Death of Indian Blamed on Fumes

The Dalles—The death of Hamelei Danzuka, 30, Warm Springs Indian whose body was found in Tygh creek Sunday "probably" resulted from carbon monoxide poisoning, Dr. Homer Harris of the Oregon state crime laboratory told Wasco county officials Thursday.

Danzuka has been missing since Feb. 15 when his body was found by a fisherman. A State Police lie detector expert was expected to give a polygraph test to the driver of one of the cars in which Danzuka was reported riding the night of his disappearance.

Severe Premenstrual Tensions

Many women tell me of their great distress with what physicians call premenstrual tension or depression. For instance, a woman writes, "Exactly a week before menstrual period, all of a sudden, I get very cold, and my skin turns blue. Then I get pains in my left arm and around my heart. I feel tired and I yawn a lot. A few days later, I get a severe case of the blues so that I cry for no good reason. Then, for a day or two, I am so restless I have to clean my house from top to bottom. At last, when the period comes, I feel well again."

Another woman writes that for most of the month she is a good-natured, happy person—a good wife and a good mother—and then, suddenly, she is "a devil." She screams at her children, she spansks them, she picks a fight with her harmless husband and for a few days she drinks a good deal more than she should. She does this in an effort to quiet down and dull the mental suffering she is going through, with days of horrible depression. She says she knows she inherited the tendency because her mother was once depressed in a mental hospital, and her mother's brother drank heavily, apparently to relieve his black moods.

Many of these women with a premenstrual depression and irritability have noted that during their bad time they gain weight because of holding water in their tissues. Some gynecologists think they can help these women by giving them, for a few days, diuretics (drugs that cause the kidneys to excrete more urine). Other doctors use sedatives and tranquilizers, or progesterone or male hormone. I doubt if, as yet, we physicians are very successful in our efforts to help these women. In many a case I have felt like telling the hus-

band that if he wanted to keep his marriage from breaking up he ought to stay away from home for a few days each month.

No Rehabilitation Like A Pay-Check

A while ago, in the little magazine, "Performance," I saw a sentence which took my fancy because it is so true. Today, when expert rehabilitators take charge of a person who is paralyzed or injured, they start right out, teaching him how to be a secretary or how to use a calculating machine or how to be an assembler of small bits of machinery. There are few joys in this world so great as a job that brings a pay-check.

Dr. Alvarez hopes his readers will understand that it would be impossible for him to answer requests for information or to attempt to diagnose by mail.

This is the third year of the school for foremen, which is becoming a state-wide program. It originated in Jackson county, and has received national attention.

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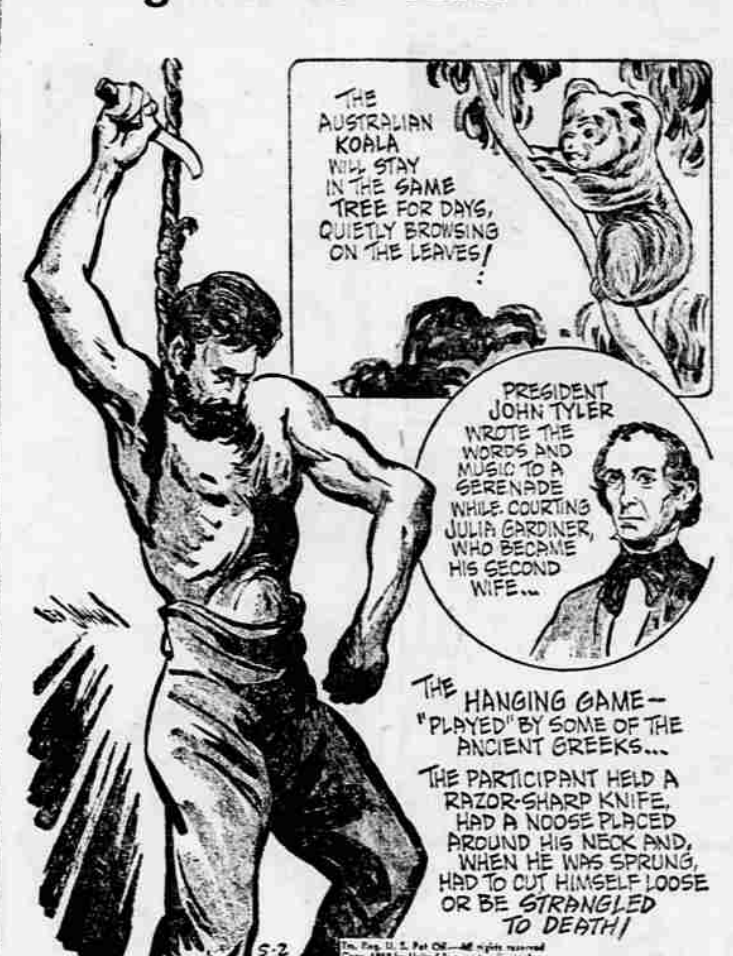
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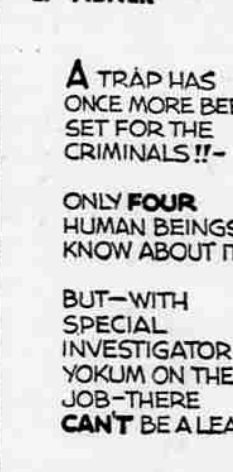

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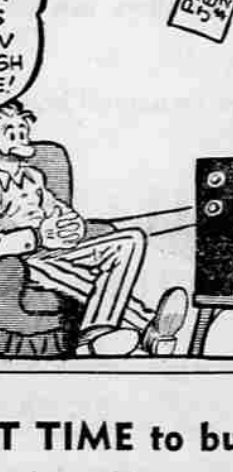
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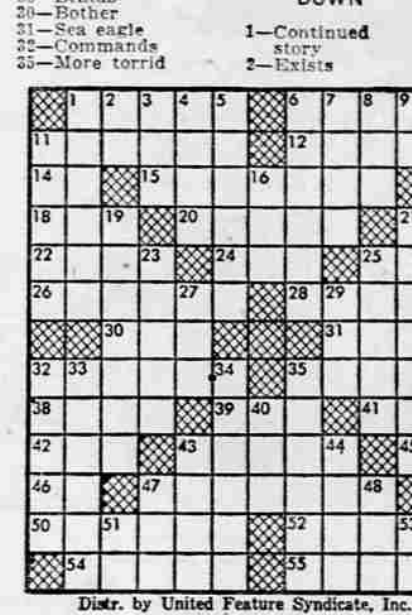
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CROSSWORD PUZZLE
