

Sleeping Dodgers Awaken; Whip Phillies, 8-7, 15-2

Those understandably-skeptical Los Angeles fans had solid evidence today that the Dodgers "wasn't" dead—just sleeping.

The evidence was an old-time Brooklyn-like display of power—26 hits good for 47 total bases—as the Dodgers whipped the Philadelphia Phillies, 8-7 and 15-2, Sunday. It marked the first time the Dodgers were able to win two straight games this season and delighted a crowd of 38,453 that sent the Los Angeles attendance over the half million mark for only 15 dates.

The Dodgers pulled out the opener on a two-run seventh-inning homer by Charlie Neal and then hammered over 18 hits, including five doubles, two homers and a triple, against six Philadelphia pitchers in the nightcap. Don Zimmer swung the big bat in the second game with a homer, three singles and four runs batted in.

The outburst was the biggest of Sunday activity which followed generally the pattern of the season—heavy hitting in the National league games and excellent pitching in American league games.

Pirates, Giants Split

In the National, the Pittsburgh Pirates and San Francisco Giants split a doubleheader, Ramon Mejias smacking three homers in Pittsburgh's 6-2 win and Eddie Bressoud singling home the winning run in the Giants' 4-3, 10-inning nightcap victory. Walt Moryn's third double gave the Chicago Cubs a 5-4 victory before Steve Bilko's 14th-inning double earned the Cincinnati Redlegs a 3-2 decision, and the Milwaukee Braves backed Warren Spahn with 13 hits to down the St. Louis Cardinals, 7-2.

In the American, the Baltimore Orioles scored 4-3 and 4-0 victories over the Detroit Tigers, the Cleveland Indians and Boston Red Sox exchanged 2-1 decisions and the Washington Senators defeated the Kansas City Athletics, 7-5. The second Washington-Kansas City game was ended by rain with the score 2-2 after nine innings. Rain also cancelled a Chicago-Yankee doubleheader at New York.

Triples by Neal and Dick Gray helped the Dodgers cut an early Philadelphia lead to 7-4 in the sixth inning and Neal then tagged Robin Roberts for his game-winning homer with Gil Hodges aboard in the seventh. Danny

McDavitt scattered 10 hits to win his first game in the nightcap, which featured a seven-run Dodger rally in the fifth.

Mejias, who hit only two homers in 58 games last season, clouted two off Johnny Antonelli and another off Marv Grissom to lead the Pirates to their eighth victory in nine games. Ron Kline got credit for the win although Elroy Face finished it. The Giants, however, stopped the Pirates from taking over first place when Daryl Spencer's double and Bressoud's single broke up the 10-inning nightcap. Orlando Cepeda hit two homers and a double for the Giants in the second game.

Robinson Slips

Moryn's "wrong field" double—on which left-fielder Frank Robinson slipped and suffered a minor injury—enabled Don Elston to win his fourth game for the Cubs. Bilko's pinch double, which broke up the second game, also earned Willard Schmidt his first win for Cincinnati.

The Braves knocked out Vinegar Bend Mizell in a four-run fifth, featured by Ed Mathews' double and a two-run single by Wes Covington. Spahn breezed by his fourth straight win with a five-hit

Tom Bolt Winner in Colonial

Fort Worth, Tex. — Tommy Bolt, the 1958 model which claims smooth-pure temper control, moved on to the Hot Springs, Ark., open today \$5,000 richer after convincing a host of skeptics that he was serious about golf by winning the Colonial National Invitation title with a hard-earned 282.

Bolt, 39, who has the reputation of being one of the most active club throwers in the business, had plenty of chances to revert to character on Sunday's final round when he faltered and floundered to a four-over-par 74 after preceding rounds of 68-70-70.

Following Bolt were Ken Venturi of San Francisco, who came close but whose final 69 and 283 total was worth \$3,000 and a pair of fast-closing veterans—Gardner Dickinson of Panama City, Fla., and Ted Kroll of Sarasota, Fla. They won \$1,900 each with their 284s.

Bobby Avila's ninth inning double earned Mike Garcia and the Indians their first-game decision but Frank Malzone singled home Billy Conzolo to break up the 12-inning second game at Boston. Frank Baumann, \$100,000 bonus southpaw, went the distance for the Red Sox in the second game and allowed only eight hits.

Relief pitcher Dick Hyde yielded only one hit in six innings for the Senators, who kayoed Murry Dickson with a four-run sixth inning. Rookie Albie Pearson had four hits for the Senators in the second-game tie.

New York — They wrote "finis" today to the saga of Silky Sullivan.

The roof fell in at 4:34.05 p.m. Saturday when a colt called Tim Tam won the Kentucky Derby. At that moment, Silky was staggering along 21 lengths back in 12th place and the Horatio Alger tale ended.

