Her husband spoke for Knife and Fork club here Thursday night, and they were honored at a small after-dinner party at the home of Dr. and Mrs. R. E. Hibbs, where Potpourri enjoyed a talk with the Englishwoman.

Mrs. Thompson said she stayed in New York City while her husband spoke in that area, then joined him for the rest of the trip. Rumors are so confused that the Thompsons find themselves speaking in one city, flying hundreds of miles to another and then returning to the first state to speak at another city maybe only 30 miles from where they were four nights before.

KF club members were intrigued with Mr. Thompson's anecdotes about Sir Winston, and his recital of how the indomitable Britisher believed that he had a task to do for the British Empire and the free world during the war, and therefore would be spared to do it. Mr. Churchill went everywhere and did everything absolutely without fear, said the speaker, and related how at various times plans were changed at the last minute, or routes revised only to learn later that if the plans had been carried through in the original, in all likelihood the Prime Minister would have perished.

Mr. Thompson, whose regard for Churchill seems boundless, said the great Englishman doesn't drink or smoke as much as is commonly believed, that he has an incredible mind, memory and capacity for work, can be absolutely ruthless if the occasion demands or can dissolve in tears when his deep emotions are stirred.

Mrs. Thompson was one of Sir Winston's private secretaries when the couple first met, and has taken thousands of pages of dictation from him straight on to the typewriter. A completely charming woman, Mrs. Thompson said she is enjoying her tour of America but sometimes cannot remember when she awakens in the morning what city or what hotel they are in; she is tired of packing and unpacking suitcases and wishes that Knife and Fork clubs didn't eat so much ham. "Once we had ham five times in a week," she shuddered. The visitor was chain-smoking Friday night, but asked for straight ginger ale as a drink.

Menu conversation led to the topic of food waste in the United States and the Englishwoman said that both she and her husband continue to be appalled at the vast quantities of food wasted in the U. S.

Mrs. Hibbs admitted to having had a hectic day, and not all in connection with her hostess duties. After agreeing to entertain the Thompsons, Mrs. Hibbs was summoned for jury duty and had spent the entire day in court.

Modernizing Steps For Family Bathroom Outlined by Firm

Waterbury, Conn. — Bathrooms need remodeling every 15 or 20 years, says the nation's largest manufacturer of copper tube and fittings. Modernizing the bathroom makes it safer and more attractive and adds to resale value of the house, says the firm.

It recommends these basic steps to follow: Replace all outdated plumbing with rust-resistant materials.

Add more storage space, such as built-in clothes hamper, wall cabinets for towels and other supplies, and cabinets under the wash basin.

Check for danger spots. Add a grab bar beside the tub; put all electrical outlets and light switches out of reach of the tub; replace outdated flat-bottom type; enclose exposed radiators to prevent burns; and use only non-skid rugs.

Add a fluorescent strip above the mirror and make sure overhead fixtures give enough light.

Replace peeling wallpaper or paint with moisture-proof paper or ceramic tiles.

Add a larger wash basin which can be used for light laundry or bathing a baby.

Add a few luxuries, such as a magazine rack, bath pillow and room dividers.

Snow Eggs For a glamorous spring dessert, put 2 cups of milk in a quart pan over medium heat. Beat the whites of 4 eggs with ¾ cup of sugar until shiny and stiff. Using a wet spoon form the meringue into egg shapes and slip them off the spoon into the hot milk. Poach for about 2 minutes and turn them over and cook 2 minutes more. Remove the snow eggs from the milk with a perforated spoon and place on paper towels to dry. Put fresh berries into the bottom of a crystal bowl and arrange snow eggs over the berries. Make a soft vanilla custard with the remaining milk, strain and cool. Then pour the cool sauce around the snow eggs. Sprinkle toasted, slivered almonds and pieces of candied cherry over all.

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College Dean Is Speaker For Secretaries Luncheon

Women in the United States are "too comfortable" and therefore do not take the active interest in politics and government that they should according to Mrs. Mabel Winston, dean of women and registrar of Southern Oregon college.

Mrs. Winston spoke on the status of women at an annual luncheon of Rogue River chapter, National Secretaries association, held Wednesday noon at Rogue Valley Country club. It is held each year as part of national secretaries' week.

Members of the chapter had as guests the wives of their employers.

Mrs. Winston spoke of the ridicule and suffering women underwent years ago in order to gain voting rights and other civil liberties for their sex and said that present-day women should not just take these rights for granted, but should remain alert and active.

She pointed out that in many other countries, including such nations as India and Pakistan, women are more active in government and politics and hold more high offices than the women of the United States. Mrs. Winston said that the world is moving into a new era, that there is more concern for humanity and that the age of force is being replaced. "Don't be afraid of change," she urged, "but remember that change is inevitable and is often for the better."

Mrs. Winston reminded her

listeners that work is a privilege as well as a necessity and said "be thankful for work."

In closing Mrs. Winston spoke of the changes in the economic and social status of women in the last 50 years, pointing out that women stay in school longer, are marrying earlier, have their last child earlier in their life and are younger when their last child marries and leaves home. This leaves a longer period for women to return to business and the professions or enter civic life, she pointed out. She urged her listeners to encourage girls to get an adequate education before taking on the responsibilities of marriage and homemaking.

Mrs. Winston was introduced by Mrs. Gloria Reeves, who served as toastmistress.
