

17 Horses Expected In Kentucky Derby

Louisville, Ky.—A field of 17 was expected to be entered today for Saturday's Kentucky Derby, but as far as this horse crazy town is concerned it still shaped as a two-horse race between Tim Tam and Silky Sullivan.

As the size of the field suggested, this attitude was not reflected on the backstretch of Churchill Downs, where owners and trainers tabbed the Kentucky Derby as a wide open affair. Every starter has a chance, they insisted.

Yet only 12 of the three-year-olds were listed as certain starters as the time to put up \$250 to pass through the entry box approached. It will cost an additional \$1,350 to actually start a horse.

May Be Second Richest
If 17 should run, this 1936 Derby would be the second richest on record with a gross value of \$164,500 and a winner's purse of \$120,400. The richest Derby was the 1935 renewal, worth a total of \$167,550 with \$133,430 going to Needles, the winner.

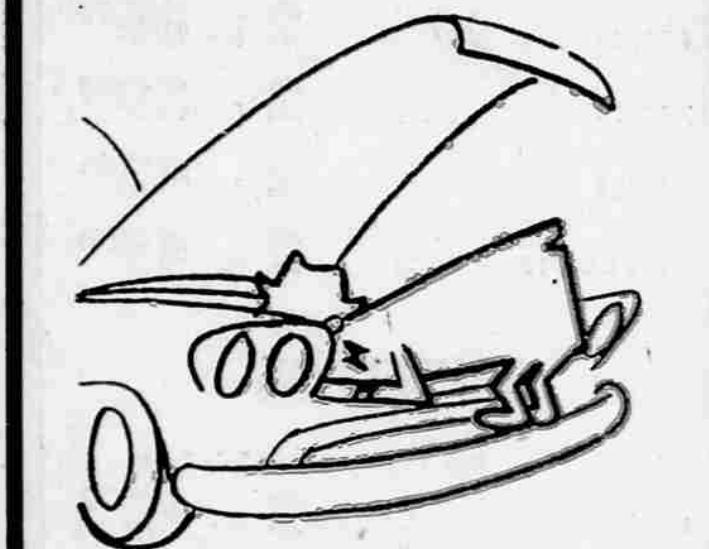

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Ashland Student Wins Scholarship

Chicago — Ten Oregon students were named among more than 1,000 high school seniors throughout the nation today who were awarded merit scholarships awarded on the basis of their standing in competitive examinations.

Winners were selected from nearly 12,000 students tested. Each scholarship is a four-year award, carrying a stipend designed to provide the difference between college costs and funds available to the student. The average outlay ranges from \$300 to \$500 per year.

Each award also carries a cost-of-education supplemental designed to help the college make up the difference between tuition charged and the cost of educating a merit scholar. The supplement amounts to as much as \$750 annually.

The National Merit Scholarship Foundation, which made the awards, finances the program from private sources.

Each student is free to select any accredited college in the United States and to choose any course of study.

The Oregon winners include Larry D. Neal, Ashland, who will enter Stanford University, and Jeffrey W. Carter, Klamath Falls, who will enter Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Ashland Chamber Favors Lake Park

Ashland—Establishment of a park and recreational area at Emigrant Lake will be supported by the Ashland Chamber of Commerce, according to the chamber directors at a recent meeting.

Directors reported that the national parks service has indicated an interest in securing a tract of land at Emigrant for recreational purposes. Members of the Oregon congressional delegation and the national and state park services have been advised of the chamber's interest in the project.

Southern Demos May Help Defeat Jobless Pay Bill

Washington — The administration counted on Southern Democrats to help House Republicans defeat today a Democratic plan to provide 16 weeks of federal relief payments for almost all the nation's unemployed.

But the Democratic leaders hoped the opposing coalition would be riddled with defections by the time the roll was called on the politically explosive issue. Some nervous lawmakers still were trying to gauge the impact of their votes on reelection prospects next November.

The House was called into session an hour early in hope of reaching the first test vote by late afternoon.

First Big Test
The first big test would come when Republicans moved to substitute the administration's plan for the broad Democratic relief proposal.

The administration's proposal would extend by 80 percent the duration of present state unemployment benefits. It provides no help for jobless who presently are not covered by that program.

In an effort to make it more palatable, GOP leaders knocked the mandatory provision out of the administration plan, giving individual states the right to refuse to extend their benefits.

If the Democratic plan passed the House and won Senate approval, Rep. Charles A. McNinch (R-Ind.) predicted, "I never would become a law. I think I can say with confidence it would be vetoed," he said.

Federal Sales Tax Advocated

Washington — The U. S. Chamber of Commerce Wednesday night urged the government to take some of the load off its income tax system by levying a general sales (excise) tax on everything except food, rent and clothing.

A general excise tax of 1 percent on all goods and services, including automobiles, passengers fares, freight, telephone calls, whiskey and tobacco, expires June 30. President Eisenhower will meet with congressional leaders of both parties late this month to map out legislation to continue at least some of the taxes.
