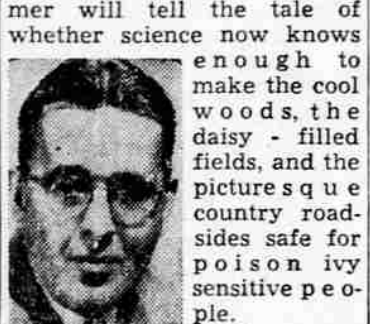

Summertime To Bring Results Of Poison Ivy Vaccine Tests

New York — This summer will tell the tale of whether science now knows enough to make the cool woods, the daisy-filled fields, and the picturesque country roads safe for poison ivy sensitive people.



Two apparently perfected ways of giving people immunity to the horrors inflicted by the most treacherous of vegetables, are being used on a truly mass scale for the first time.

Both seek to rouse body chemical defenses, as the Salk vaccine provides defense against polio viruses. One way is to inject a little poison ivy into people with a needle. The other is to add a few drops of it to their morning orange juice.

Used Over Years
Both have been tried over the years with indifferent success, but neither was free from bugs which prevented it from working in many if not most persons sensitive to poison ivy.

The needle method has been made effective by Margaret Strauss, director of the allergy laboratory of the New York University Hospital. After 10 years of experimentation, she learned how to make a poison ivy vaccine that is stable, confers more than a fleeting immunity, is free of "side effects," and can be injected into people painlessly.

It has been available experimentally to selected physi-

cians. They tried it in more than 1,000 persons and found it effective in 93 per cent — that is it either gave lasting immunity or clearly reduced the degree of sensitivity.

Can Be Injected
It now is a "prescription drug" called "Aqua Ivy," which any doctor can inject into any poison ivy addict.

Five weekly injections are required the first time it is used. The following summer, a "booster shot" may be enough. The hope is that after three summers, immunity will be permanent and no additional "shots" will be needed.

The "by-mouth" method seems to have been made more generally effective in the Milderm Research Laboratories of Philadelphia. Scientists there succeeded in mounting a stable poison ivy extract in all alcohol base.

This extract has now been tried out on a large number of the poison ivy sensitive and found effective in many—but again, not in all. For six weeks, they put five drops of it in their breakfast milk or orange juice daily. After that, they "spiked" the breakfast beverage three times a week throughout the poison ivy season. Dr. Elmer R. Gross of Wilmington, Del., has reported the largest number of patients — 455. He found it effective in 76.9 per cent. The extract is now a "prescription drug" called "Orval Ivy."

Studebaker Corp. Eyes Failing Firm

South Bend, Ind. — Studebaker-Packard stockholders met today to find out what the future holds for their failing auto firm and why their stock suddenly went up nearly 20 per cent Wednesday.

Studebaker-Packard has lost \$125 million in the last five years and sold off considerable of its valuable property. The stock has been languishing at a lowly \$3.50 per share until Wednesday when it surged to \$4.12½ at the market's close.

Brokers guessed that the stock spurt had something to do with S-P's small or economy car plans or with Curtiss-Wright's option to buy five million shares of S-P stock at \$5 per share.

Eugene Newspaper Wins Safety Award

New York — Twenty-one daily newspapers have won prizes in the 17th annual newspaper fleet safe-driving contest sponsored by the American Newspaper Publishers' association.

The competition, which covered both private and contract motor carriers, was broken down into four categories, based on newspaper circulation.
