



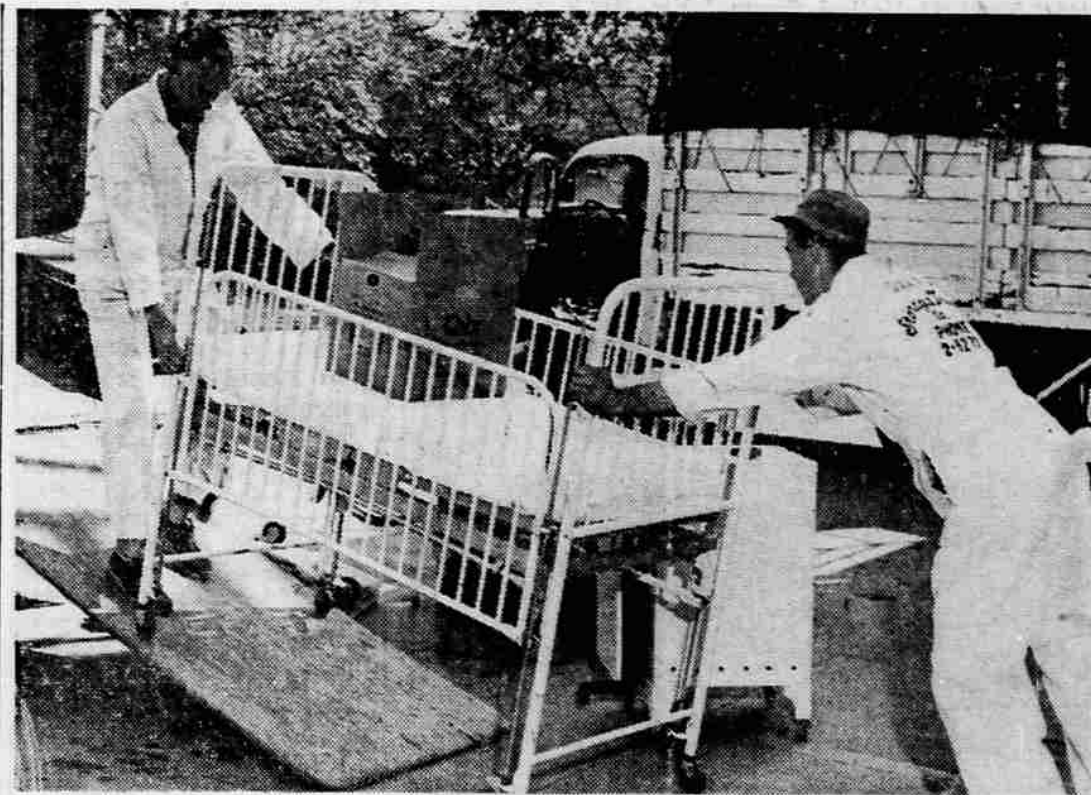

'Remarkably Smooth' Move Made to New Valley Hospital

A "remarkably smooth" move with "excellent cooperation" from everyone was how Rogue Valley Memorial hospital officials described the moving of equipment and patients into the new building Thursday.

Miss B. J. Larsen, hospital administrator, reported the patients were moved between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. by local ambulances. Twenty-seven patients and four babies were moved from the old hospital.

Two ambulances and three girls, born to Mr. and Mrs. Donald Pearson, 55, 1425 Crater Lake ave., were the first baby to arrive at the new Rogue Valley hospital this morning. The baby weighed 6 1/2 pounds and was born at 2:43 a.m. The baby received a silver mug and a \$25 savings bond.

The last baby born in the old building was a boy to Mr. and Mrs. William Barlow, 1425 Crater Lake ave., at 8:56 a.m., May 1. The baby weighed 7 1/2 pounds. Two other babies were also born early this morning at the new hospital. A boy, at 3:23 a.m., to Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Worthey, general delivery, Happy Camp, Calif., weighed 7 1/4 pounds. At 4:09 a.m., Mr. and Mrs. L. W. McGee, route 1, box 349D, Medford, had a girl which weighed 7 1/2 pounds.

trucks were used. The majority of the equipment to be moved in the new hospital was moved Thursday, she said, with a few items transferred today.

