W. J. Currier Dies On Saturday; Services Tuesday

W. J. Henry Currier, 93, of 764 Pittview ave., Central Point, a Medford resident for 45 years, died in a local hospital Saturday.

Mr. Currier, son of James and Elizabeth Feller Currier, was born in Grundy county, Ill., on Sept. 11, 1864. He was married in Pauline, Neb., on Sept. 3, 1902 to Nancy Anise Triplett. She preceded him in death in Medford in 1944. The family came to this area in 1913. Mr. Currier was a carpenter. His activities included membership in the First Christian church.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. M. E. (Oletha) Olson, Central Point and a number of nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday in the Chapel mortuary. The Rev. William C. Piper, pastor of the First Christian church, will officiate. Burial will be in Siskiyou Memorial park.

Fish Poisoning Job in Florida

Tallahassee, Fla. — The world's largest fish-poisoning job is underway in Florida.

The selective poisoning of gizzard shad in Lake Apopka near Orlando is being watched by fish management agencies throughout the country.

The 31,500-acre lake, which straddles Orange and Lake Counties in central Florida, is the largest body of water ever placed under controlled fish poisoning techniques to rid it of rough fish which have fast taken control of the once-popular game fishing spot.

Basic techniques being used in the big job were worked out by Mel Huish, one of the first biologists in the nation to formulate the technical aspects of selective fish poisoning for fisheries development. More than 6,000 gallons of fish poison (rotenone) were used in the first of three annual applications.

The program was launched after biologists discovered shad had multiplied to 82 per cent of the total fish population in the lake. By selectively poisoning the shad, especially younger shad under eight inches in length, over a period of three years, the State Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission hopes to control the reproduction rate of large shad.

Since the shad has a life span of about five years, killing out successive generations of young shad will reduce the rough fish population and improve gamefish populations and sport fishing. It was estimated that the first application of poison killed 3,500,000 pounds of shad.

The lake Apopka operation is the "kick-off" of an extensive program to improve overall fishing conditions in Florida over the years. The work is partially financed by a \$250,000 legislative appropriation, fishing license revenues and local funds in areas involved.

Neuberger Favors Cigarette Control

Washington — Sen. Richard L. Neuberger today urged that the Federal Trade commission be given more authority to control "misleading and exaggerated claims" in cigarette advertising.

The Oregon Democrat, who does not smoke, told the Senate that "these claims can do a vast amount of harm to the future of our country by encouraging young men and women to become addicts of the tobacco habit in general and cigarettes in particular."

Neuberger cited a United Press dispatch on findings of the Sloan-Kettering Institute on cancer research to back up its contention. The institute found lung cancer and heart attacks much less prevalent among Seventh Day Adventist men, who do not eat meat, drink or smoke.

Possible Theft Of U.S. Papers Being Checked

Washington — The government is investigating an employee's claim that he stole 456 secret documents to demonstrate the "failure" of the nation's security system.

John W. Dukeminier, 24, reported Friday he had taken scientific papers labeled secret and confidential from an Armed Services Technical Information Agency (ASTIA) office in the Library of Congress.

Dukeminier, a microphotographer at the library, said he told the National Security Council about his exploit in a letter mailed Thursday to Robert Cutler, Special Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs. A spokesman for Cutler said an investigation has begun.

It was Dukeminier's second adventure as a self-appointed security-tester. He was arrested in 1955 after an undetected stroll through the Air Force Missile Test Center at Cape Canaveral, Fla. He said then he had taken his walk to prove that U.S. security measures "need a great deal of improvement."

Navy Men Start Again On Rocket

Cape Canaveral, Fla. — Technicians have "started all over again" getting the Vanguard rocket ready for its flight into space with the Navy's first full-scale satellite.

It will be next week before scientists try again to send the Vanguard into the sky with a 20-inch artificial moon its nose, an informed source said. The day will not be announced.

But despite abortive launching attempts Thursday night and Friday night, the trouble with the 72 foot rocket was described as "really not serious."

The launching attempt Friday night was called off two or three hours before scheduled blast-off time when the outlook for making repairs and getting the rocket off the ground became almost hopeless.

"It's not that we are in serious trouble, but just that we are being extremely cautious. We don't want to take any chances. Everything must work perfectly," said a source close to the Vanguard. "We'll start all over again to make sure," he said.

Authorities Seek Slayer of Girl

Galena, Ill. — Authorities planned today to begin questioning all known sex deviates and ex-convicts in Northwestern Illinois in hopes of uncovering a lead to the slayer of 7-year-old Maria Ridulph.

The body of the pretty, auburn-haired girl who had been missing since last December was found Saturday by a Minnesota couple under a rotting tree trunk in a dense woodland about 15 miles east of here.

Authorities said they were certain Maria was killed by a sex deviate who kidnaped her as she played near her home in Sycamore, about 90 miles east of here, last Dec. 3. But police admitted they were without a solid clue to the kidnap-killer's identity or the cause of her death.

Although Maria's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Michael Ridulph, Sycamore, Ill., had feared the worst, the discovery of their daughter's body came as a profound shock.

Maria disappeared shortly after she and a playmate, Cathie Sigman, 8, were accosted on a street by a tall, blond man who offered Maria a piggy-back ride. Cathie ran home to get her mittens, and when she returned, Maria and the young stranger were gone.

Use of Body Fuel Unchanged in Sick

San Francisco — Body fuels are used up at about the same rate whether the body is normal or suffering from cancer, starvation or polio, experiments at the University of California show.

Scientists using mice as subjects found that body fuels such as sugar, fat and acids were burned at about the same rate by mice in those various conditions.

Dr. Benjamin V. Siegel, in charge of the research, said the discovery was a surprise because it was expected the rate of "fuel burning" would be different in the various cases.

Kingston, R. I. — "There has been a great movement forward in the arts in the United States since World War II, and this is reflected in the growth of art education in our colleges and universities."

That's the opinion of Prof. Joseph L. Crain, head of the art department at the University of Rhode Island.

Crain believes that the growing interest in art may be in part the result of "added leisure time," the mass media, which bring art to the people, "plus the need of people in our highly developed technological culture to do something with their own hands."

"Immediately after World War II," Crain added, "many students were primarily interested in technical, job education, but the pendulum has now swung in the direction of the humanities and arts, toward the development of the whole student, not just the specialist."
