Missing Scouts Back To Safety

Vancouver, Wash. — Six Boy Scouts from Vancouver missing since Saturday in rugged Gifford Pinchot National forest northeast of here were found by searchers in foothills about 60 miles northeast of here late Monday.

The youths, ages 14 to 17, were in "very good condition considering their ordeal," according to Sheriff's Deputy Harry Winters.

The boys were returned to their homes. They were Pat Kelly, 17; Doug Alling, 14; Bruce Alling, 16; Leonard Gordon, 15; Norman Smith, 14, and Phil Morris, 14.

The scouts, from Vancouver Explorer Post No. 525, said they hiked through rugged terrain Saturday but failed to arrive at their meeting point because they were let out of a car six miles further into the rugged forest than had been planned.

Kelly, leader of the group, said they had one two-man mountain tent and took turns under it for protection from rain. Two had sleeping bags.

Kelly said they hiked all day Sunday and camped again that night. Monday morning they found Cooks Cabin trail but took a wrong turn and hiked down to Canyon Creek road where the search party located them.

The Scouts wound up about four miles from the point where they had started, Winters said.

Russia Plans To Re-Educate U.S.

Moscow — Premier Nikita Khrushchev said Monday night Russia plans to "re-educate" the United States to communism.

The retraining will start after communism conquers capitalism in peaceful competition, he said.

The Soviet leader addressed his off-the-cuff remarks to U.S. Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson at a reception in the Polish Embassy. The reception honored the 13th anniversary of the 1945 treaty of friendship and mutual aid between Russia and Poland.

An audience of some 300 diplomats, Soviet officials and newsmen listened at Khrushchev tossed off a series of jibes at the West. He appeared to be in one of the bubbling moods when he says whatever comes into his mind.

Khrushchev remarked to the Communist ambassadors that they represent "peaceful countries."

"Of course we will beat the capitalists," he added. "But that does not mean killing anybody."

He said the Communist Chinese are clever because they are reeducating capitalist elements in their country to accept socialism. Then he turned to the American ambassador with a broad smile and said, "If our system wins, then we will help reeducate you."

Multnomah Registered Voters Total 273,783

Portland — A record total of 273,783 persons registered to vote in Multnomah county for the May 16 primary election, with the Democrats outnumbering the Republicans by 31,756, according to John Weldon, pro-tem registrar for the county.

The total includes 150,980 Democrats, 119,224 Republicans and the rest divided among other parties.
