

# Candidates Present Views at League of Women Voters Event

Thirty candidates seeking nomination for offices in the May 16 primary elections outlined proposed policies and discussed their qualifications at the Medford League of Women Voters "Candidates Fair" at Hedrick Junior High school last night.

About 300 people heard the candidates, who were introduced by Mrs. Thomas Rutter. Each was given three minutes in which to speak.

Three candidates were unable to attend, but two of them had representatives. They were Medford Mayor John W. Snider and City Attorney Roy C. Bunch, who were at the city council meeting, and Robert D. Dames, John Williams, Medford, spoke for Mayor Snider, candidate for the Republican nomination for state senator, and Mrs. Dames spoke for her husband who is a candidate for circuit judge, position No. 1.

## Candidates for Judge

Bashaw, candidate for district court judge in Jackson County, was not represented. Another candidate whose name will appear on the May 16 nonpartisan ballot, Robert G. Danielson, has announced he has withdrawn as a candidate for district court judge.

Danielson and Manville Heisel were not scheduled to talk. Heisel, Medford attorney, recently announced he has withdrawn as a candi-

date for district court judge, position No. 1. Danielson, a former Ashland attorney, has moved to Klamath Falls, and Heisel withdrew because of pressing business.

The candidates discussed what they considered to be good qualifications for the offices, their qualifications, and policies which they would establish should they be nominated this month and elected in November.

## Nonpartisan Group

Mrs. Rutter pointed out that the League of Women Voters is a nonpartisan organization designed to interest citizens in active participation in government. She stressed that no one candidate in either party was being favored more than any other candidate by the League.

Mrs. I. S. Thomas, League member, explained and discussed ballots, pointing out that voters will receive two ballots, one for the party primary and the other for nonpartisan candidates. Voters registered as independents or in parties other than the Republican and Democratic will receive only the nonpartisan ballot in the May 16 primary. Candidates for nonpartisan offices who spoke last night were James W. Main, circuit court judge, position No. 1; and Edward C. Kelly and Walter D. Nunley, circuit court judge, position No. 3.

# Portland Airport Agreement Made

Portland — An agreement for use of the Portland International Airport was reached Thursday.

Under terms of the agreement, reached at a meeting here of Port of Portland commissioners, Civil Aeronautics Administration officials and Department of Defense planners, the Air Force will plan the Port and unconditional deed of release to airport property now in use by civil aviation.

The Air Force will abide by the findings of the Airspace Panel concerning approach patterns, air speeds, scramble procedures and a climb-out corridor for military jets at Portland.

The Port and the Air Force will join in urging the CAA to speed up installation of precision approach radar facilities at Portland.

The Port will approve Air Force construction of a 1000-foot overrun, arresting barrier and power check pad at the Portland Air Base, all needed for the F-102 supersonic fighters to be placed in operation here.

## Events Planned At Howard School

Several events have been scheduled at the Howard school for parents and children who will be entering school for the first time this fall, according to Harold F. Boner, Howard school district superintendent.

A pre-school clinic will be held in the multi-purpose room at the school Monday, May 5. Dr. A. E. Merkel, county public health officer, will conduct the examination. State law requires all beginning first graders to have a physical examination, the superintendent explained.

Parents and children will be guests of this year's first grade Wednesday, May 21. Lunch will be served in the school cafeteria at noon. Special activities have been scheduled in the first grade rooms for the children.

## Delegates Named For Capital Trip

Cave Junction—Bruce Manley, Medford attorney and president of the newly formed California - Oregon Chrome Mining organization, and one other delegate were named to go to Washington, D.C., to confer with government officials concerning the Chrome situation.

Hollis M. Dole, director of the Oregon state department of geology and mineral industries, last week told a group of miners here that continuation of the chrome program was unfavorable in Washington, D.C. Dole recently attended a hearing of the subcommittee on minerals, material and fuels of the senate interior and insular affairs committee.

Dole will be the second delegate, providing approval may be obtained from the state department of geology and mineral industries. Joe Holman was selected as the third delegate.

Delegates were instructed to work for an extension of the chrome stockpiling program as a temporary measure to keep mines open; ask government assistance on building a ferrochrome or electro-process plant to provide a finished product for guaranteed stockpile; and see legislators to prove the importance of chrome mining and exploration in the Illinois Valley area.

Other officers at a recent meeting are Holman, a chrome operator from Coalinga, Calif., vice president; Gene Pressler, Grants Pass mining engineer, secretary; and Eugene Brown, owner of High Plateau Mine near O'Brien, treasurer.

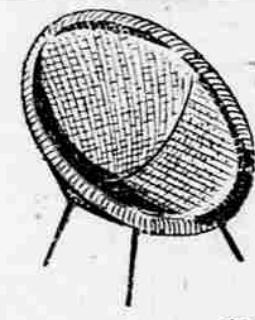
## VACCINE NEEDED

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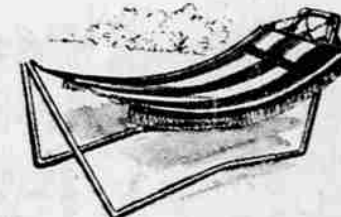

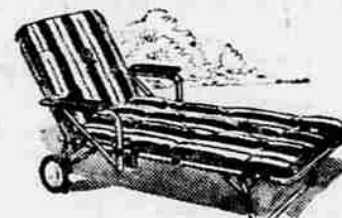
