

## New Naval Facility Due at Coos Head

Seattle—The 13th naval district today announced that a new naval facility will be commissioned at Coos Head, Ore., May 13.

Nine officers and 89 enlisted men under the command of Lt. Forest D. Laws will man the installation, which will collect oceanographic research data for the navy.

## Corvallis To Host PTA Convention

Bend—Corvallis will be host next year to the state convention of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers.

Delegates chose Corvallis at the close of their 1958 convention Wednesday. Invitations also had been received from Tillamook and Baker.

The convention gave approval to two policy items: The National Congress of Parents and Teachers want to add to its legislative program. One urges more education beyond high school and the other calls for adequate civilian reserves for national defense without undue interference with education.

At a panel session, the Rev. Troy Stron, Seattle marriage counselor and special instructor in family life education for Seattle schools, said he favored teen-agers going steady.

Total attendance at this year's convention was 986.

## Rockies, Northern Plains Get Heavy Fall of Snow

A massive spring storm that dumped 10 to 13 inches of snow in sections of the Rockies and the northern plains rolled eastward today, triggering threatening tornado funnels and drenching rains in the Midwest.

**Tornado Warnings**

A vicious squall line ranged early today from Missouri into Illinois and Southern Wisconsin.

Weathermen warned of possible tornadoes or locally damaging thunderstorms as the unstable air mass swept eastward through Southern Illinois and into Western Indiana.

Heavy snows Wednesday stranded the mountain town of Red Lodge, Mont., under more than 30 inches, and up to 10 inches of snow jammed traffic at Salt Lake City.

**Fall Continues**

Snow continued to fall early today in sections of the high plains and west into the Rockies and parts of the Great Basin. Heaviest accumulation was two inches at Fort Bridger in southwestern Wyoming.

The Salt Lake snow accumulation broke a 1955 record for April. Sheridan, Wyo., also reported a 10-inch snowfall and three to eight inches of snow hit parts of Western South Dakota.

## Marines Establish 21 New Squadrons

Washington—The Marine Corps ordered establishment Wednesday of 21 new air reserve squadrons in the United States, including 12 helicopter units, the first the reserves have ever had.

Gen. Randolph McC. Pate, Marine commandant, said the helicopter squadrons permit large reserve units to train in the corps' new method of landing assault troops by air.

The new squadrons will be at locations including: Los Alamitos, Calif., two fighter and one helicopter; Oakland, Calif., one fighter and one helicopter; Seattle, one helicopter.

## Parker Guilty In Second Degree

Portland—A jury deliberated about four hours Wednesday and convicted Lee Parker, 31, of second degree murder in connection with the body-in-a-well slaying of Robert Holloway, 44, Portland cement finisher, last year.

Parker had been tried on a first degree murder charge. Holloway's body was found Dec. 19 in an abandoned well near Vernonia.

Circuit Judge Pat Loneragan set 1:30 p.m. Monday for sentencing.

Also charged in connection with Holloway's death was Harold Keith, 43, who has not yet been tried.

## Bloodhounds Trace Youngster To Boat

Oak Grove, Ore.—Officers said that bloodhounds brought in the search for missing five-year-old Steven Phillips of Oak Grove trailed the boy down the bank of the Willamette river, out along a pier and stopped at a small boat tied up there.

The officers said this action of the bloodhounds deepened fears that the boy had drowned. Dragging operations in the vicinity were called off at dark Wednesday and were resumed this morning.

The boy was last seen late Tuesday afternoon.

## Mothball Fleet Urged For College Classrooms

Traverse City, Mich.—The Navy's mothballed carrier fleet should be pressed into service as college classrooms, a school official said today.

Les Beiderman, on the governing board of Northwestern Michigan College, suggested lining the carriers side-by-side in the Grand Traverse Bay of Lake Michigan and beaching them on permanent foundations.

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## La Rosa Expects To Collect Pay

San Francisco—Singer Julius La Rosa said today he is sure he will eventually collect the \$10,000 promised him for a 10-day stint at the Portland, Ore., Home Show.

The producer of the show, Al Learman, stopped payment on a \$10,000 check Wednesday, claiming La Rosa failed to put out his best efforts during the show April 10-20.

