Convention Banquet Held At Club

Mrs. J. D. Arnold, a former past vice-president of the Northwest Central region, American Association of University Women, last night told AAUW members that "culture may go into the deep freeze with all the post-sputnik clamor for increased scientific training" and urged them to remember that the organization has always supported the liberal arts education which would instill intellectual curiosity.

Mrs. Arnold spoke at a banquet at Rogue Valley Country club which was part of the annual convention of the Oregon association, held Thursday through Saturday in Grants Pass. About 170 delegates from many Oregon cities, and members from Grants Pass, Ashland and Medford branches attended the banquet.

Mrs. Arnold, from Rapid City, S.D., urged AAUW members to always exercise their voting privileges, to be selective in the choice of governmental leaders and to give intelligent support, including constructive criticism, to the education system. She said "the level of information in this country is lower than it should be and not as high as we think it is."

She closed by declaring that ignorance, hate and intolerance are barriers to peace, and should be stamped out. "We cannot condone human injustice anywhere in the world," she said. "We must promote the brotherhood of man and fatherhood of God and remember that our Maker did not color our souls, whatever the color of our skins."

Mrs. Arnold was introduced by Mrs. C. A. Fariss, Portland, a past national AAUW chairman. Theme of the banquet, sponsored by the Ashland and Medford branches, was the Oregon Shakespearean festival and Angus Bowmer, founder and producing director also spoke. He spoke of the "astounding growth" of the festival in recent years, and said that the season will be extended this year opening July 28 and closing September 4. Applications from actors number more than 300 and come from 44 states in this country, Canada and England, he said.

Mr. Bowmer briefly reviewed the four plays, "Much Ado About Nothing," "Merchant of Venice," "King Lear" and "Troilus and Cressida." With the production of "Troilus and Cressida" for the first time, the Ashland festival will complete the canon of 37 plays written by Shakespeare. Elizabethan music was provided by Miss Arletta Knowles and Brad Curtis, festival players, and programs and decorations were in the Shakespearean theme.

Introduced at the beginning of the banquet were Dr. Marion Cox, Seattle, vice-president of the North Pacific region; Miss Maurine Laber, state AAUW president; Mrs. James Basker, president of the Grants Pass branch and Mrs. C. M. Durland, convention chairman, Grants Pass.

Dr. Martha Springer, chairman of the association's committee on standards and recognition, spoke of the recent recognition of Southern Oregon college and Maryhurst college in Oregon by AAUW and presented "diplomas" to Mrs. C. D. Winston, Ashland, registrar of SOC, and Mrs. C. Alvin Adamson, Portland, president of the Portland branch, for Maryhurst college.

Mrs. Dale Hansen, Coos Bay, art chairman, announced winners in the annual art show which is a part of every state convention. There were about 30 winners in nine divisions. Mrs. Edwin Gebhard, Medford, won a first prize for her pastel drawing and Mrs. Everett Lasher, Medford, won first for jewelry in the handicraft division, and a third prize in the weaving division for an article of clothing.

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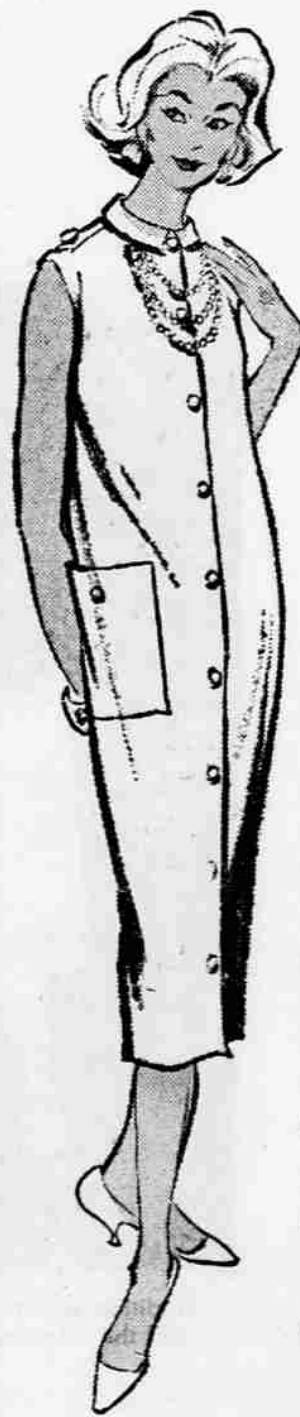
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