'Mopping Up'
"Mopping up operations" are in progress today, Miss Larsen said, with staff checking equipment in the old building to be sure nothing is overlooked.

The moving of patients was originally scheduled to start at 11 a.m., it was explained,

but doctors recommend an earlier transfer of two patients in the maternity ward.

Officials stated that they had expected the moving of patients to take longer than the four hours.

No Emergencies
The new \$2,800,000 building was dedicated Saturday, and about 6,000 residents were conducted through the three-

story structure Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

Hospital authorities said several inquiries have been made as to rates in the new hospital. They explained that the rates will remain the same as in the old hospital. Rates range from \$16.50 per day for the four-bed wards to \$18 for semi-private, and \$21 for private rooms.

Defense Asks Funds For Construction

Washington—The Defense Department has asked Congress to approve \$1,684,361,000 in military construction, \$1,279,464,000 of it in the United States.

Chairman John C. Stennis (D-Miss.) announced his Senate Armed Services subcommittee will open hearings on the bill "at the earliest possible date," probably about May 15.

193 Installations
The proposal covered 193 installations in 45 states and the District of Columbia. It also listed new construction in Alaska, Hawaii, the Caribbean area, Europe, Africa, the Pacific islands, and Korea.

Morse to Arrive Saturday Morning

Sen. Wayne L. Morse, guest speaker at the eighth annual Roosevelt Memorial dinner, scheduled at 6 o'clock tomorrow evening at McLoughlin Junior High school, is expected to arrive in Medford by car about 11:45 a.m. tomorrow, according to Democratic County Chairman James A. Redden.

Senator Morse will give a brief talk before the Junior Chamber of Commerce, state convention luncheon at 12:15 p.m., visit Hanleylands and appear on television Saturday afternoon.

The memorial dinner will start at 6 p.m. and be over by 9 p.m. in order to allow Senator Morse to get to Portland.

The memorial dinner will carry as a secondary theme the approaching Oregon centennial. A brief spot on the program will be given Anthony Brandenthaler, chairman of the Oregon centennial commission, who with Mrs. Brandenthaler will arrive here from Portland for the event.

Warren Gill Plans Visit in County

State Sen. Warren Gill, Lebanon, candidate for the Republican nomination for governor, will make his third campaign visit to Medford Saturday.

Dick House, chairman of his campaign committee for Jackson county, said Gill will visit throughout the county, but also hopes to take time out from a vigorous campaign to rest a bit, and "soak up some southern Oregon sunshine."

Gill will make three TV appearances here Saturday, but no formal public appearances have been scheduled, House said.

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INSPECTION VETOED

700 Delegates Are Expected for 19th J-C Convention

About 700 delegates are expected to register for the 19th annual Oregon State Junior Chamber of Commerce convention which opened in Medford today.

Registration started shortly after noon at convention headquarters in the Medford hotel, the executive, credentials, by-laws and policy and nominations committees will meet late this afternoon as the three-day convention gets into full swing. General caucuses and other committee meetings will conclude the day's business tonight.

Delegates will be welcomed to Medford by Mayor John Snider, Police Chief Charles Champlin and Medford Jaycees President Hal Gardner tomorrow morning.

Committee Reports
Also scheduled tomorrow are four-minute reports by committees on Operation Library, Jaycee Talent Review, Teen-age Road-e-o, Junior Golf, Junior Tennis, the National convention, the Future Farmers of America plowing contest, polio vaccine, the give and take session, by-laws and policy committee, and the resolutions committee.

Jaycee awards will be presented at a luncheon tomorrow noon at the Elks club at which Senator Wayne Morse is scheduled to speak briefly. Dick Stratton, Medford, will be toastmaster at the luncheon, and Art Van Leeuwen, Medford, is program coordinator.

Officers for the state Jaycees will be elected tomorrow afternoon at a Holly theater business session. Officers will be installed at a banquet at the Medford Armory starting about 7:15 p.m. tomorrow. An inaugural dance is scheduled at 10 p.m. tomorrow at the Armory.