"I feel I gave La Rosa every chance to up-beat his act," Learman said. "He was uncooperative and several hundred patrons not only walked out on his show, but out of the building as well."

"He just wasn't strong enough to follow the other acts."

La Rosa, here to appear at Hamilton Air Force Base and at the annual policeman's ball, said he "can't understand what it's all about."

He said he was "surprised and a little hurt" at Learman's action.

"The only thing I can pin it on is that he didn't do as good business as he expected."

Learman said he has made out a second check for \$10,000 and placed it in escrow until the American Guild of Variety Artists takes up the case.

## Way Told for Navy To Save

Washington—The Navy can save money by delaying the scheduled Oct. 1 closing of the Tacoma Naval Station and eventually scrapping its mothball fleet there, Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.) said Wednesday.

Navy officials agreed to look into the suggestion after meeting here with Jackson, Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.), Gov. Albert D. Rosellini and Robert Copeland, a Tacoma attorney representing naval station employees and reservists.

After a detailed presentation by Copeland, all participants agreed the questions of economy hinged on when the Navy plans to scrap its mothball carriers, Jackson said.

Any such action requires congressional approval and the Navy has not obtained this as yet.

Navy officials said they would make an effort to determine if such a program will be submitted to Congress within the next two years, in which event they would consider an appeal that the closing of the naval station be postponed at least until July, 1959.

## Pre-School Clinic Slated at Talent

Talent—A pre-school clinic conference will be held at the Talent elementary school Monday, April 28, from 9:15 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

The conference is for all children not under health supervision by a family physician, but all children who expect to enter the school next year should attend, according to officials.

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## Air Force Secretary Invited To Portland

Portland—Mayor Terry Schunk said today he has invited Air Force Secretary James H. Douglas to come here to discuss airport problems.

The invitation came after the Port of Portland suggested negotiation of conflicting interests of civilian and military operations at the airport.

Washington—President Eisenhower will fly to Augusta, Ga., Friday for a week end of golf, the White House said today.

The President will leave here about noon aboard the Columbine III and fly back on Monday. White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said.

Mrs. Eisenhower will not make the trip.

Hagerty said this would be the President's last vacation at the Augusta National Golf club until fall. The course soon will be closed this summer.

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## Hoover Continues To Show Recovery

New York—Herbert Hoover's fifth post-operative night following removal of his gall bladder was "his best since the operation," his doctors said today.

Hospital authorities said the 83-year-old former President was in good spirits and progressing well along the road to recovery.

His condition was so good that Herbert Hoover Jr., who had gone to Cleveland, con-

sulted by telephone with the elder Hoover's doctors and decided to fly on to California.

