

Dodgers Tip Cubs 4-2 in Initial Majors League Night Tilt at LA

It's taken Johnny Podres, once the toast of Brooklyn, just a week to become the Dodgers' No. 1 hero 3,000 miles away in their new Los Angeles home.

The World Series hero of 1955 pitched the Dodgers to their first victory of the season April 16, and Tuesday night was the winning hurler as they downed the Chicago

Cubs, 4-2, in the first major league night ever played in Los Angeles. Podres retired with a sort of elbow after 6 1/3 innings but gained credit for his second straight win.

In the bargain, he also demonstrated that a good pitcher—even a left-hander—can overcome the hazard of the Coliseum's trick 250-foot left-field fence. The Cubs loaded their lineup with six right-handed hitters but Podres pitched no-hit ball for five innings before Ernie Banks hit a two-run homer in the sixth. Cimoli hitting.

Gino Cimoli, a native of San Francisco, sent the Dodgers off in front with a two-run homer in the first inning and they added single tallies in the second and sixth. Glen Hobbie, \$50,000 bonus right-hander, was knocked out in an inning and two-thirds and suffered the defeat.

At San Francisco, meanwhile, the St. Louis Cardinals prevented San Francisco from taking over first place in the National league when they whipped the Giants, 7-5. Del Ennis knocked in three runs, two with a homer, and Stan Musial lashed out three hits.

A three-run homer by Hank Aaron enabled the Milwaukee Braves to beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-2, in the other National League game. Cincinnati and Philadelphia were idle.

Sixth Straight
In the American League, the runaway New York Yankees swept to their sixth straight victory when they walloped the Boston Red Sox, 12-7, the Detroit Tigers dealt the Chicago White Sox their third straight loss, 8-2, the Kansas City Athletics out-slugged the Cleveland Indians, 9-6, and the Baltimore Orioles beat the Washington Senators, 4-2.

Aaron, who hit 44 homers last season, banged his second of this year in the fourth inning after Ron Kline walked. Bob Hazle and Ed Mathews singled. Bob Buhl, coming back nicely after his 1957 World Series failures, was tapped for 10 hits but gained his second win. The Braves, who led the majors in homers last year, have hit 10 to account for 20 of the 25 runs they've tallied this season.

Gil McDougald hit a two-run homer and Bobby Richardson, Hank Bauer and Andy Carey all tripled during a seven-run fourth-inning rally that wrapped up the Yankees' seventh victory in eight games. Tom Sturdivant went 8 1/3 innings and Ryne Duren retired the last two batters in the ninth as the Red Sox lost their fifth straight game. Ted Williams went 1-for-2 to lift his average from .167 to .214.

Maxwell Hits Homer
Charley Maxwell smacked a three-run homer in the first inning and Billy Martin doubled in two scoring innings to lead the Tigers to their fifth victory in eight games. Billy Hoefe, a big Detroit disappointment last season, struck out six and scattered nine hits in winning his first game of the new campaign.

Surprising Kansas City scored its third straight victory and fifth in seven games as Bob Cerv drove in four runs with two homers and Billy Hunter hammered a three-run round-tripper. Ned Garver got credit for his second win although kayoed in 6 1/3 innings while Bob Lemon, attempting a comeback for the Indians, was clouted for five hits and two runs in one frame.

Brooks Robinson's three hits paced the Orioles, who got four-hit pitching from Jack Harshman for seven innings and protected the lead by bringing bonus boy Billy O'Dell out of the bullpen. Rookie Ralph Lument started for the Senators and yielded eight walks and two hits in 3 2/3 innings.

Rose Bowl Discussed

Los Angeles — (U) — Representatives of the troubled Pacific Coast conference met with officials of the Pasadena Rose Tournament association Tuesday to discuss the future of the Rose Bowl game New Year's day.

Chairman Lathrop Leishman of the association's football committee said the meeting was called to prepare for the PCC's spring gathering in Portland May 18.

Since California, UCLA and USC announced intentions of withdrawing from the PCC the method of selecting the West's team in the Rose Bowl has been in doubt.

In recent years, a team from the PCC has been chosen to play in the classic against one from the Big Ten. What withdrawal of three schools from the conference will mean in the naming of a West Coast representative still was a matter of speculation.

Leishman refused to discuss specific plans that may be presented in Portland but did disclose there seemed to be general agreement between the PCC representatives and the association that the best team on the Pacific Coast should play in the Rose Bowl.

PIRATES SPLIT TWINS
Pittsburgh — (U) — The Pittsburgh Pirates got down to their legal limit of 29 players Tuesday by splitting the O'Brien twins, Johnny and Eddie, for the second time in their big league careers. The club sent Eddie, an infielder who also has been service as a pitcher, to the Salt Lake City club of the Pacific Coast league on 24-hour recall.

