Willie Mays enjoyed his best day since the Giants switched to San Francisco when he slammed a home run and a pair of doubles, Saturday in addition to scoring all of his team's runs in a 3-1 victory over the Chicago Cubs.

Bill Mazeroski drove in four runs with a pair of homers and reliever Don Gross

checked his former Cincinnati Redlegs teammates on one hit over the last four innings to lead the Pittsburgh Pirates to an 8-4 victory.

Mazeroski hit his first homer off loser Charley Rabe when the bases empty in the eighth to break a 4-4 tie and then slammed another homer with two men on in the ninth off Johnny Klippstein.

Yanks Drop Orioles In Turley Shutout

Al Pilarcik's sixth inning single was the only hit Bob Turley gave up Saturday as he pitched the New York Yankees to a 2-0 victory over the Baltimore Orioles.

It was Turley's second straight shutout over the Orioles, whom he blanked on four hits six days ago.

Pilarcik's hit was a clean one, bouncing to the right of Gil McDougald. Pilarcik stole second but was stranded as Gene Woodling lined out to right field for the final out.

Billy Loes gave up the Yankees' first run in the second inning when Yogi Berra walked and came home on McDougald's double. Andy Carey homered in the fourth.

Rookie Jim Grant hurled the Cleveland Indians to their fourth straight victory with a four-hit 4-1 triumph over the Detroit Tigers.

The victory was Grant's second of the year and Detroit's only run off him came as a result of Ray Boone's triple and Charley Maxwell's sacrifice fly in the fifth.

Cleveland clinched the outcome with three runs off Frank Lary in the first inning. Mickey Vernon, Russ Nixon and Chico Carrasquel each batted in runs with singles during the first frame and Carrasquel singled home the Indians' final run in the third.

Ralph Terry handed the White Sox their sixth loss in seven games with a seven-hit pitching job that gave the Athletics a 7-1 triumph. Dick Donovan of the White Sox

traded to the Pirates last December, came into the game in the sixth, yielded a double to Gus Bell and held Cincinnati hitless thereafter.

Bob Skinner, Ted Kluszewski and Bob Clemente each had three hits in Pittsburgh's 17-hit attack.

Eddie Mathews and Joe Adcock each hit homers and Bob Buhl pitched a five-hitter as the Milwaukee Braves beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 4-2.

It was the ninth straight time Buhl defeated the Phils.
