Two of the top men, Jack Burg of Oregon in the pole vault and Dick Rubensner of Washington State in the javelin, bettered their previous best efforts in the meet between the two teams last week. Burg has now gone 13-10 in the pole vault and Rubensner, who has improved each week, tossed the javelin 211-7. The other seven changes came among the second and third place marks as three Webfoots, one Husky and the Oregon State relay team moved into the top three. The other two changes were by D. C. Mills of Oregon, who improved his second place

Bill Casper Nabs Lead

Las Vegas, Nev. — The "battle of birdies" went into the second round today in the exclusive Tour nament of Champions with Billy Casper, a mild favorite, and long-shot Frank Stranahan running neck-and-neck in the fight for the \$10,000 bag of gold that goes to the winner. While pre-tournament favorite Ken Venturi took a very ordinary par-72 Thursday, look what some of the other boys did in this waging mecca: Casper, who sold in the \$266,000 Calcutta Pool for \$19,000, fired a seven-under-par 33-32-65. Stranahan, the richest man in golf who brought a meagre \$8,000 in the betting marts, had a 32-34-66. Little, shooting for a fourth straight championship in this event, who sold for \$20,000, survived a double bogey on the second hole (he hit his tee shot out of bounds) to shoot a 68.

A single game was being played this afternoon and a doubleheader is scheduled for tomorrow starting at 1 p.m. Starting pitcher in one of the games tomorrow will be either Jack Brown or Kermit McLemore. Starter of the second game is yet to be announced. Larry Maurer, the big stick for the Raiders, will be starting at first base. Maurer in addition to being the top hitter on the club is a fine fielder which is evident by his committing only one miscue in 12 games. Choice at Third At third base it was to either be Chuck Nevi or Gordie Thoreson starting. The one who didn't start today will probably get the call in one of tomorrow's games. Willie Jones at shortstop and Jim Dietz at second base make up the keystone combination and Eldon Francis will provide added utility depth at any of the infield positions. Catching will be either Phil Sword or Jim McAbee, with the one that doesn't get the call in right field. Leroy King, another long ball hitter, will be in left field and Ron Maurer is set for center field chores. Al Kimura probably will see action in the outfield and Ray Weinhold will be on hand for pinch hitting duty. Dale Walters, a curveballer, will be on hand for relief duty as will any of the other pitchers if they are not used to starting slots. Significant Number of Pacific Flyway Birds Nesting in Asia

Tulelake — Sixteen bird band return reports recently sent in by the USSR Academy of Sciences at Moscow have indicated that a significant number of Pacific flyway waterfowl nest in Asia. This information has just been forwarded to Tule Lake Refuge Manager Thomas C. Horn by the bird banding office of the bureau of sport fisheries and wildlife. One pintail duck banded at Tule Lake National Wildlife refuge on Oct. 8, 1949, was killed May 26, 1956, near Milkovo on the Kamchatka Peninsula. This is more than 4,000 miles from Tule lake. Two pintails banded at Tule lake on Aug. 13, 1955, were killed in May and July of 1956, near Anadyr on the Southwest Siberian coast 430 miles west of the west tip of Alaska. 10,000 Mile Range Band returns from pintails wintering in Brazil, 6,900 miles south and east of Tule lake are not uncommon. This gives the pintails using Tule lake a 10,000 mile range from northwest to southeast. Of ten snow geese banded at Tule lake between 1952 and 1957, three were killed in 1956 and seven in 1957. These were killed on Wrangel island 500 miles northwest of the west tip of Alaska and 450 miles off the north coast of Siberia. This is more than 3,000 miles from Tule lake. Three lesser snow geese banded at Tule lake in late

The victories gave Oregon State a 2-0 record to 1-2 for Idaho. Oregon and Washington State have yet to see action in a counting contest while Washington lost its only game to Idaho. The Beavers salted away the victories with three-run innings in each game. Leading OSC hitter was Gene Bates of Vale who had three hits in the first game and one in the second.

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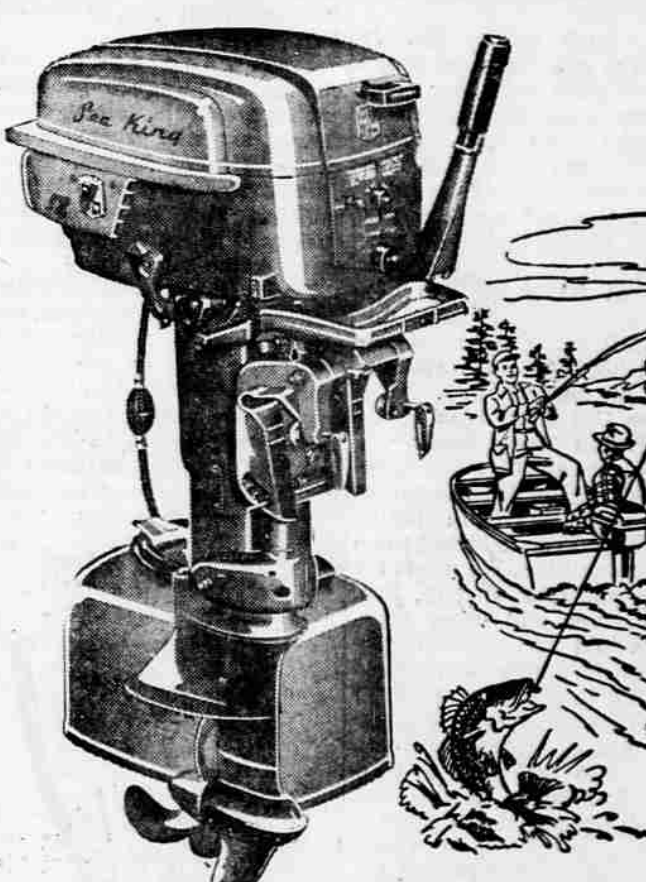
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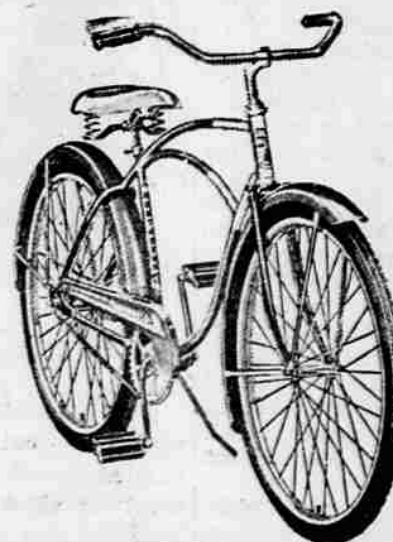


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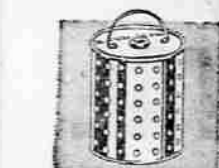
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