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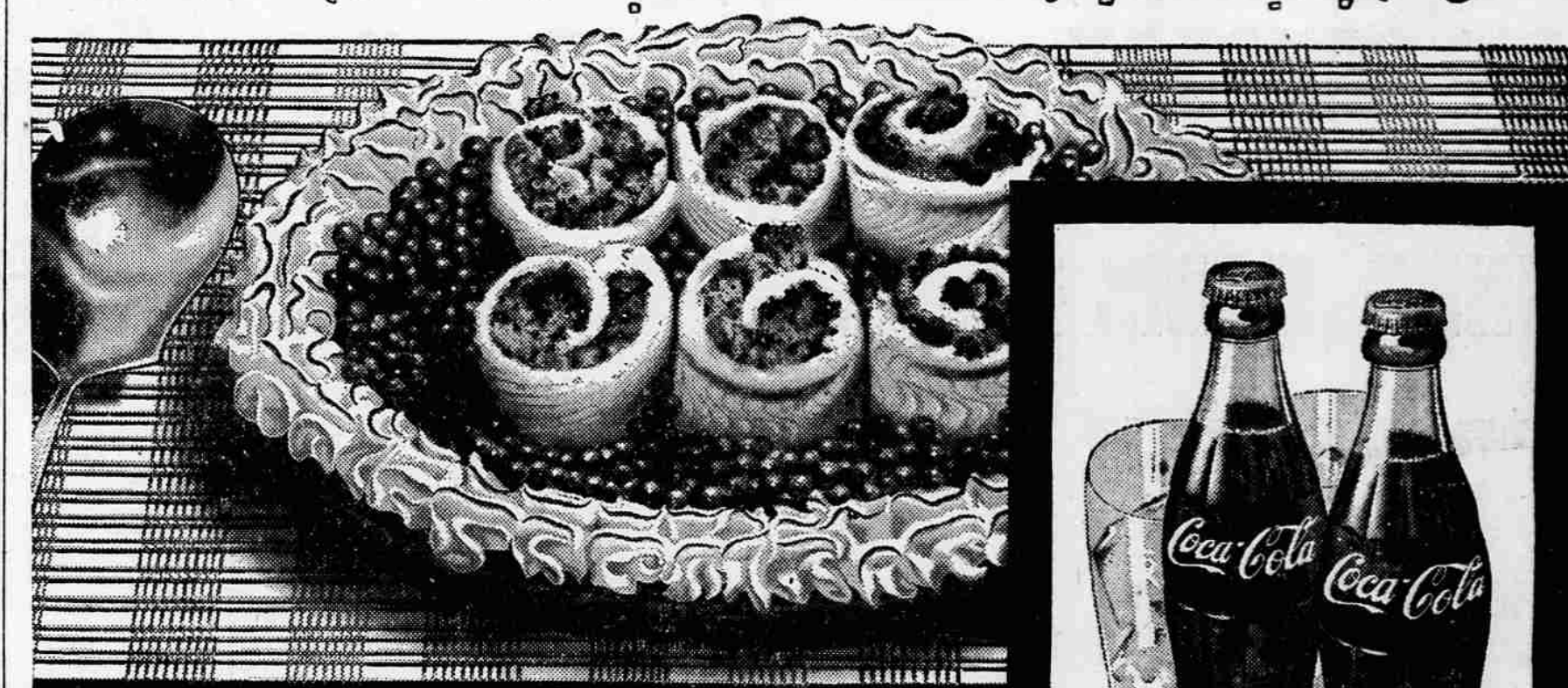
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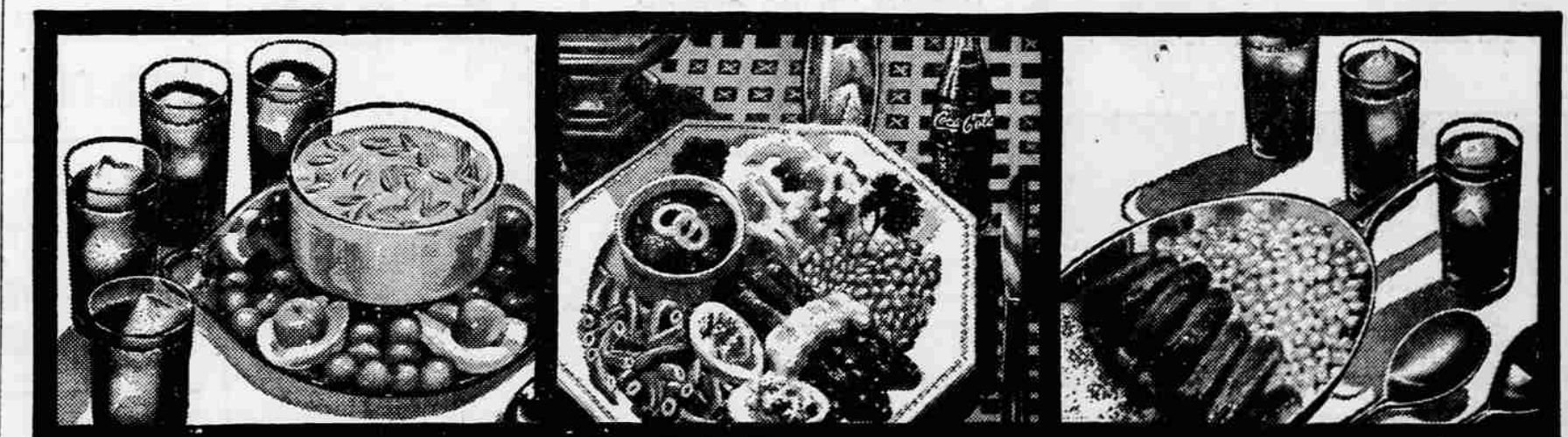
