Chloritic Trees Should Be Sprayed

Fruit growers who have chlorotic trees should spray them with Chel 330, which is an iron chelate spray that supplies iron to the leaves, Clifford B. Cordy, county horticultural agent, reported today.

He added that the grower should spray the individual trees as soon as the yellow leaves are noticed and should not mix the iron chelate spray with the first cover spray.

Cordy said the spray may be made with three pounds of iron chelate to 200 gallons or less of water.

Hot Water Bath Kills Portland Tot

Portland—U.P.—A baby girl died Wednesday from burns suffered when the child apparently turned on the hot water faucet while being given a bath when the mother was out of the room briefly. The victim was Ireta Lucile Steen.

Industrial Stocks Near High for 1958

New York—U.P.—Industrial stocks came tantalizingly near their 1958 highs in a moderately active session today.

Oil and steel shares started in the rise which spread to other groups. Baile encountered some opposition but their average managed to push into new high ground for the year.

International oils featured in further response to the settlement on the Suez Canal incident. Shell Transport set a new high as did Gulf Oil, Standard of Jersey, Texas Co., Royal Dutch, and Sinclair. Gains in the oils ranged to more than two points in American.

Lukens ran up nearly two points and U. S. Steel touched a new high for the year to feature the steels.

Beer Production Cut as Result of Teamster Strike

San Francisco—U.P.—Beer production and delivery were sharply curtailed today as a result of shutdowns ordered by brewers and distributors in retaliation for a Teamsters Union strike.

The California Brewery Association announced it is shutting down three plants, Burgemeister in San Francisco, Falstaff in San Jose and Schlitz in Los Angeles.

Operating Suspend
At the same time, the Distributors Association suspended operations in non-struck plants in San Francisco, San Diego, Long Beach, Santa Monica and metropolitan Los Angeles.

The action left only the Lucky Lager and Regal Plants operating in San Francisco and Pabst operating in Los Angeles. These firms own their own distributing systems.

One thousand employees were affected by the distributors shutdown. They were told Tuesday at the close of business that there will be no work until the strike is ended.

The Teamsters called a strike Sunday night at the Hamm's Brewing Company plant in San Francisco and the Anheuser-Busch plant in Los Angeles to back demands for higher wages.

Strike Against All
Ray Smardon, manager of the Northern California branch of the Distributors Association, said the shutdowns were ordered on grounds that a strike against one is a strike against all.

Despite the shutdowns, no immediate beer shortage was forecast. The reason was that many taverns, grocery firms and restaurants stocked heavily in anticipation of a strike shutdown.

The Teamsters Union is demanding a weekly pay raise of \$8.50 and fringe benefits for its members, including brewers, bottlers, checkers and drivers. Employers have offered \$4.
