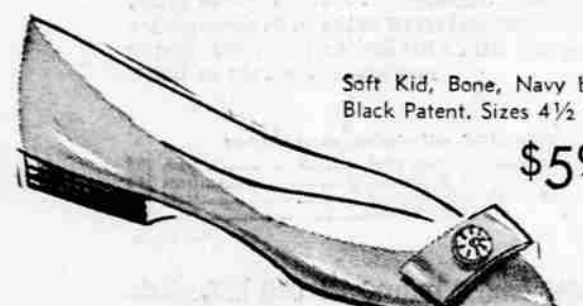
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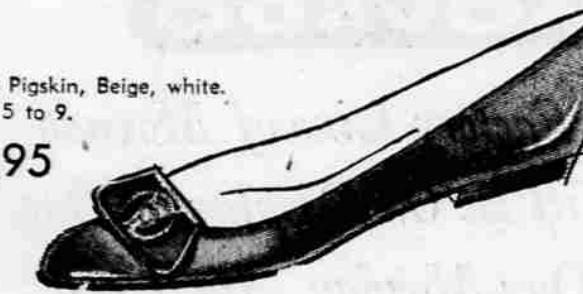
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Gardeners Plan District Session

The award was given for his work in establishing two schools for retarded children in the county.

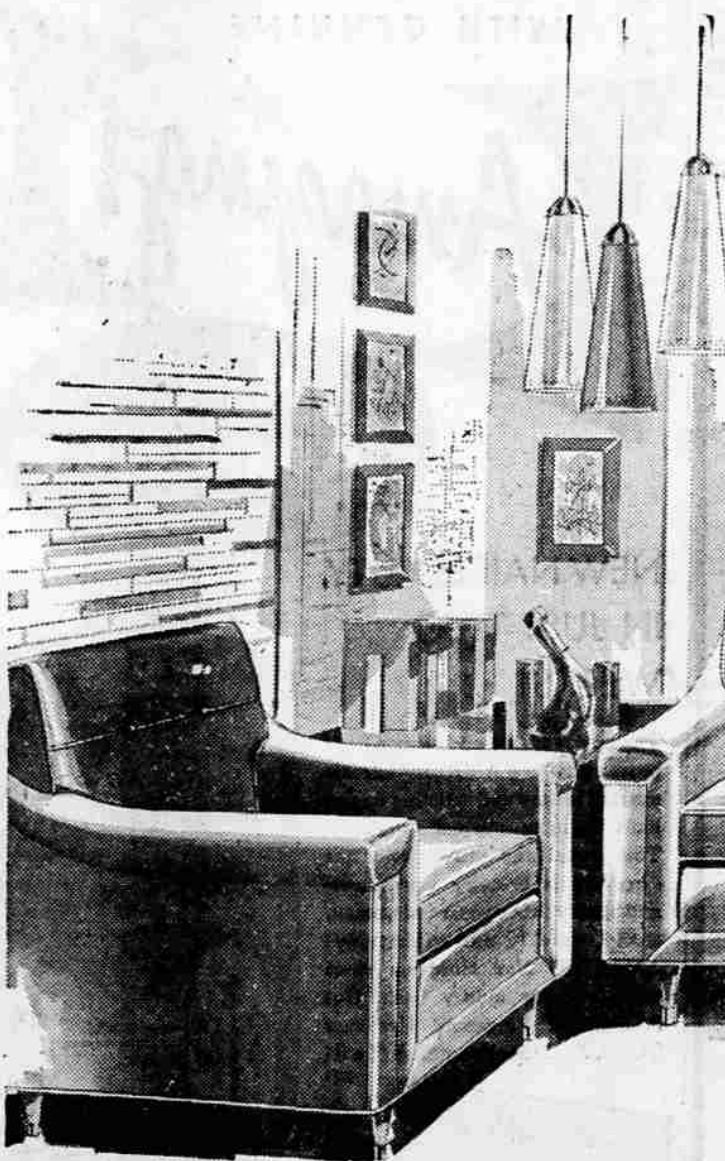

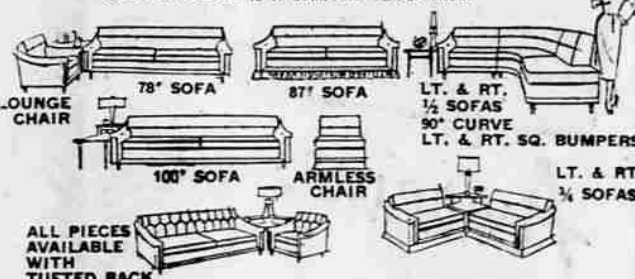
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
