

Graham's Crusade To Open In San Francisco Cow Palace

San Francisco — Billy Graham opens a crusade of evangelism this Sunday here in the Golden Gate city, which he calls a "strategic" objective in the battle between sin and salvation.

"A spiritual torch in San Francisco," Graham told his crusade workers "could have a tremendous impact on the world."

The crusade was booked for six weeks in the huge Cow Palace on the outskirts of the city. Graham has an option to extend it for two additional weeks. The climax will be an open-air rally in the 60,000-capacity Kezar Stadium, site of the annual Shrine East-West football game.

The 39-year-old North Carolina preacher has had a squad of trained "pro" crusade workers here since last November. They are the same skilled team that managed the Madison Square Garden crusade last year and the Graham Rallies in London, Glasgow and Calcutta.

Many Volunteers

They have been recruiting thousands of ushers, choir members, counselors, and ministers to boost the crusade in churches throughout the area. The team also has been trying to raise \$227,000 in advance money to cover expenses.

Lowell W. Berry, treasurer of Billy Graham San Francisco Bay Cities Crusade, Inc., admitted that donations have not been coming in up to expectations. But "We have been able to pay all our bills," he added.

Another \$179,000 in the budget was anticipated from voluntary contributions at the Cow Palace. Besides expenses of the crusade itself, Graham needs \$360,000 to pay for six nationwide television broadcasts that will take the Mike Wallace time spot on Saturday nights. He hoped TV viewers would send in donations also.

Spiritual Success Seen
However, Graham and his workers were not concerned primarily with the financial success of the crusade. An aide of the evangelist said the outlook for spiritual success was excellent.

Three thousand prayer groups have been organized for the crusade, and preparations were being made for an organized follow-up campaign.

Besides the fervor of the faithful who probably need a revival least, there have been few signs of welcome out to Graham. But the protests, too, have been scattered. Graham said he welcomed the challenge of the West and hopes to right things set wrong a century ago when the gold seekers came "and didn't bring much religion with them."