Silky Sullivan had proved to be nothing but a con artist. A horse-happy nation, believing in the "little people" and the luck of the Irish, had taken him to its heart. But when it was over they discovered that Silky had worked the shell game on some hayshakers and then, taking a seat in the big time, had blown his roll without a struggle.

He had conned them well.

Living It Up

Silky was really living it up when he clobbered those Santa Anita hacks. He gave 'em 28 lengths and beat 'em. He spotted 'em 40 lengths and cut them down as they came

back to him and then copped the Santa Anita Derby after being 30 lengths out.

But this gang he bumped into Saturday was a bunch of high-rolling smoothies.

There are some who will contend that there were too many horses in front of him. But that wouldn't have mattered to the old Silky of the hot hand. For they were well spread out heading into the stretch and there was plenty of racing room in that long, long dash down to the wire.

But Silky didn't even make a serious bid.

He was 19 lengths back at the head of the stretch—and 21 lengths back when it was over.

Those trying to preserve the vestige of a dream will say everything was against him. But that's the way he made his reputation and a "nothing" colt called Red Hot Pistol robbed the fairy tale of its final shreds of fantasy in those last long yards.

Silky, beginning what was expected to be one of those patented rushes to the front, started a bid just as they rounded into the stretch. He passed Red Hot Pistol by a length and moved into 11th place.

But when it was over, just 400 yards farther down the track, Red Hot Pistol had overtaken Silky and went on to beat the Sullivan to the wire by two and one-half lengths.

Even Quit Trying

It was the final blow. The missile hadn't only failed to leave the launching pad. It had even quit trying.

So the bubble burst as it has for so many others in sports.

It made you remember Primo Carnera when the buildup was over and hoodlums' pistols no longer shocked his rivals into feigned insensibility. You thought of Chuck Davey, who waltzed up to the welterweight trail until they threw him in finally with an old pro named Kid Gavilan.

And you thought of the flamboyants of such as Red Barney and Clint Hartung—and the way the Cleveland Indians and the Philadelphia "Whiz Kids" rolled over and played dead in their World Series wallpings at the respective hands of the Giants and Yankees.

There will always be bubbles in sports as the longshots come on to build their castles in the air. But most of the time the idolators are matched by a large portion of doubters. This time they were few and far between.

Because nobody ever conned 'em like Silky Sullivan.

Joe Brown Favored in Title Bout

New York — Joe Brown is a 2-1 favorite to successfully defend his world's lightweight championship against Ralph Dupas in their 15-round bout from Houston, Tex., on Wednesday.

The fight, matching two New Orleans boys, will be nationally televised by ABC. Brown, who won his title from Wallace (Bud) Smith, has already defended it against Smith, Orlando Zulueta and Joey Lopes. So far this year, he has knocked out Ernie Williams and Orlando Echevarria in non-title matches.

Dupas has been beaten only eight times in 84 professional bouts while Brown has won 69 of his 95 fights.

Lopes, who was defeated by Brown in his bid for the lightweight title last December, will also see action this week when he takes on undefeated Carlos Ortiz in a TV fight from Hollywood Legion stadium on Friday.

Lopes Fourth Ranked

Lopes, a 27-year-old from Sacramento, Calif., is ranked fourth by Ring Magazine in the lightweight field. However, the 21-year-old Ortiz is a 7-5 favorite to win the 10-round fight. Hailing from Mayaguez, Puerto Rico, the unranked Ortiz has taken 25 of his 26 pro bouts, the other being a no decision.

In his only fight this year, Ortiz decided Tommy Tibbs in Madison Square garden. Lopes has won 44 of his 61 matches, the last time out taking a decision from Jimmy Carter.

In Monday night's fight from St. Nick's, light heavyweight Tony Anthony will take on Art Miller in a scheduled 10-rounder. Anthony, a 3-1 favorite, has won 32 out of his 38 fights while Miller has won but six in 11 engagements.

Humboldt had 11 first places.

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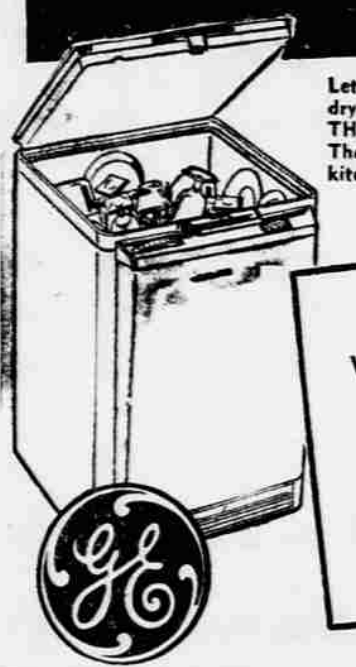