Speaker at the banquet will be Ervin L. Peterson, assistant secretary of agriculture. The banquet will be open to the public, John Gustafson, general chairman, said.

Experience Noted
Peterson has had experience in local, state and national agricultural affairs, and was director of the Oregon department of agriculture for 11 years before receiving his present appointment.

Sunday activities include a new executive committee meeting, a board of directors meeting, religious service, standing committee reports and selection of future state meeting sites. The convention will close Sunday afternoon after a Jaycee golf tournament at the Rogue Valley Country club.

Wishes for a successful convention was sent the Jaycees from Vice President Richard Nixon in a letter dated April 26. In part, Nixon said "This year, as in the past, the dedication of Jaycees to community service occupies a high place on your agenda. In an age when there is a tendency to look to Washington for the solution of all problems, the importance of local effort takes on added meaning."

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Action on Request For TV Franchise Postponed by City

Action on the petition of Trimble Television Inc., for construction of a closed circuit television system in Medford was again postponed by the Medford city council last night.

The postponement came after KBES-TV officials asked the city council for a similar franchise and several councilmen asked for an additional two weeks to study the ordinance. Voting to postpone action with Councilmen Fred Robinson, Al Bradford, Stanley Jones Jr., and Robert Van Sickle. Councilmen voting against postponement were Donald Hansen, Paul Myers and Jimmy Dunlevy. Ed Hall, eighth councilman, was not present.

Discusses Rights
Kenneth E. Denman, KBES-TV attorney, told the council of the station's "right" to bring wired television to the Medford area because of the amount of expense the station has undergone to bring free TV to viewers. He explained the efforts of the station to satisfy viewers and said KBES-TV should be permitted to bring the system into Medford to protect their investment.

Also speaking at the council meeting on the system was Attorney Jim Redden, who represents Verl Walker Radio Engineering and Supply company. He expressed an interest in who the stockholders of Trimble Television, Inc., are and questioned whether the planned \$50 installation fee is reasonable. He also expressed concern about local interests if channel five were forced out of business by the system.

Under later council questioning, Redden stated Verl Walker was a heavy supplier of parts for station KBES-TV. **Welcomes Competition**

Otto Frohmayer, attorney for Trimble, told the council the firm welcomes competition and does not want an exclusive contract for the system in Medford. He voiced no objection to KBES-TV operation of a similar system in the city.

Frohmayer added that Trimble officials are selling their homes in the northern part of the state and are planning to move to Medford if the system was granted by the council.

In other action on the television system, the council voted to have a complete report on the KBES-TV request for the franchise at the next council meeting.

Benson Plans Visit To Russia in July

Washington—Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson said today he will accept an invitation to visit Russia and hopes to leave for a 40-day trip "sometime in July, or possibly a little later."

He will be the first U. S. Cabinet member to go to the Soviet Union since 1947.

Board Members to Be Elected in All School Districts

Board members will be elected in all Jackson county school districts at the annual school elections between 2 and 8 p.m. Monday, May 5.

Districts will elect one board member for a five-year term, and where vacancies have occurred, additional members will be elected for shorter terms, according to the county school superintendent's office.

All districts also will vote on a member-at-large for the rural school board. Elwood Hedberg, Medford, incumbent, has been nominated. Space will be provided for write-in votes, the superintendent's office noted.

Medford District
Candidates in the Medford district are Keith Hocker-Smith and Mrs. Allyn Hocker-Smith. Hocker-Smith, now a member of the board, also was a member of the old Oak Grove school board, and was chairman at the time the district was consolidated with the Medford district.

Polling places in the Medford district are the Hedrick Junior High school cafeteria and the boys' gymnasium at McLoughlin Junior High. The dividing line between the precincts is Bear creek, school officials said.

In addition to electing board members Monday, all districts will vote to authorize the county rural board to levy \$334,377.66 in excess of the 6 per cent limitation. The total required levy is \$2,004,303.07, and the present tax base is \$1,669,925.41, which is 83.3 per cent of the total levy.

