Railroad Program Strengthens Market

New York—A recommendation of an eight-point Senate program to aid the railroads brought strength and activity into the stock market today.

Railroad issues had wide gains with their average rising to a new high since Oct. 25. Rail strength spread throughout the list and industrials reached their best prices since March 11 and utilities set a new high since Oct. 4, 1930.

Before the rail news developed, many corporation reports appeared with earnings showing better than expected. U.S. Steel earned its dividend by a good margin and declared the usual payment. General Motors also had a good report though it was under a year ago.

Oil shares moved up fractions to around 2 points with many of the issues setting new highs.