Dave Gambee Draft Pick of SL Hawks

Detroit — (U) — Three Pacific Coast college basketball players were first round choices Tuesday in the National Basketball Association draft.

Elgin Baylor of Seattle University was made the NBA's top choice by the Minneapolis Lakers. Mike Farmer of the University of San Francisco was picked in the first round by the New York Knickerbockers, and Dave Gambee of Oregon State was chosen by St. Louis.

Minneapolis gambled and lost on Baylor. The 6-foot, 6-inch sharpshooter struck by his decision to spurn big-money basketball for love and education.

"I didn't care who drafted me, I wasn't going anyway," Baylor said. "I promised my parents and my fiancée I would get my degree."

Although Baylor has one more year of school before he can be awarded his degree, he was eligible for this year's draft because the class with which he entered College of Idaho will be graduated in June. He transferred to Seattle after his freshman year.

Other West Coast players selected included team in brackets: Jim Bond, Pasadena College Minneapolis; Hal Duffy, Oregon, Minneapolis; Gary Alcorn, Fresno State Minneapolis; Bruno Boin, Washington St. Louis; and Gene Brown, USF Boston.

Detroit — (U) — Frank McGuire raided the New York high schools for his 1957 NCAA champion North Carolina Tarheels but the New York Knickerbockers have brought two of McGuire's best home again.

The Knicks took nine players in Tuesday's National Basketball Association draft, four of them former New York prep stars who went away to gain college fame.

The eight NBA teams plucked a record 88 collegians but the Knicks were satisfied with only nine, two over the Boston Celtics who were the lowest and Syracuse took eight. Boston, because it had the best number of victories versus defeats, was last in every round.

Surprisingly, the world champion St. Louis Hawks grabbed 12 players, a number exceeded only by Cincinnati which took 17.

Pete Brennan, 6 feet, 6 inches, and Joe Quigg, 6 feet, 8 inches, both of former New York City prep schools, were the Knicks' first two picks in their own turn. They also selected 6-foot, 7-inch defensive

ace Mike Farmer of San Francisco on the first round, having acquired the spot when they traded Dick McGuire to Detroit last year.

Six-foot, 3-inch John Lee of Yale and 6-foot Don Lee of Dayton were the other two hometown boys taken by the Knicks whose Ned Irish also saw another Irishman, John McCarthy of Notre Dame, selected by New York.

Elgin Baylor, generally accorded the best of the draft eligibles, was taken by Minneapolis after all but Philadelphia declined territorial choices. The Warriors picked 6-foot Guy Rodgers of Temple.

Laker owner Bob Short said he was hopeful of signing Baylor who still has a year of eligibility, although his original class at College of Idaho graduates in June. Short said Seattle university's NCAA-imposed ban on post-season games and the resignation of coach John Castellani may help the Lakers in getting Baylor who earlier said he would stay at Seattle for his final year.

St. Louis Pair Get Pin Crown

Carter and Tom Hennessey of St. Louis breezed to victory Tuesday night in the National Doubles championship with 31 points, 8 1/2 more than the runner-up Detroit team of Ed Lubanski and Lee Jouglaard.

Gambee was drafted by the champion Hawks in the first round Tuesday. He said he was definitely interested in playing pro basketball.

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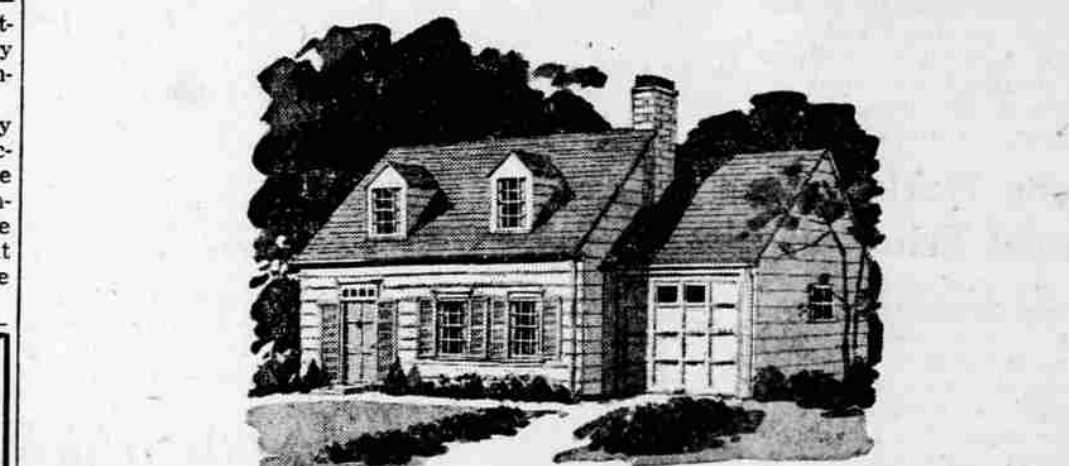
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