Four districts will have elections on exceeding the 6 per cent limitation for individual district budgets. They are district 6C, which includes Central Point, Gold

Finn Loses Bid For Order Barring New Deportation

San Francisco—Ex-Communist William Heikkila lost a bid today to obtain a permanent restraining order barring the government from again hustling him out of the country.

Federal Judge Edward P. Murphy rejected the request for the order by Lloyd E. McMurray, attorney for the 52-year-old Finnish-born draftsman.

The action came at a hearing on why District Immigration Director Bruce Barber and his assistant, Stanley Olson, should not be held in civil contempt for the one-armed draftsman's abrupt deportation two weeks ago.

Has Temporary Order
The judge's decision on the contempt issue was not expected until later today.

McMurray asked for the permanent restraining order to back up a temporary one he already has obtained to prevent the "exporting, excluding or jailing" of Heikkila.

He demanded it on grounds the government claims that now that Heikkila has actually set foot on his native Finland he can be sent back at any time.

On the contempt issue, Barber testified that he was told by U. S. Assistant Attorney Elmer Collett that there was no court matter pending at the time to prevent Heikkila's deportation.

Battle Expected
Asked by McMurray about the "cloak and dagger" spitting of the draftsman from the country, Barber said he feared they would have difficulty seizing him.

"I had visions of having to carry Heikkila with a man on each arm and leg," Barber said. "In my opinion we are not dealing here with a completely reformed Communist."

McMurray claimed that Heikkila was merely a "desperate Communist" who worked "for bread, relief and unemployment insurance."

Elmo Smith to Talk At Dinner Meeting

Former Governor Elmo Smith will discuss the state tax situation at a dinner at the Tally-Ho restaurant at 7 o'clock tonight.

Smith, state chairman for the Mark Hatfield for Governor campaign, said he would analyze each of the three major Republican candidate's positions on state taxation.

Smith, who spoke at a Klamath Falls noon meeting today, also will appear on the local television station tonight.

Portland—Carl Oliver Walcott, 36, Santa Maria, Calif., has been given a six-year prison sentence for attempting to rob the Live-stock-Kenton branch of the First National Bank of Portland last February.

Russia Rejects U.S. Proposal For Safeguard

United Nations, N. Y.—Russia today vetoed in the U.N. Security Council a U.S. proposal to establish an Arctic "open skies" inspection system as a safeguard against surprise attack.

The vote was 10 to 1 in favor of the American resolution proposing the northern inspection system. Russia's single vote, as a permanent member of the Security Council, blocked its adoption.

It was the 83rd time Russia had used its U.N. veto. Of these, 47 vetoes were used on membership questions.

Japan Move Fails
An adjournment moved by Japan at the end of this morning's council meeting failed to produce agreement upon a plan backed by India and others to have Council President C.S.A. Ritchie of Canada express the consensus of the 11-nation group as favoring the American plan.

The proposal grew out of complaint by Russia that H-bombers of the U.S. Strategic Air Command were flying Arctic alert missions "toward the frontiers of the Soviet Union."

Interested in Anxieties
U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge told the council Russia's veto demonstrated that the "Soviet Union is more interested in bringing to the world anxieties instead of trying to allay fears."

"This," Lodge said, "is merely an attempt to keep U.S. Air Force planes on the ground where they would be sitting ducks for a surprise attack."

Russia called the plan "control without disarmament" and criticized Secretary-general Dag Hammarskjold for having endorsed it. Soviet Ambassador Arkady A. Sobolev told the council there was "no ground for any change" in Russia's opposition.

Dealers Report Upturn in Buying

Medford automobile dealers report on increase in interest and a general upturn in automotive buying as a result of the first day's campaign to "Keep Medford's Economy Rolling—You Auto Buy No."

The 10-day campaign started yesterday in an attempt to stimulate consumer buying. Spearheaded by the Medford Automobile Dealers association, the drive is being supported by various other businessmen and organizations.

Spokesmen for the campaign said other business seems to be stimulated and many retailers are experiencing some increase in moving items.
